The songs ended and the uneasiness began. He sat on the stool, staring forward at the familiar faces. As the words began to flow, his anxiety faded.

This is what senior Tim Pruitt, a TNT member, said he felt when he gave his testimonial to his club.

Each time TNT members gathered for their club meetings this year, a member told his conversion story to the group.

Senior devotional director Jamie Walters said he was affected when the club's previous devotional director, senior Alan Hooten, had members tell their stories. Walters said he wanted that tradition to continue.

"We realized how different our stories are, yet how they are the same because in the end we came to Jesus Christ," Walters said.

Walters began the fall semester with his testimony and said his charge for the year was Ephesians 4:1: "As a prisoner of the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received."

Walters said it wasn't the physical reactions that affected him, but the spiritual.

"You may never know how someone related to another's story, but there

is usually a change, and if they apply it to their life, then it was worth it," Walters said.

Pruitt had a reservation about telling his story — he had never talked about his heart problems in front of a large group, but he said he believed it was time.

Pruitt said many people did not know he had a pacemaker, and he was scared about how they might react.

"Once I saw they were taking it into their hearts, I was comfortable and ready to share how I got to where I was," Pruitt said.

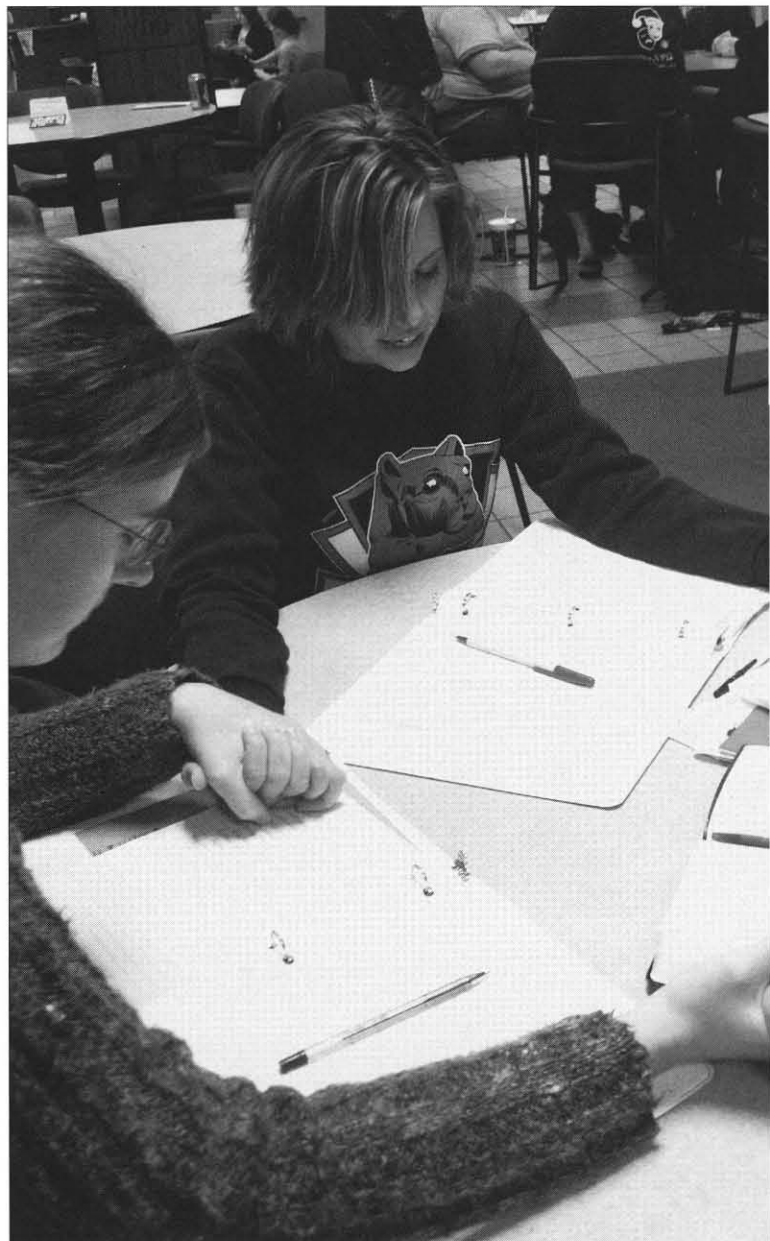
After Pruitt shared his story, he said it was remarkable how others felt they could share their stories with him.

"I was able to show my spiritual heart, and when something like that happens, it is a bond that only Christian brothers can have, not just brothers of TNT," Pruitt said.

Junior Whit Jordan said he enjoyed the testimonials of fellow TNT members, and he knew those stories helped members bond spiritually.

"They are all just so different," Jordan said. "It is amazing to hear what people have gone through to get where they are now spiritually."

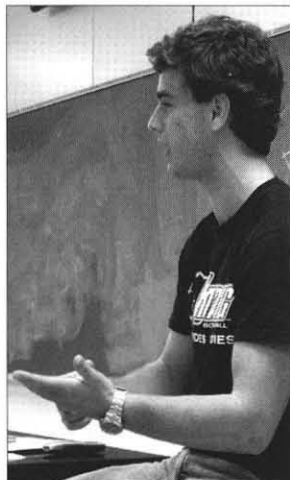

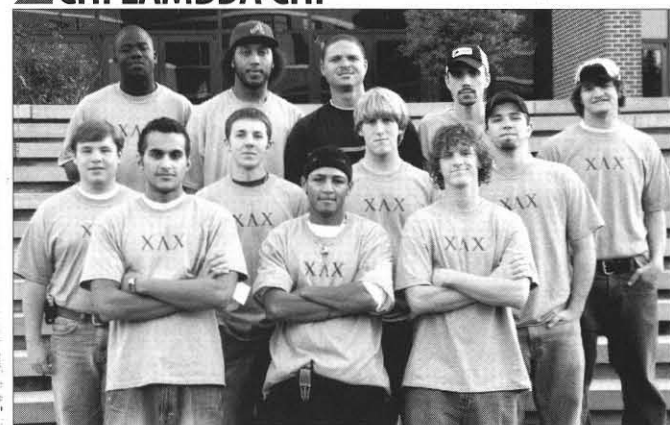

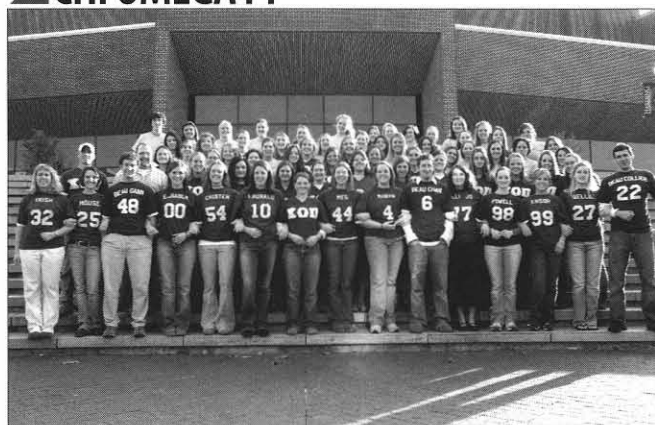

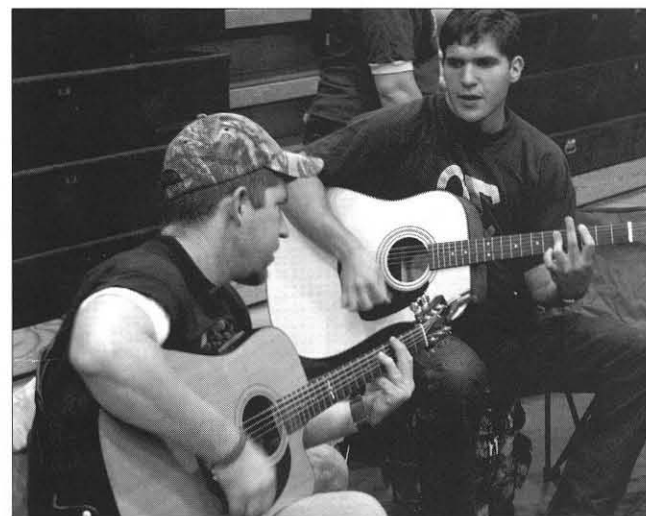
Owens said that although she enjoyed dressing up and having fun, she really made her decisions after meeting and talking to the girls.

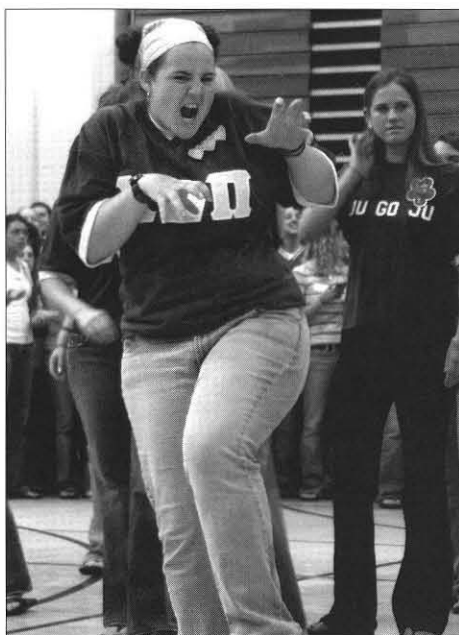

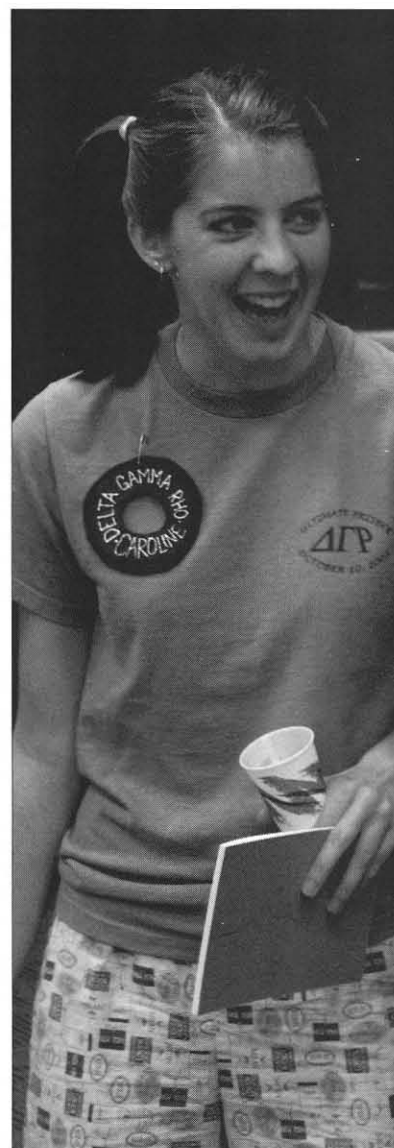

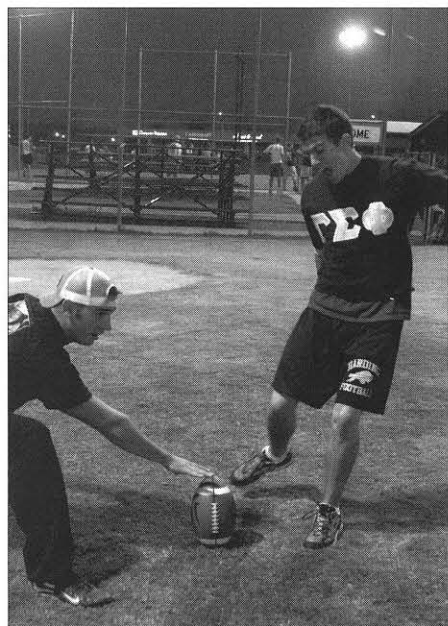

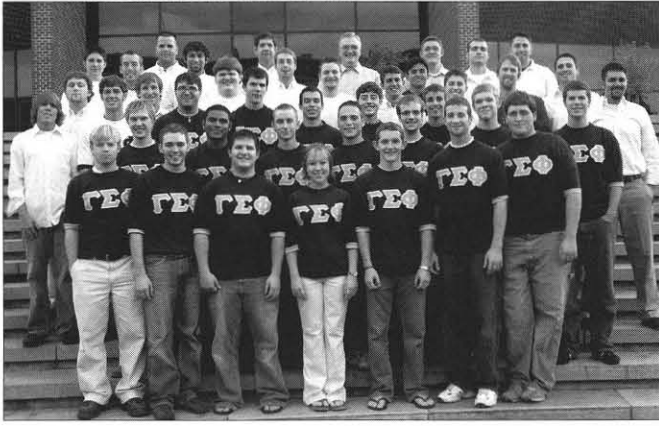

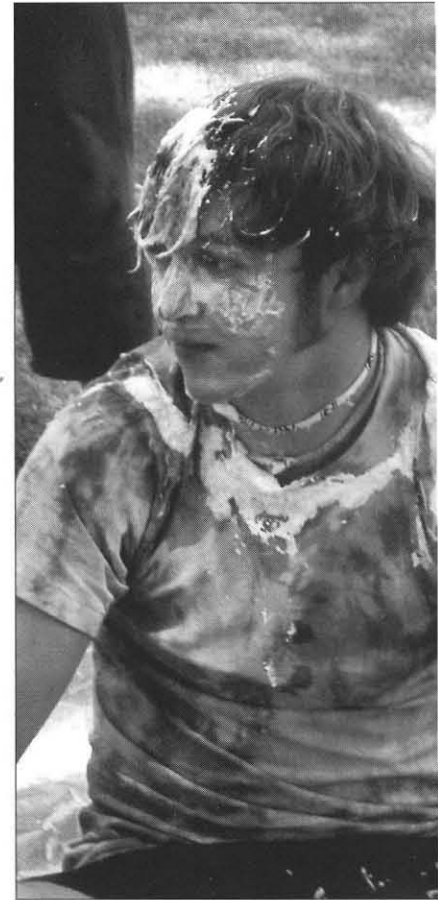

"It brought a nice bronze color to my face and improved my muscle tone," he said. "If you make canoeing a frequent routine, it would be a good exercise regiment."

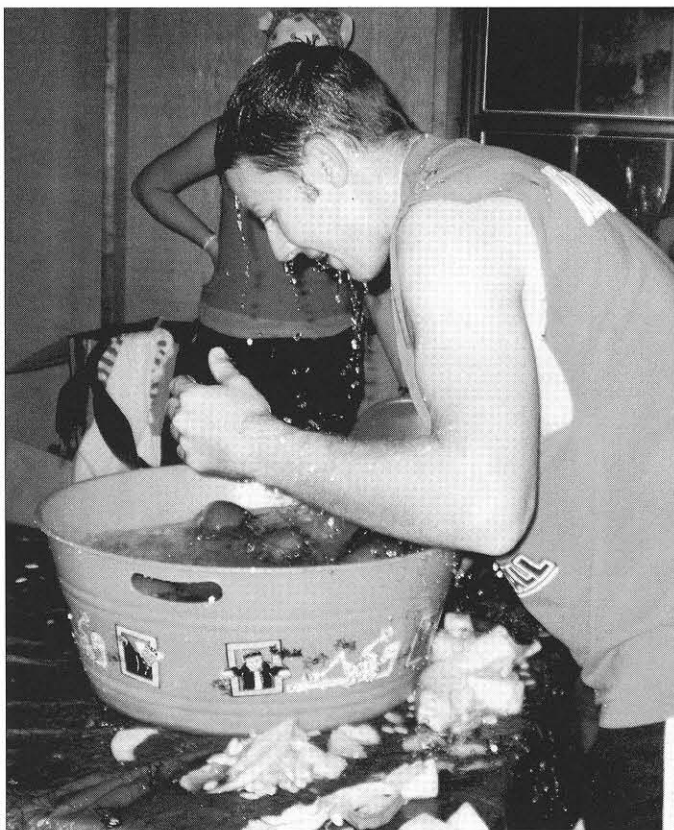

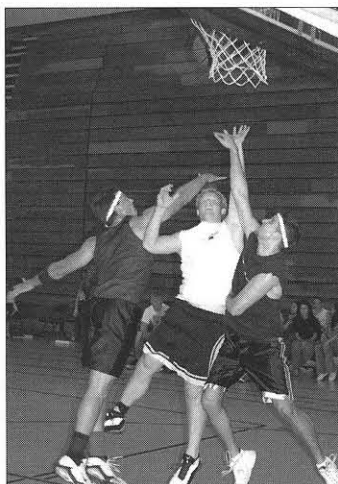

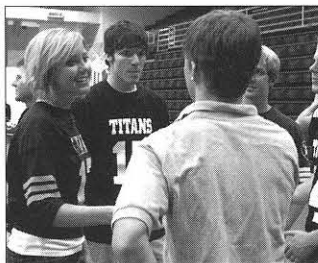

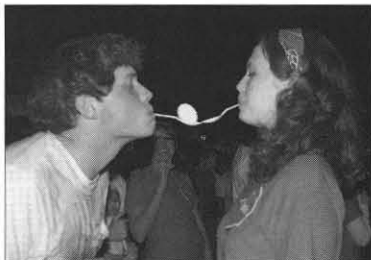

TWO PLAYERS LEAVE CLUB GAME WITH CONCUSSIONS

TOUGH ENOUGH

A game night for women's flag football usually included matching colored knee socks, bandannas, beaux as coaches and loyal fans.

One night, though, there were several new phrases introduced to club sports: Concussions, CAT scan, neck brace and blacking out.

The incidents occurred during an A-team flag football game between Shantih and Ju Go Ju. The game went into four overtimes before Ju Go Ju won. However, before the game ended, two Shantih women were in the hospital with concussions. Sophomore Mallory Evans, athletic director for Shantih, was the first to go down.

"I was diving for a flag when I went down and got kneed in the head," Evans said. "I don't remember much after that, except that the beaux kept pouring water on me to keep me awake."

Evans was rushed to the hospital where doctors indicated that she had suffered a serious concussion. Senior Melanie Goodson, Shantih member, said she was relieved Evans' injuries were not more serious.

"We were really worried about Mallory when she got hurt because it was really hard to keep her awake," Goodson said. "She could have been seriously injured."

The injuries did not end there, however. As the intensity increased and each team battled for the win, Shantih suffered yet another casualty when junior Tracy Chapin was injured in the last play of the game.

"I jumped up for the ball, and when I came down, I got severely 'whiplashed,'" Chapin said. "When I tried to stand, I immediately collapsed and blacked out."

Chapin was also rushed to the hospital following the play. Although her teammates were worried that she might have a spinal injury, the doctors said she had suffered only a mild concussion. Her injury was just one example of why club sports had become too competitive, Evans said.

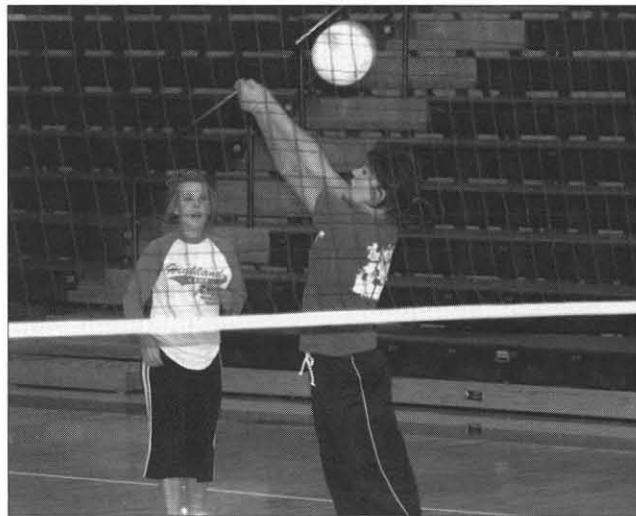
"It is not just A-teams that are too competitive," Evans said. "As athletic director, I have seen it happen in all the divisions. I have girls not want to sign up because of the competitiveness of it. Something is wrong when you have to convince girls to sign up. We have lost the focus of what it is about."

Goodson, on the other hand, said she believed that although club sports can be competitive, they are not out of control.

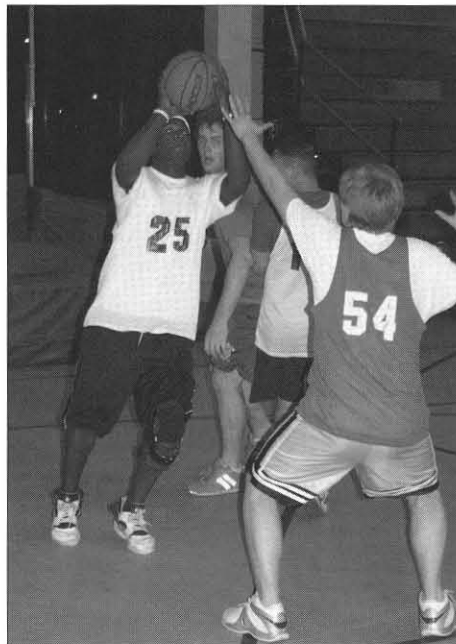
"To me, it makes it more fun when there's an intense game," Goodson said. "It's just about getting out there and playing for your team."

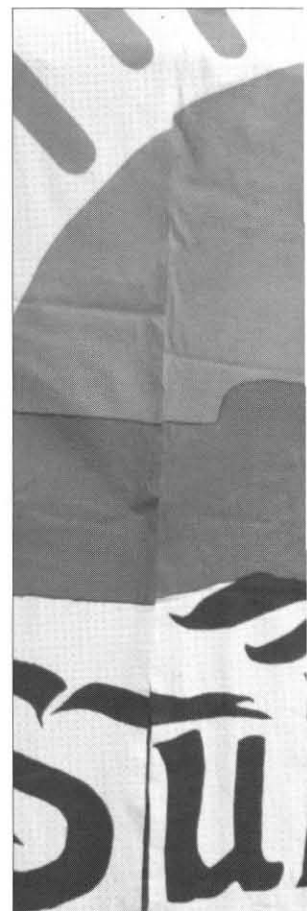

SEVENTEEN REVITALIZE SUB T-16

In the book of Harding lore there was a legend about a men's social club that was slowly dying. In order to save that club from peril, brave members of another club jumped to keep the club alive.

The club in peril was TNT, and its rescuer was none other than Sub T-16. Now years later, it was Sub T-16 who was facing disbandment, and TNT members jumped to keep the club afloat — and possibly return the favor.

Founded in 1922, Sub T-16 remained one of the largest and well-known clubs on campus. However, in the early '90s, because of a bad reputation, a lot of graduating members, and members unable to return for various other reasons, Sub T-16 found itself with quickly dwindling numbers. In the spring of 2004, the remaining five members of Sub T-16 knew disbanding would be a reality if they could not increase their numbers.

"To lose Sub T would have been one of the worst things to happen to Harding," said sophomore Joel Stephens, Sub T-16 vice president. "We have been part of Harding for so long."

With Sub T-16's situation getting worse, the members did not know what else to do.

"We started talking to our friends, and they started talking to their friends, and pretty soon we were getting contacted by guys who were interested in jumping," Neil Rampy, Sub T-16's president, said.

A total of 17 men from eight men's clubs jumped to Sub T-16, enough to keep it going.

"The jump was what we needed," senior Aaron Copeland said.

Senior Kyle Chandler was one of the five men who jumped from TNT.

"I love TNT," he said, "but it was a good thing for Harding and for Sub T to keep the club going. The traditions and stories are part of the school."

Chandler said he had another reason for wanting to jump — a bit of Harding lore.

"I was talking to some old Subbers at my church, and they told me in the late '60s, some guys from Sub T jumped to TNT to keep it from [disbanding]," Chandler said.

Stephens, Chandler and senior Brad Bellamy claim to have found proof of the jump in old Harding yearbooks.

"We compared member lists of Sub T and TNT in the late '60s and were able to find some proof of the jump," Stephens said.

According to Rampy, however, the story may not be entirely true. "Most alumni say it is a big misinterpretation of what happened," he said.

Whether the story was true or not, Sub T-16 survived in 2005 and was expected to continue growing.

"We ... had about 40 guys at our first two mixers, and we [plan to] take a pledge class of about 20," Rampy said.

Club members aimed to keep the mission and goals of the club the same as they had been for 80 years.

"This wasn't like a group of guys starting a new club," Chandler said. "Sub T already has its own traditions and history, and we want to keep them."

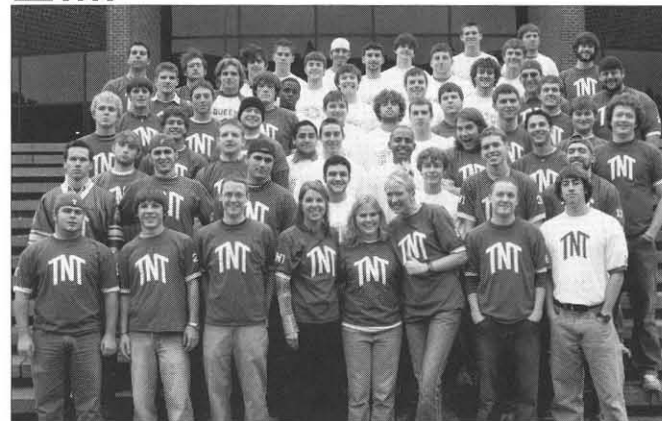

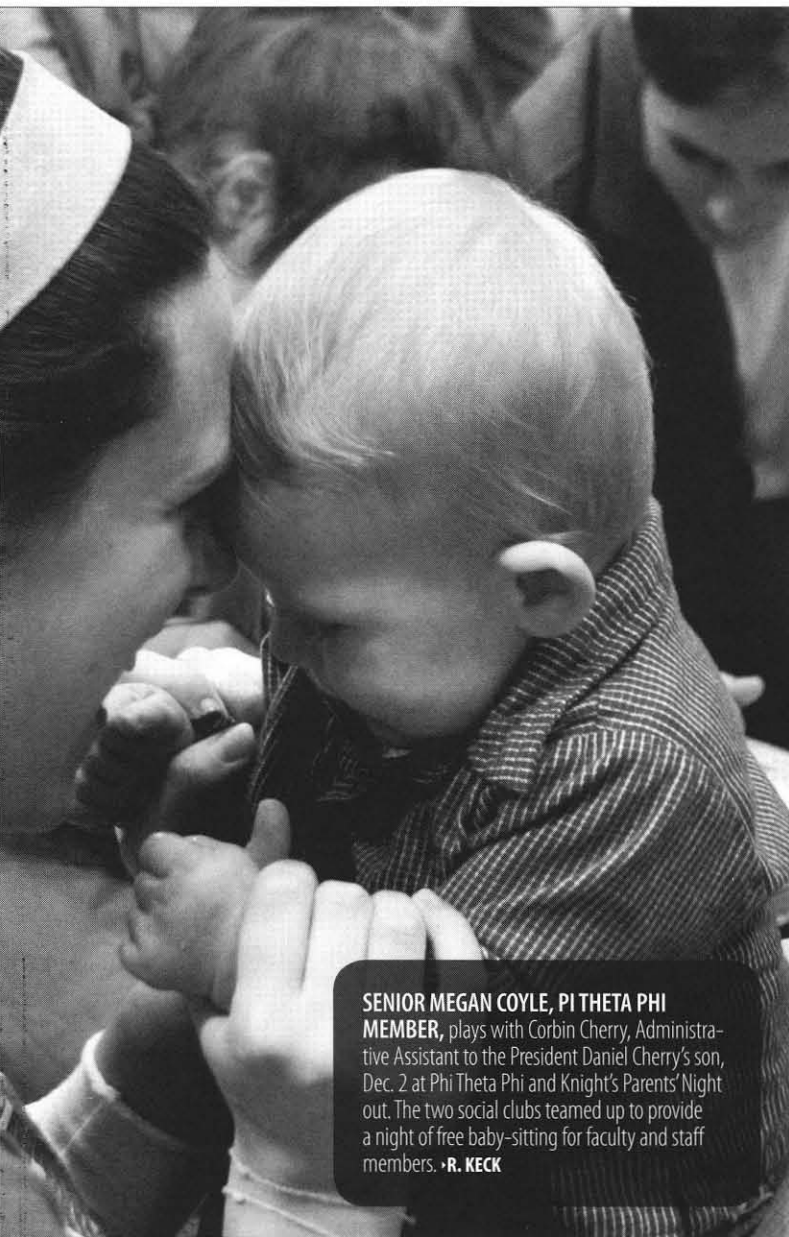

"Whatever I do, Susan and I want to be involved with church and ministry," Huff said. "That will be our utmost importance."

Dubois and Huff both had advice for underclassmen.

"No matter what, put God first," Dubois said. "Strive to do your best at school, and try to put things in perspective."

Huff said to never forget to make time for God. "Whatever you do, whatever you're involved in, you can never underestimate making time for spiritual involvement. Remember the presence of God's spirit. It's something I constantly forget, and it's advice for myself."

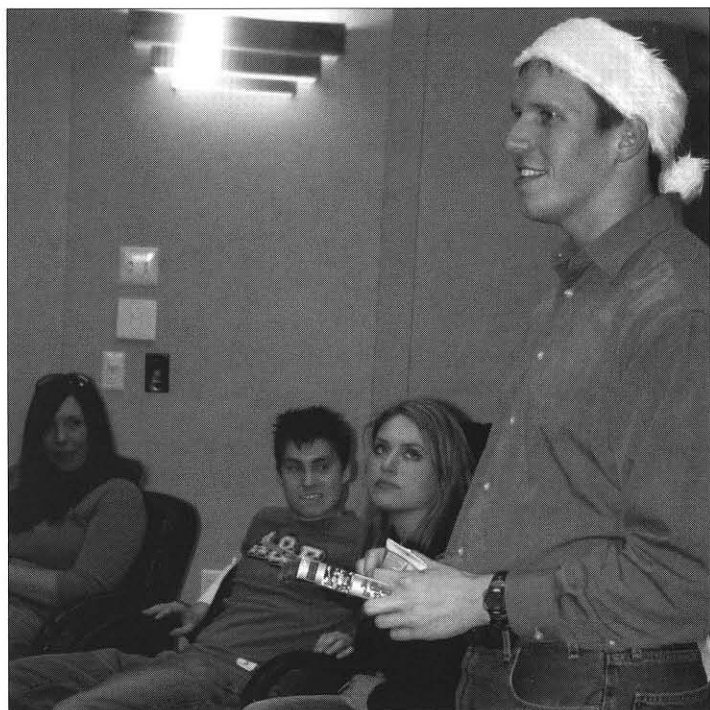

Sophomore Carrie Cantrell, Zeta Rho service project director in the fall, explained why the club was able to be involved in so many service projects that required many participants.

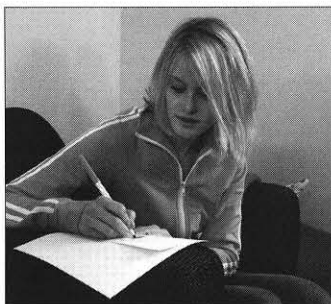
"We have some awesome girls who are willing to serve together," she said. "They are always so excited. It says a lot about them and their hearts."

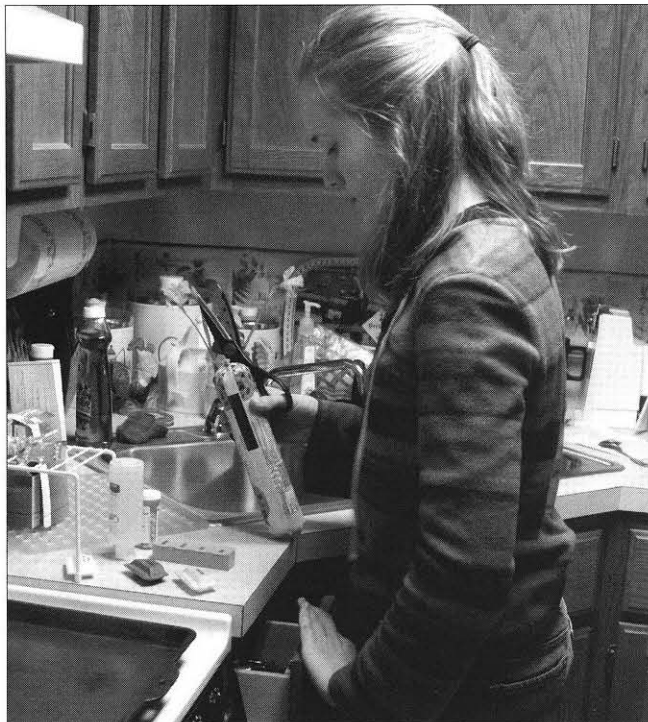
