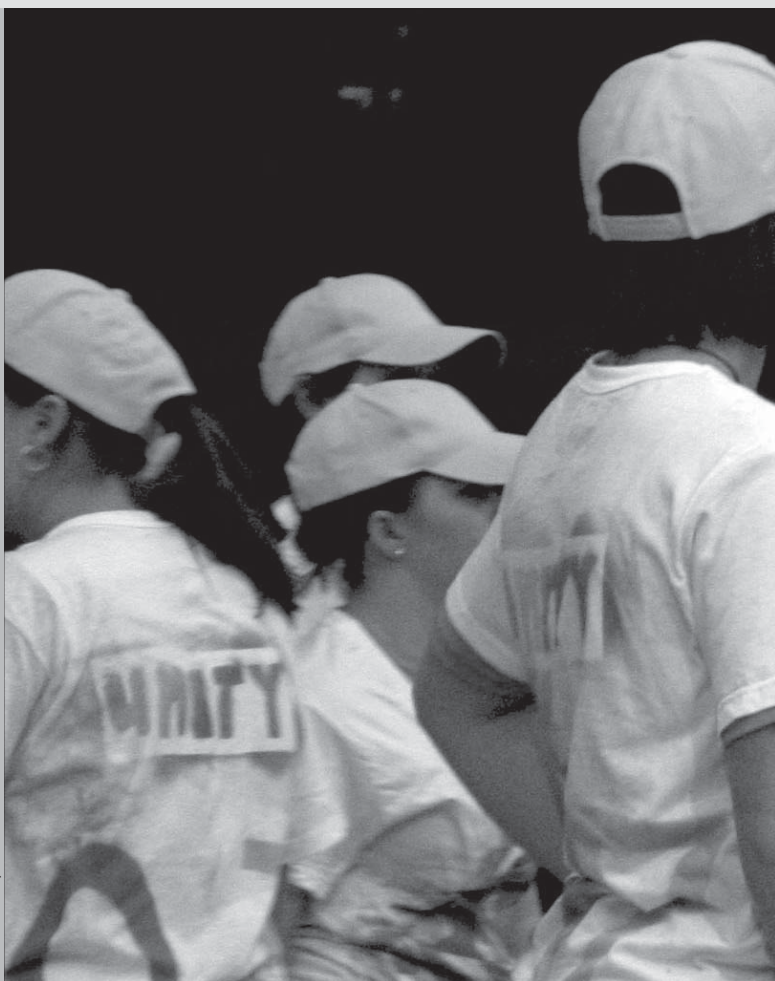

## Sunshine girls encourage sisters

For a select group of women in social clubs, encouraging other members was their sole job, although it manifested itself in a variety of ways.

"Being a sunshine girl is a good way to get involved in the club," senior Katie Cozzens of Kappa Gamma Epsilon said. "[It] promotes good morale and friendship among individual club members."

Women's social clubs each had some type of encouragement office, usually designated as sunshine girls. For Shantih, this office was orange crusher, and amongst the Iota Chi members, awesome blossom. GATA had a sunshine queen, and Pi Theta Phi simply called theirs the encouragement office.

No matter what title they had, these women all shared the same, important job: to encourage other members. They kept up with birthdays, made snacks for club meetings and sent candy in the mail. Sunshine girls were as traditional or creative as they wanted to be.

Sophomore Mallory Thompson, a sunshine girl for Chi Omega Pi in spring 2007, said she sent "corny pick-up line" valentines to members. She also got together with other sunshine girls and baked cookies for club meetings.

"It was a real opportunity for me to get to know the other girls in the club," Thompson said.

Sunshine girls practiced other types of encouragement, like decorating doors for members' birthdays, making crafts, organizing events and keeping the club informed about members' birthdays.

All members felt the outpouring of encouragement.

"It's nice to know that someone was thinking about you enough to take the time to write you a note," said senior Samantha Stratton, a Zeta Rho sunshine girl.

"I think the sunshine girls help keep everyone united by making every girl feel special and important," Stratton said. "The club wouldn't be what it is without every girl [knowing] it."

Junior Rebecca Hatfield, vice president of Ko Jo Kai, appreciated her club's sunshine girls' efforts as well.

"I think anyone can agree that getting something in the mail always brightens your day and helps you to know that someone cares about you," Hatfield said.

## New faces take new places

Joining a social club could be an intimidating process. In an effort to lessen the pressure of meeting an entire club all at the same time at a one-time open house, Corey McEntyre, who was appointed director of campus life in fall 2007, decided to hold a mixer solely with social club officers. McEntyre said the mixer was set up so interested students could meet directly with the club officers.

McEntyre graduated from Harding in 2007 with a degree in dietetics and readily accepted the chance to prolong his time on campus with a staff position, especially one interconnected with student life and entertainment. The director of campus life post became available after Zach Neal accepted the title of assistant dean of men.

McEntyre's transition from student to staff was a smooth one. His new position included oversight of social clubs and campus events planning, both tasks closely related to student campus culture, with which he was familiar. His involvement on the campus activities board and in a social club while he was a student gave him an insider's perspective into student life.

"As someone just coming from the system, I felt I could really understand people and help them, especially in matters of social clubs," he said. "I really wanted to be able minister to people God put in my path, building off of existing relationships I had with students."

One way McEntyre set about making the social club process more approachable and user-friendly was through his idea for a less daunting club meet-and-greet — the officers mixer.

Sophomore Rachel Geddie, an encouragement officer for Pi Theta Phi, thought the new mixer was a good idea. She said the officers mixer was structured like a pre-open house, allowing prospective members to meet the people in charge of various clubs.

"Officers are a good representation of the club, so you can still get a good feel of a club without being tossed into a sea of intimidating jerseys," Geddie said.

Students who attended the mixer thought it was a helpful way to initiate contact with the club process. Junior Lilly Garza, who was interested in joining a club, liked the smaller crowds at the mixer.

"I liked being able to talk to all of the officers without having a ton of people to get through," Garza said. "The mixer was helpful because officers have been in the club longer and know more answers."

McEntyre said that the mixer was a hit and would be continued in the future.

"This year, people interested in joining a club actually had a chance to already know some faces in the crowd at bigger mixers," he said.

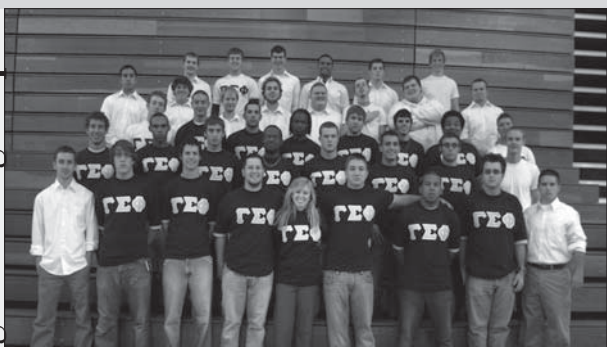

Most clubs had traditional cheers — ones that elicited memories from old members and created lasting ones for new members. Some clubs could be recognized simply by the sounds of their shouting. When the ladies of Delta Gamma Rho sounded off their traditional train cheer, people in the crowd quietly chimed in the familiar routine.

Other clubs brought back crowd-pleasing roll call favorites as well. ## Service shines on and off campus

Whether it was volunteering locally or internationally, social clubs were very active in serving others. Each club took on different service projects as one of their many club responsibilities. Whether through an ongoing relationship with an organization or a one-time workday with Bisons for Christ, club members found creative ways to serve.

Chi Omega Pi did a variety of projects for the Sunshine School throughout the year, from a Halloween haunted house to providing students with Christmas gifts. Senior service project director Erin Younger said that one of the main projects involved helping the Sunshine School raise money to build a new facility, namely through hosting a car wash on September 22. Even club week activities incorporated their longstanding relationship with the special needs school.

"During club week we had our new members go to the school with some older members to help clean," Younger said. "They just tidied up the place."

Although serving outside Searcy might have seemed unrealistic, the women of Shantih found a creative way to reach others beyond borders. The club helped provide food, clothing and school supplies to three girls overseas through a Compassion International sponsorship. To raise money, the women babysat at Valley Baptist Church during an anniversary celebration for donations toward their sponsorship.

For men's social club Sub T-16, a Bisons for Christ opportunity was just down the street at local benevolent organization His House. The organization provided groceries for the areas underprivileged. Sub T-16 members volunteered their manpower on September 19 to stock shelves and un-box goods.

"It was a wonderful way for people to come in contact with the church by meeting their needs," SubT-16 member senior Derek Glover said.

TNT members also were part of Bisons for Christ. The men visited more than 26 homes, handing out packs with paper towels, soap, toothpaste and brushes for the Beebe Housing Authority. Service project director sophomore Paul Habegger said members talked to homeowners, initiating conversations about how they were doing and asking if they could pray for anything.

"We were all glad that we went," Habegger said. "Even though it seemed some of us had better things to do than handing out bags, it just made our day to see them smile."

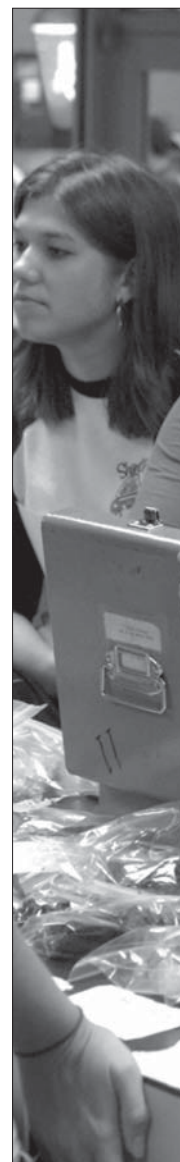

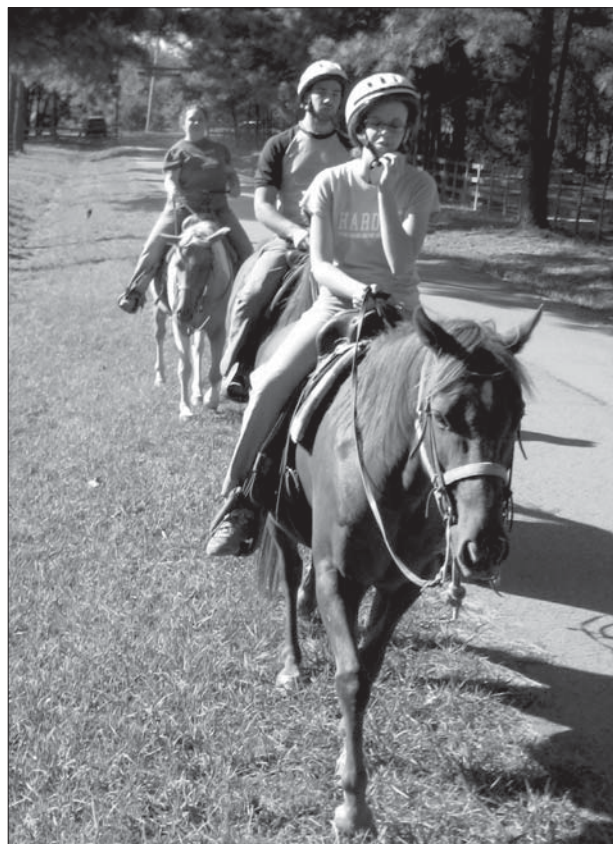
