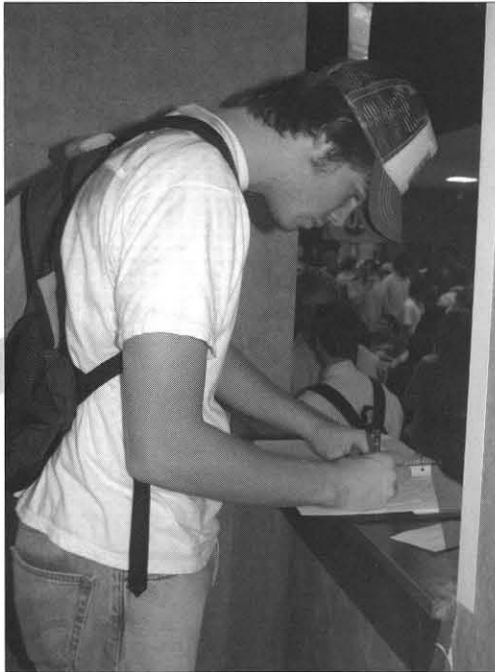

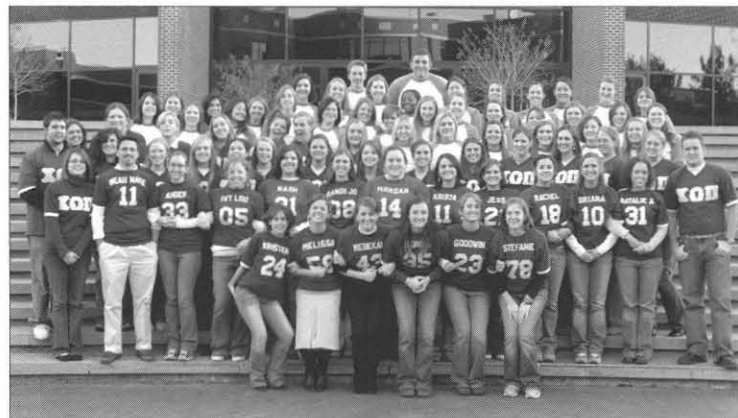

Club Week encourages unity among members

Spring 2005 brought changes to the club process. Inductees and class-two members were obsolete terms. Instead of students becoming club members after completing Club Week, new members were ushered into clubs on Bid Day.

Dustin Vyders, director of student life, said Club Week replaced Induction Week to encourage respect and unity.

"In the minds of freshmen, the fact that they have been working so hard to gain the trust and friendships of all the people in the club [combined] with the fact that you picked them is huge," Vyders said. "You've earned their respect, and they've earned yours. Respect is the bigger picture.

Senior Jeff Fowler, president of TNT, said in May 2005, that most clubs were worried about traditions prior to the Club Week change.

"I think a lot of clubs are very worried about tradition," Fowler said. "We're looking at how we can adapt those traditions.

Dr. David Collins, vice president for student services, said the changes were to reflect the Christian atmosphere.

"It just didn't make sense the way it was: Be mean all week to someone, and turn around and love them at the end," Collins said.

Collins said the changes were put in place to mirror the club process used in other schools across the country.

"Most state schools do it this way, with a drawn-out visitation process, then a rush or club week," Collins said.

Even though there were changes to the process, new members were still required to complete certain activities during Club Week. Talent shows, cookouts, club

books and wearing club colors developed into the daily routine for the new members of the social clubs.

Among the new members who accepted their bids was senior John Rachels, who joined TNT.

"I knew from the start that I wanted to join TNT," Rachels said. "It was hard at first because I was a transfer, and I didn't know what [Club] Week was all about, but after the first day, it was easy to get the hang of."

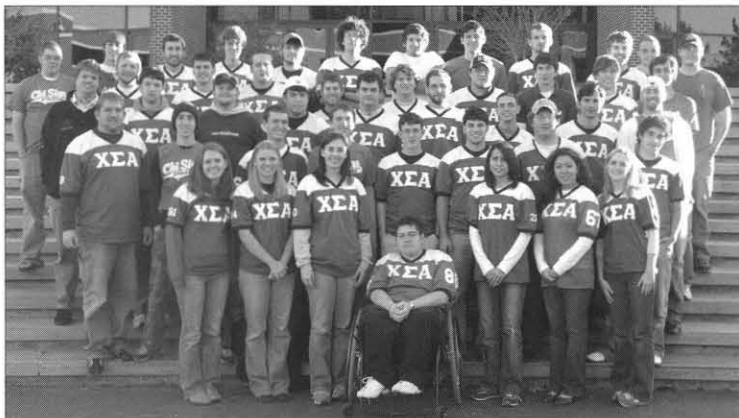
The social club process changes offered new members the opportunity to get better acquainted.

TNT had their new members complete tasks to encourage learning about each other as well as the history of the club they were joining.

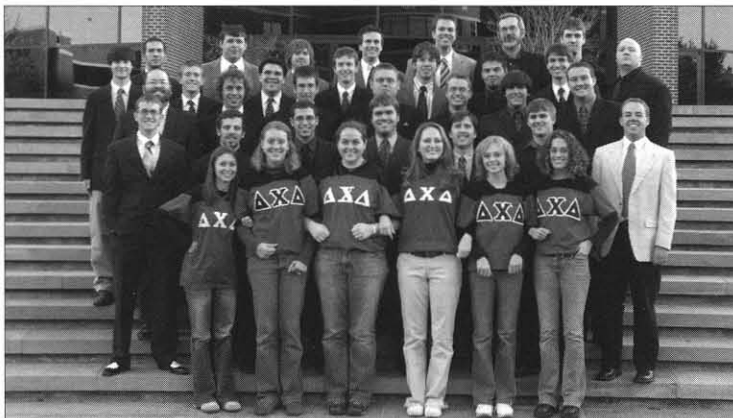

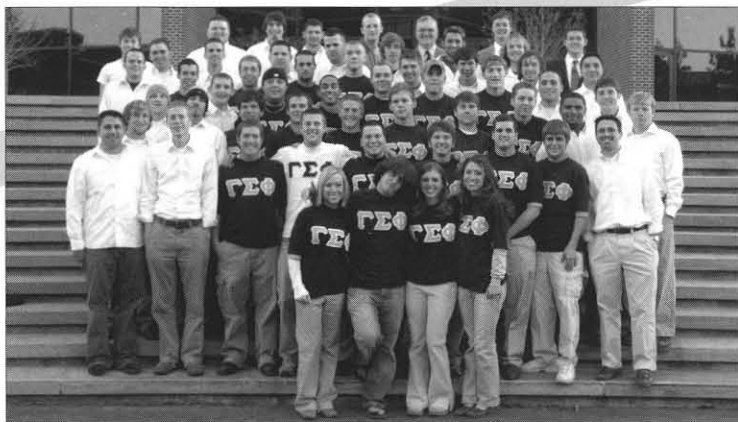

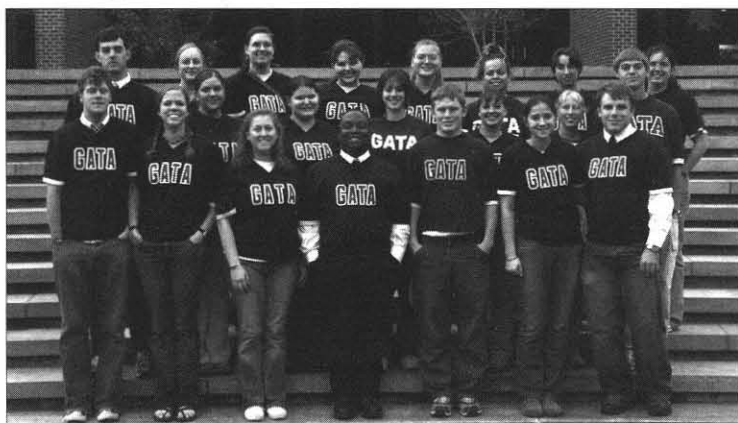

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Chi Sigma Alpha president senior Mike Parsons said despite the differences from his first club experience, the new members still gained the closeness that came from the process.

"I know a lot of clubs were scared that new members would have bad attitudes," Glover said. "Like they would just blow everything off because they were already in the club, but I didn't see any of that."

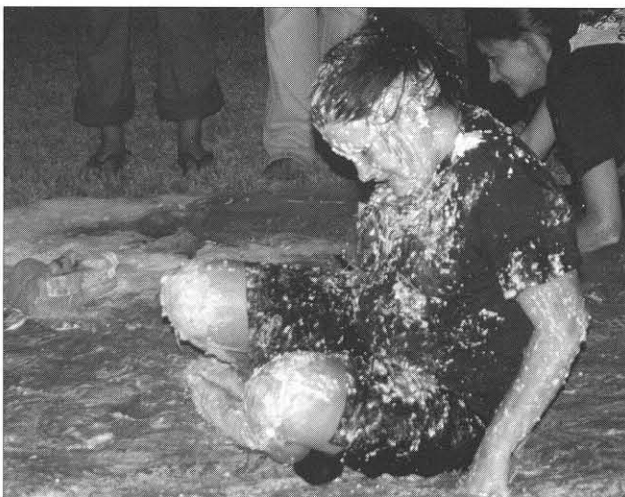
Glover said, contrary to the worries of many of her peers, the new members of the club were closer than in years past.

Junior Nick Prosser, TNT vice president, said he was worried about the changes, but in the end the changes turned out well.

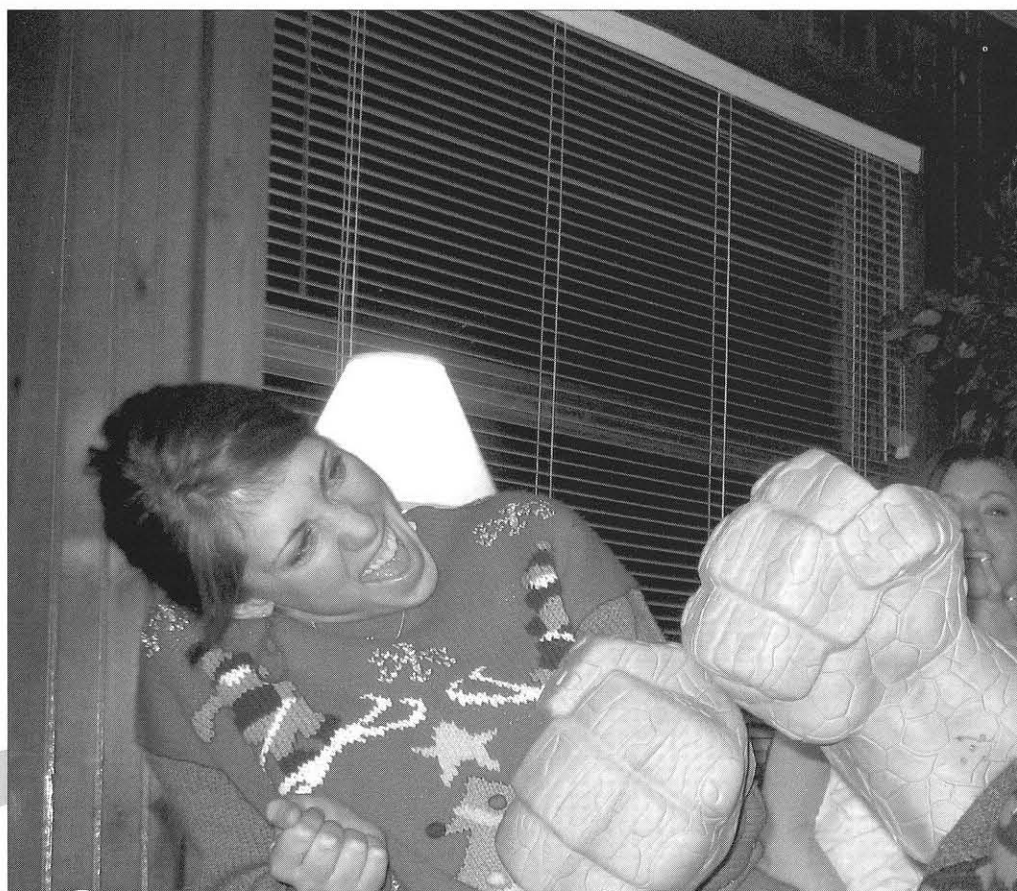
"It was hard not to keep tradition," Prosser said. "We've done it the same way for many years. But change is good sometimes because we learned different ways to keep the club together."

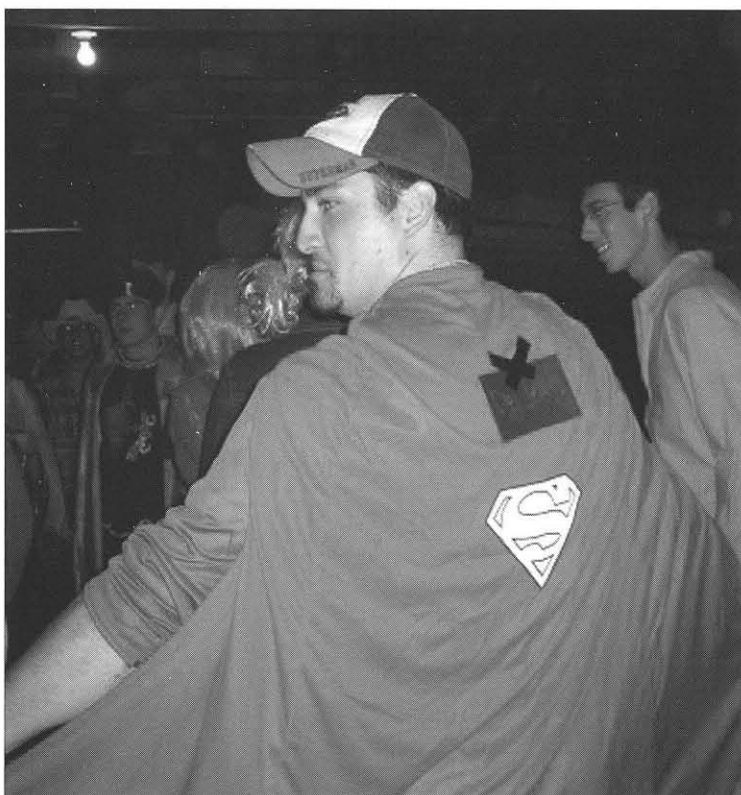
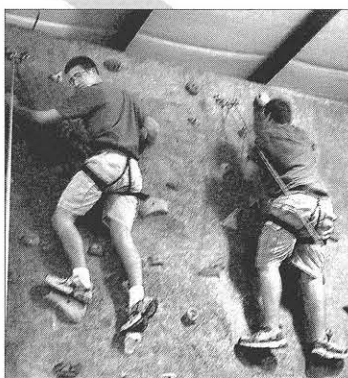

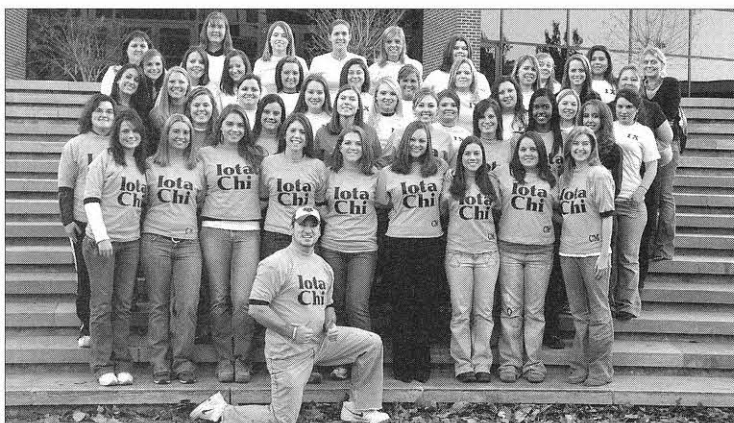

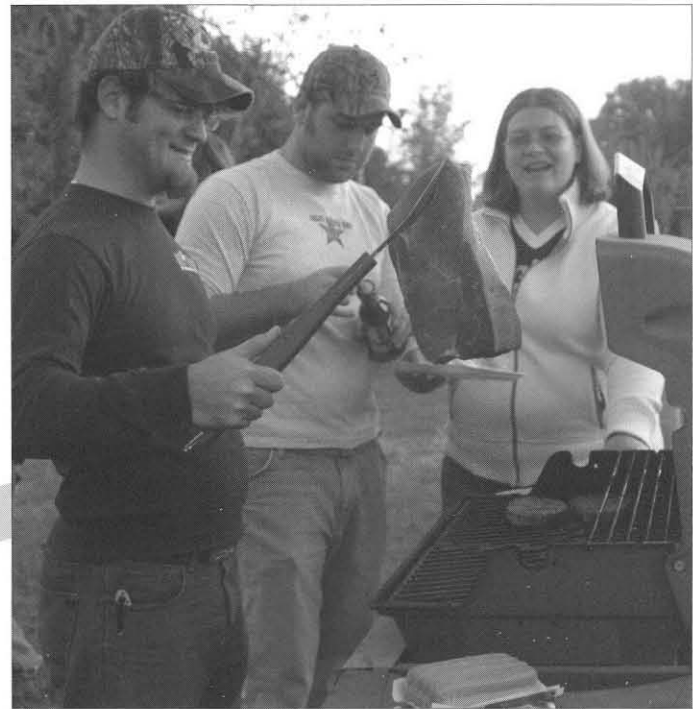

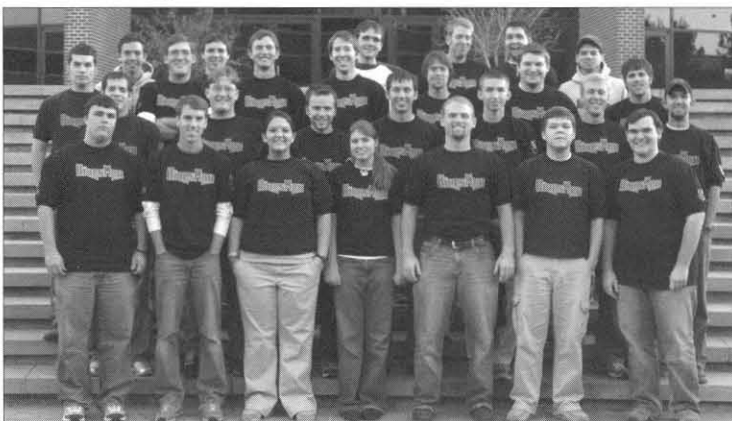

"We are friends and brothers in Christ before we are club members," Sofio said. "Red Meat just happens to prove that."

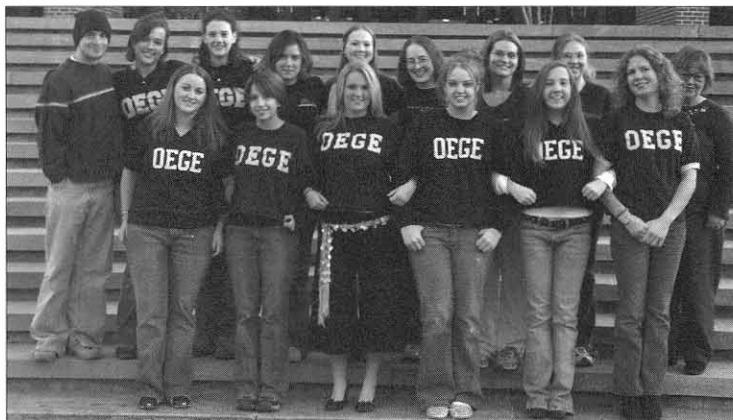

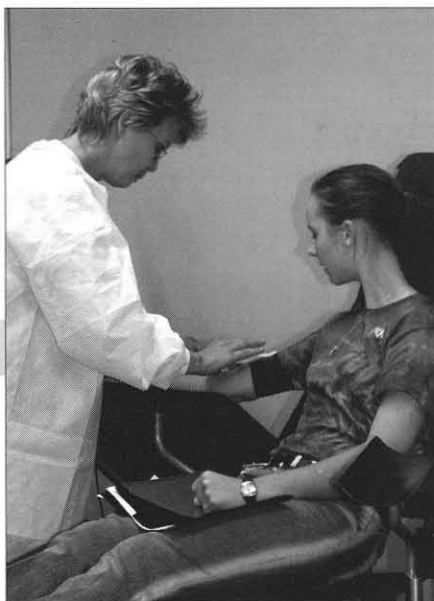

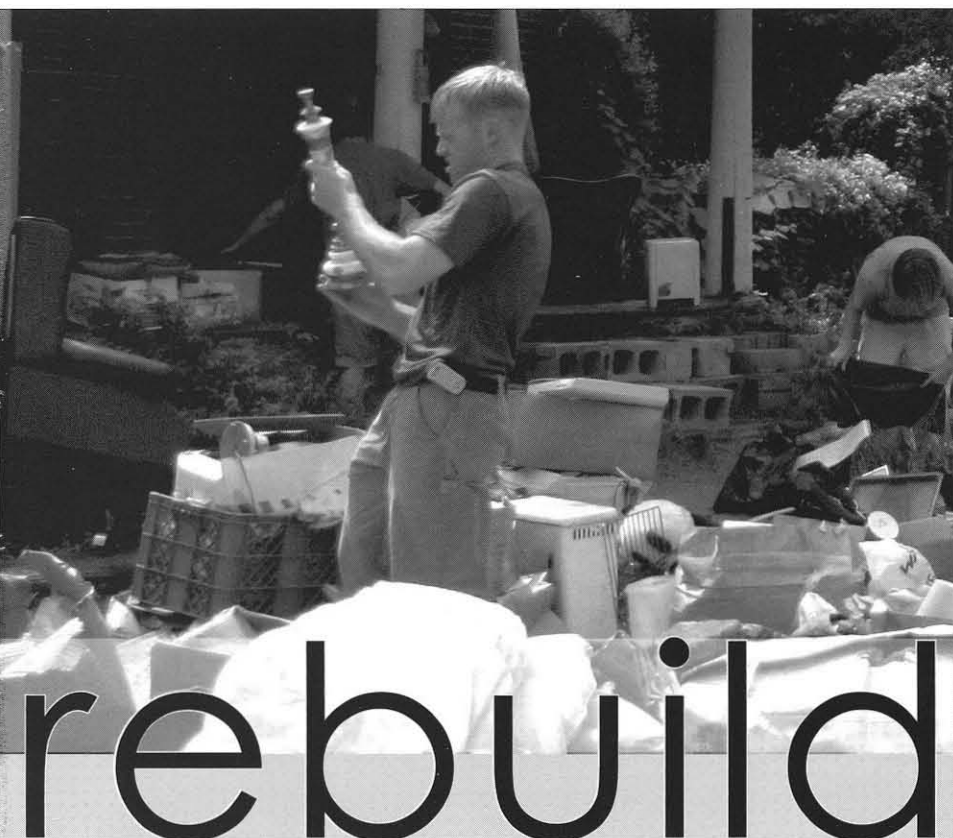

Social club makes over local woman's home

When he was elected service project director for Gamma Sigma Phi in spring 2005, sophomore Ross Kellis never imagined how much dedication his new position would require.

Kellis said he decided to take the club's service projects in a new direction; he wanted the club to touch someone's life. He called local churches, after being elected, and talked to people outside of the Harding community to see who needed a helping hand.

When David Mathews, Downtown Church of Christ minister, introduced him to a local single, working mother, Kellis learned her story of heartache and need and said he knew this would be his calling for his next three years as a student.

"There are a lot of things our club can do," Kellis said. "This is such a perfect opportunity to minister."

The woman's home was old, filled with unneeded items, lacked heating and insulation and had mildew problems. It was a home that had been in her family for generations, but because of health code violations, she and her 12-year-old son would not be able to stay there in the winter.

Ross said, although she was handicapped and had declared bankruptcy, the woman's spirit was still strong.

Gamma Sigma Phi took on the project, and although some members said they realized it was not going to be an easy task, it was a chance to extend a bridge between the citizens of Searcy and many students.

"With this new service project, Gamma Sigma Phi wants to hold ourselves to a higher standard," senior Trent Floyd, Gamma Sigma Phi member, said. "We want to try to give back to the community in a way that they can see

that we actually care and aren't just trying to do something for looks."

Through Gamma Sigma Phi's dedication, the project reached out from the club members and connected with the National Guard, Concerned Citizens for a Better Community and Searcy Living magazine. Kellis said he wanted those organizations to do what they could to donate not only to the woman's home, but to help restore broken, run-down communities throughout Searcy.

"You restore what's broken, like the buildings, and then you restore the people who are broken," Ross said. "There is a big gap between poor people and Harding students. To them this is bigger than even I believe it is. The future is very bright, and the time is now. It takes getting people together, and I'm blessed to be a part of this. I really feel like it's God's plan."

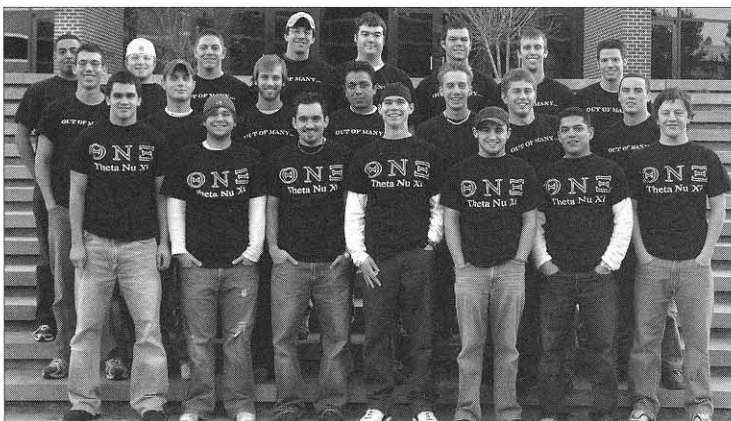

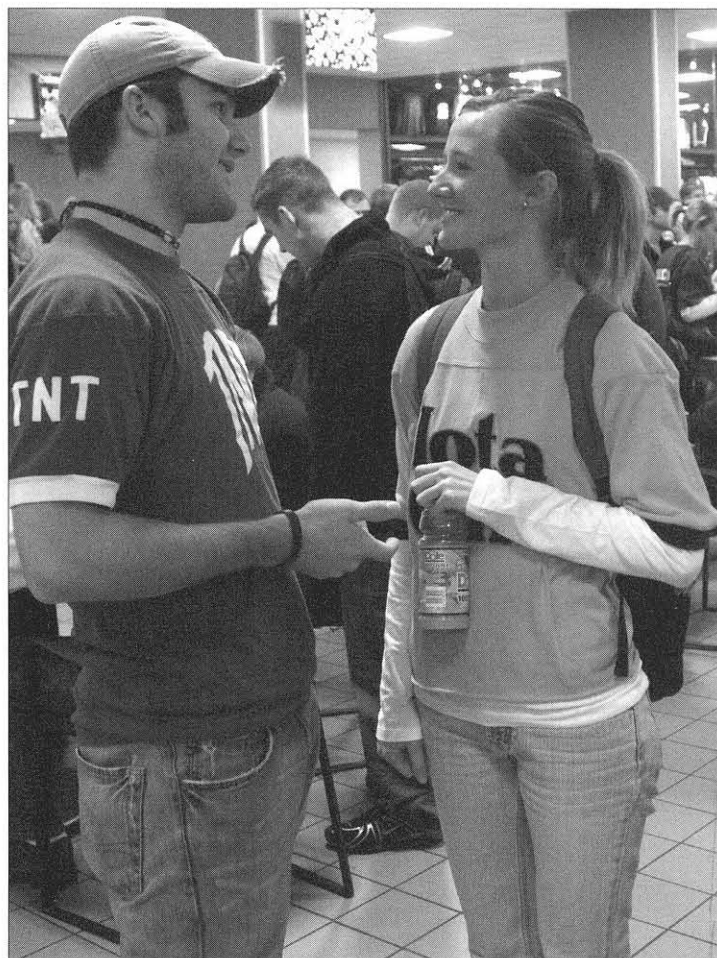

During the 2005-2006 academic year, social clubs remained a visible and active presence on campus, old clubs continued traditions while new clubs made history.

Seven new clubs were added into the social club community in three years. According to Dustin Vyers, director of student life, more than half of the students were club members after the Club Week activities.

The high percentage of club involvement was the result many new clubs were hoping for.

"There just weren't enough girls' clubs," junior Katherine Mitchell, Iota Chi charter member, said. "We thought other clubs were great but we knew there was something missing."

Chartered in 2005, Iota Chi members said they believed the women who wanted to become club members would appreciate and respond to another option.

"There needed to be more because there were so many [women who] didn't get into clubs," junior Amy Bingman, Iota Chi charter member, said. "You couldn't put your finger on what was missing, but there was a void."

Founding members of the men's club Chi Lambda Chi said they agreed there was a need for

more diversity among social clubs on campus.

"We were really anxious and afraid at the same time," senior Brad Turpin, founding member of Chi Lambda Chi, said. "None of the clubs on campus really seemed to fit us."

The women of Pi Theta Phi, chartered 2004, said they hoped to create a social club that would appeal to women in a different way.

"We wanted to start a new [women's] club," junior Laura Jernigan, charter member of Pi Theta Phi, said. "We wanted it to be a service-oriented club."

Throughout the year, new clubs began to establish traditions and became involved with various campus and community activities.

For the first time, members of Iota Chi participated in Spring Sing 2006, along with Gamma Sigma Phi. Bingman, Spring Sing director of the club, said she hoped the union of these two clubs during the show would become a tradition for Iota Chi.

Many clubs also chose to create new customs through functions and other activities.

Theta Nu Xi, chartered in 2005, planned a river boat function in Little Rock, which members hoped to continue.

"I think that's going to become one of our traditions," senior Charlie Hardage, charter member of Theta Nu Xi, said.

Pi Theta Phi also had a function that became a tradition.

"We have our messy function every fall," Jernigan said.
