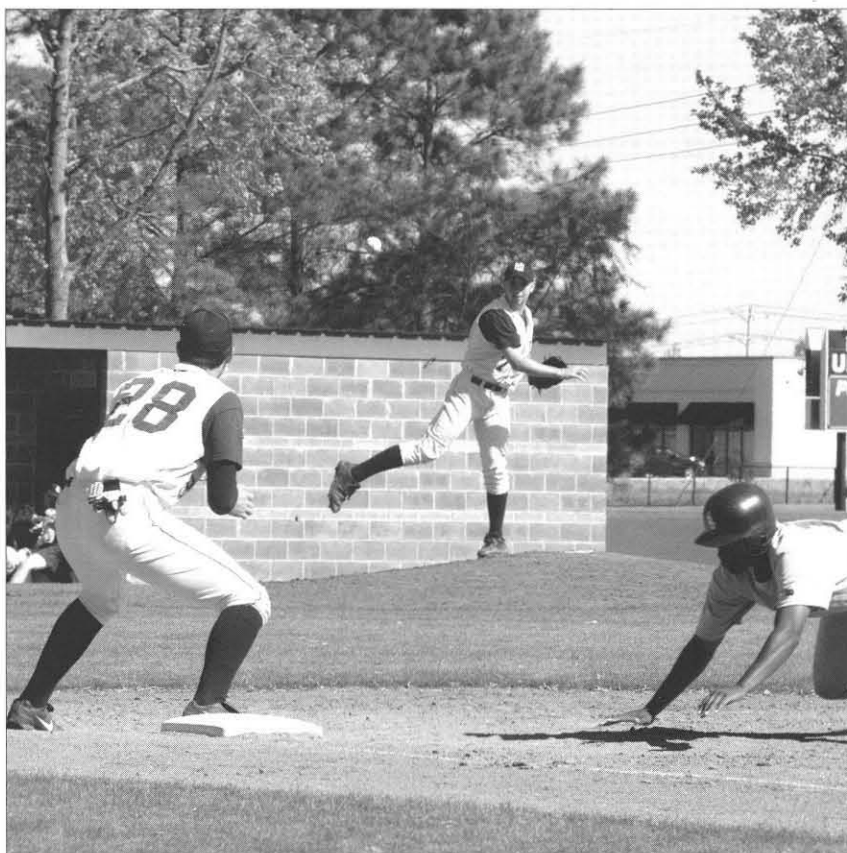

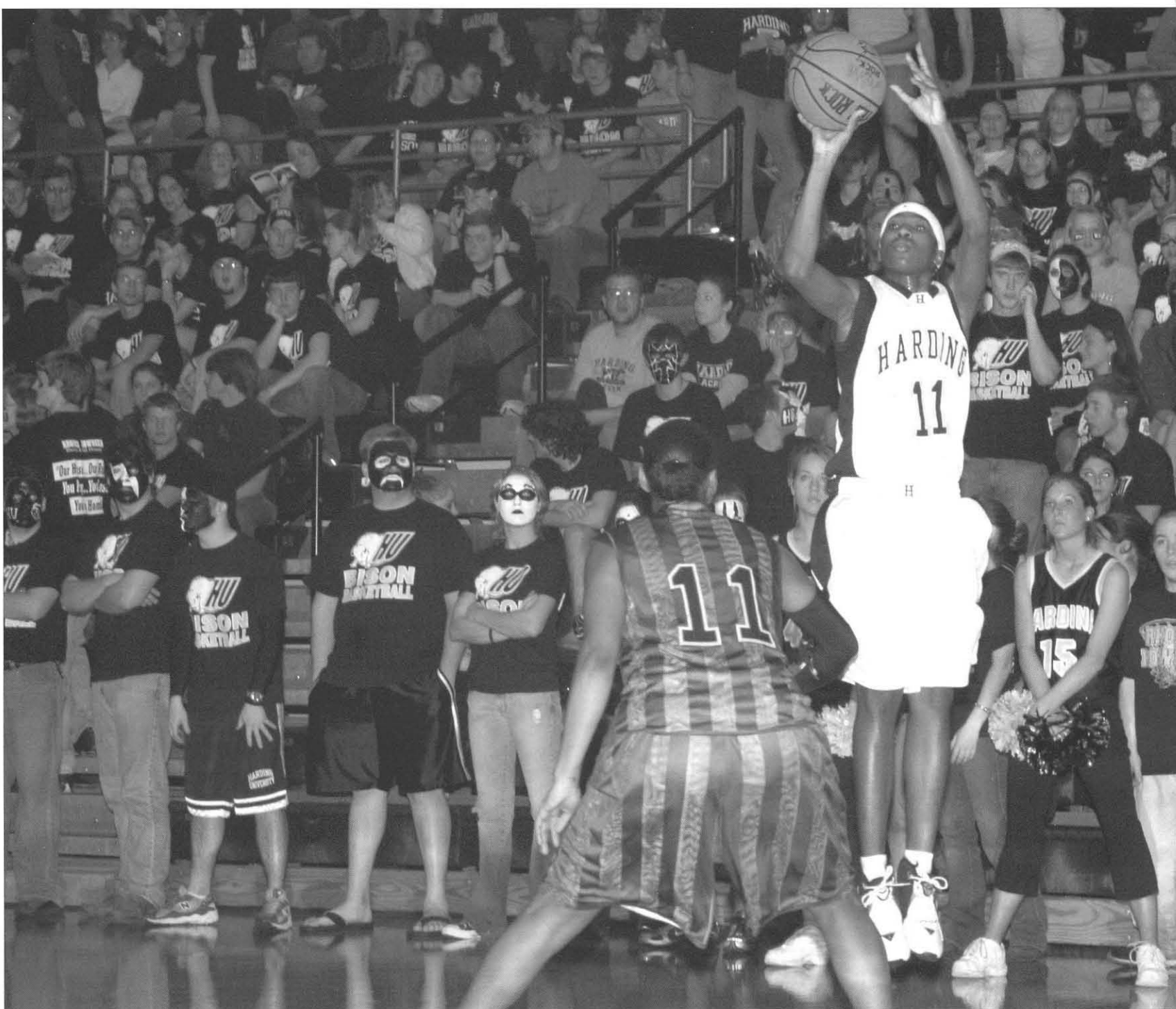

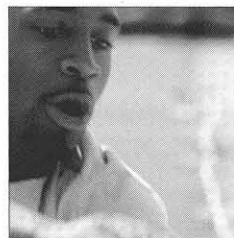
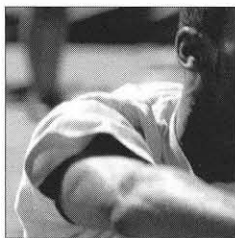

Bisons prevail in finish-line victories

Three hours a day, six days a week was the practice schedule for the track team this season. Eighteen hours of practice mixed with a full schedule of classes and finding time to sleep and eat made for a busy semester for the Harding 2005 track team.

The season began in the middle of January with indoor track and ended in early March 2005. The team averaged four indoor track meets a season besides nationals.

Three women qualified for indoor nationals in the 5,000-meter race. The four-woman distance medley team of senior Janet Kogo, juniors Tessa Tarole and Kalina Szteyn, and freshman Gosia Drazkowska also qualified.

Kogo won the national championship title in the 5,000-meter race, which made her Harding's first three-time national champion. She was also named the National South Region Indoor Runner of the Year.

The women's team finished with five All-American titles at the national indoor meet.

The men's distance medley team of sophomores Artur Kern and Przemyslaw Bobrowski and seniors James Mason and Reed Fisher finished third in the National Championship.

Sophomore Julius Kosgei finished fifth in the 5,000-

meter race and earned an All-American title.

There were six outdoor meets in the season before the National Championship in Abilene, Texas. Kogo won the 5,000- and the 10,000-meter races at the national championship, making her a three-time National Champion. Overall, the women's team finished 12th in the country.

Combined, there were 15 new records for track.

Sophomore Will Ellis, a distance runner for the track team, said the work and time was worth it when he crossed the finish line.

"When you cross the finish line and know that you left every single ounce of your energy all over that track and see the clock at a time you never imagined being able to run, there is nothing like that in the world," Ellis said.

The grade point average for both teams was above 3.41, making both teams Academic All-Americans. Five members of the team qualified for this award individually.

"I have a really great group," Coach Steve Guymon said. "I tell coaches our sport is their punishment, everybody uses running for a punishment; that's what we do for a living."

Final season for Bison coach a struggle

Shane Fullerton's last year as head baseball coach was a season plagued with the injury of several key players and some difficult losses.

"There were some games we didn't produce and some games we just didn't produce enough to pull off a win," Fullerton said. "We also had a lot of tough injury problems, but our guys stayed strong."

Seniors Brandon Kimbrough, Larry Lovett, Gilberto Valdez and Bobby Badger all battled various injuries during the season. Their absences caused a lot of younger players to step up and take leadership positions on and off the field.

Fullerton said the freshmen came into games without the experience that the seniors had, but they learned a lot through playing.

"We have had to put freshmen in key roles all year, which has thrown them in the fire early," Fullerton said. "But it has given them valuable game experience."

Freshman Jon David Glenn was one of the younger players who stepped up to lead the team.

"This year we looked up to the senior guys to lead the team, but at the same time, the younger guys had to pull their weight on the field," Glenn said. "We learned what good leadership was from the older guys."

Despite the injuries, the Bisons finished the season 18-33 and many of the losses were hard-fought, close battles.

"Many games in the 2005 season were very frustrating because we lost a lot of close ones," said sophomore Zach Fisher. "We had plenty of talent on the team, but sometimes couldn't pull off the wins when we needed them."

Fullerton said the team was a good hitting team, and that they became better defensively as the season continued.

"We had struggled a lot, but we [didn't] make any excuses," Fullerton said.

Fullerton resigned as baseball coach March 28, 2005, and accepted the assistant coaching position for the women's basketball team.

For the 2006 season, Dr. Patrick McGaha was named head coach. McGaha, who coached at the College of the Ozarks for the past four seasons, was a former Harding baseball player and a 1991 Harding graduate.

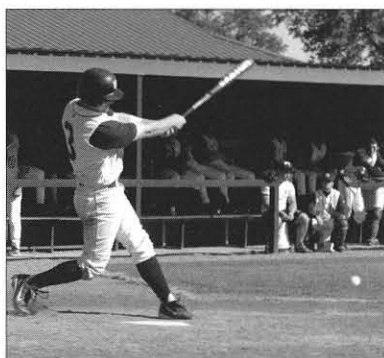
"I am very excited about this opportunity," McGaha said. "Searcy is home to me, growing up at Harding with both parents working here. It is great to inherit the program from Shane Fullerton and build on what he has done. It is really a dream job for me."

Harding sports underwent some changes this year. Among them was the addition of a women's golf team to Harding's lineup.

The addition of the team made it the seventh women's intercollegiate sport sponsored by the university. The Gulf South Conference began women's competitive golf last year, and Harding joined the conference only one year after the GSC's formation.

"We've had a lot of interest in adding a team the last few years," Athletic Director Greg Harnden said. "[Golf is] an emerging sport not only within the NCAA, but also within the GSC."

The members of the Lady Bison golf team included freshmen Vanessa Borsheim, Natalie Gay, Taren Massey and Courtney Napierala and senior Lindsay Trotter.

Head coach Andrew Baker, executive director for the Institute for Church & Family, said he believed the women's golf team would be successful in years to come.

"The goal is that we will be able to build a program that will be able to compete nationally in NCAA Division II women's golf," Baker said.

The Lady Bisons began their practices on Sept. 12 with much anticipation about the upcoming season.

The team practiced three to four times a week at one of their two home courses: the Searcy Country Club and the course at River Oaks. The Lady Bisons competed in

the Lyon College Duel Match, the Oklahoma City Red Rooster Fall Invitational, Lady Indian Classic and the Christian Brothers University Fall Invitational.

The Lyon College Duel Match Sept. 29 brought the Lady Bisons a first-place finish over Lyon College, with an overall score of 398.

However, the rest of the matches did not go as well for the Lady Bisons.

The team placed 10th out of 12 teams in the Red Rooster Invitational Oct. 5 with a score of 750 and a stroke of 182 above par. One week later, Oct. 12, at the Lady Indian Classic at Sage Meadows in Jonesboro, Ark., Massey tied for 51st place out of 85 players, swinging 166 above par. The team as a whole placed 15th out of 15 teams.

In two rounds of play at the Christian Brothers University Fall Invitational in Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 26, the Lady Bisons could not revive their season, coming in third out of four teams, with 205 above par and an overall score of 765.

Although struggles came along the way this inaugural season, the women hoped for improvement in the near future.

"We didn't do as well as we liked, but we got good experience," Massey said. "We learned a lot, and Mr. Baker is enthusiastic about getting better. It's a big honor to play on the first team."

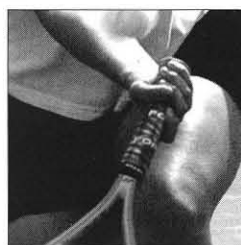
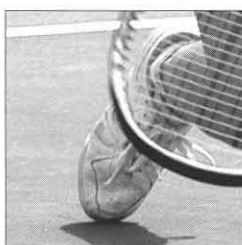


Junior Claudia Chisaca returns the ball during practice March 30, 2005. Chisaca was 16-8 overall for the season.

Tennis team finishes season strong

In the 2004-2005 season, the Lady Bison tennis team experienced a few setbacks. Injuries and ineligibility left the team without the presence of several players at the NCAA Division II South Regional tournament in Valdosta, Ga., May 5. Three walk-on players represented the team in play.

The Lady Bisons fell to #3 Valdosta State, 5-0, in the tournament. In singles competition, Valdosta State's Annika Biro defeated Harding's Karina Gomes, 6-1, 6-0. Lady Bison Maria Hernandez then fell to Valdosta State's Marina Galey, 6-0, 6-0.

All three doubles teams lost to Valdosta State in the tournament.

While injuries caused a roster shuffle, the team stayed committed and finished the season 18-13 overall.

Junior Catherine Carui said she saw a positive aspect of the team's presence at the tournament. The team did not go to the tournament before this year, and Carui said she was happy they made it.

Head coach David Elliott said, overall, the season was fruitful for the Lady Bisons.

"We had a really good year, and we had two of our top six players before we started," Elliott said. "We felt like we had a very successful season."

Throughout the progression of the season, Carui said there were improvements and team building throughout the season.

"We are always together," Carui said. "We are friends. We know that not all teams are like that."

Freshman Linnea Jordan also said unity was a key factor to the team's overall success.

"I feel like we played well, and we grew together as a team," Jordan said.

Jordan said the team lost one player to graduation for the 2006 season and gained three freshmen. She hoped to make it back to the tournament spring 2006.

Carui said she had hope that the team's improvement would continue.

"This semester we've improved a lot and I'm pretty sure we are going to be better," Carui said. "We are getting stronger."

42-year winning tradition continues

In the spring of 2005, the Bison tennis team earned a spot in the Regional Tennis Tournament in Valdosta, Ga.

The arrival was short-lived with a quick 5-0 fall May 6 to Valdosta State University, which was ranked fifth in the nation.

Since the team's beginning in 1963, the Bisons had a combined record of 823-320-4.

In 2005, the team was no exception, finishing with a 16-7 record in the NCAA Division II conference. Harding finished the season ranked third in the Gulf South West Conference, which was a well-earned feat, David Elliott, head coach, said.

Winning the Gulf South Conference was important because the Bisons wanted to at least have a chance at winning the NCAA Division II Nationals. They needed to first win the Gulf South West Conference, Elliott said.

Senior David Ferreira said it was his last chance to win a national championship and considered it an admirable opportunity.

"It is such an honor to go to the national tournament," Ferreira said. "Not many teams get the chance, and it is kind of a reward for playing well all season."

Harding took eight players to the tournament, four of which were freshmen.

"Nothing compares to nationals at the college level," fresh-

man Patrick Owens said. "It is such a rewarding experience to be able to play with athletes of this caliber."

Playing in the Gulf South Conference helped players prepare for nationals.

"We play in a tough conference," sophomore Ethan Bryant said. "A lot of the teams in the Gulf South Conference are in the nationals so we kind of have an idea of what we are up against."

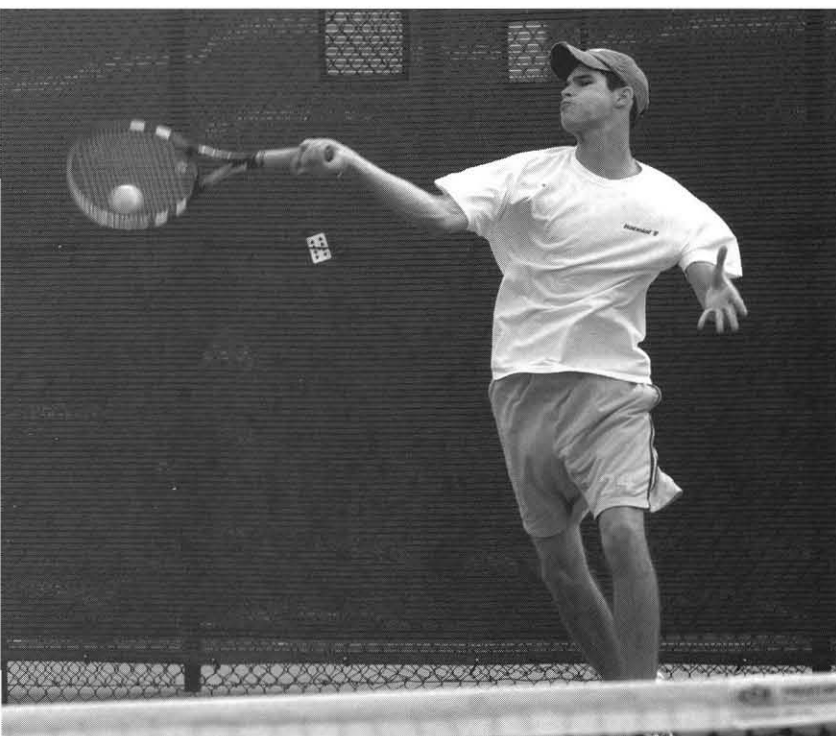
Beneath the stories of national tournaments and winning seasons was another story of consistency and longevity.

Harding tennis has been coached by one man over the past 30 years. Elliott had been a man of winning tradition for Harding tennis since the mid-'70s.

Elliott had amassed more than 700 victories and had a winning percentage of .738. In the 30 years of his coaching career at Harding, Elliott guided players through the tennis program, has seen only one losing season and continued to influence players.

"Coach [Elliott] has been through the tough matches and the easy matches and knows how to handle the teams that are not quite up to our level and how to compete against the teams that are over our level," Bryant said. "He is a real classy guy."

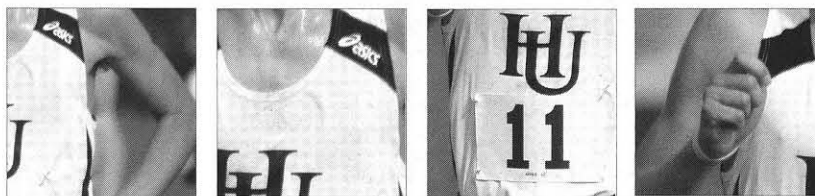

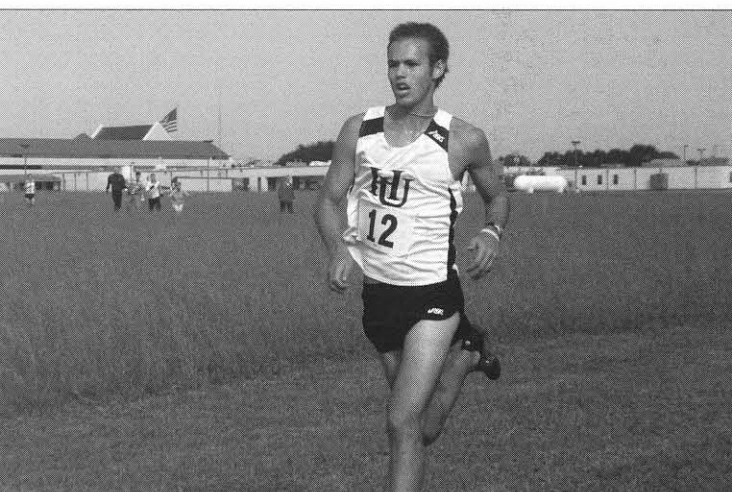

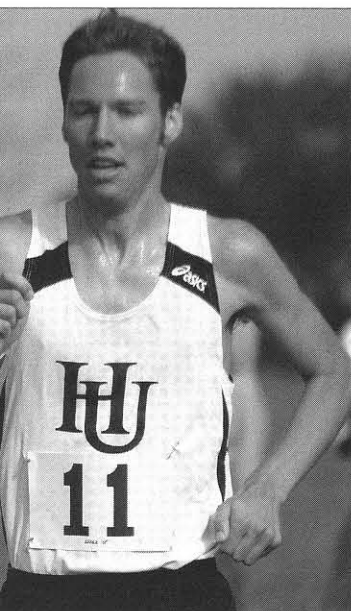

NCAA Division II cross country coaches lived in the shadow of Harding University's cross country Coach Steve Guymon, who won both the men's and women's Coach of the Year Award for his fourth consecutive year.

Guymon, who had been the coach since 2002, was the fifth coach in Gulf South Conference history to win the awards four times.

"Receiving this honor is such a humbling experience," Guymon said. "I can honestly say that if I did not have such great athletes to work with, none of these honors would be reality. The teams are so wonderful, and I thank them for all the honors I receive on their behalf."

Both the men's and women's Coach of the Year awards were determined by a voting of all the coaches involved in the NCAA Division II South Regional Championship.

The awards had become a six-year tradition for Harding cross country as former coach Bryan Phillips, associate professor of kinesiology, won the awards in 2000 and 2001.

Guymon was the third track and field and cross country coach at Harding, and he said that being one of the few to coach for the program was honorable.

He said he often went to former coaches for advice and appreciated their support.

"I look to the two previous coaches [Ted Lloyd and Phillips] for guidance and questions," Guymon said. "[They] are still around the Searcy area, and it is so nice to be able to talk with them and gain knowledge from their experience."

In addition to leading the Bisons to a sixth-place ranking in their division, the runners said that Guymon always made it a point to keep God in his winning picture.

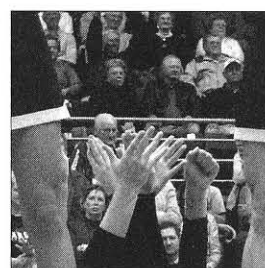
"The best thing about Coach Guymon is that he focuses so much on our spiritual life," junior T.J. Davidson, men's cross country runner, said. "He strives every day to put a special emphasis on our prayer life and makes sure that we look to God for guidance."

The 2005 Harding women's team was ranked ninth in their division going into the nationals and had accumulated their fourth GSC title. The win ended a two-year championship run for Alabama-Huntsville. Junior Jessica Fisher said Guymon helped the team with more than just winning.

"Coach pushes us to be the best athletes we can be," Fisher said. "While at the same time, caring for us as more than just runners."

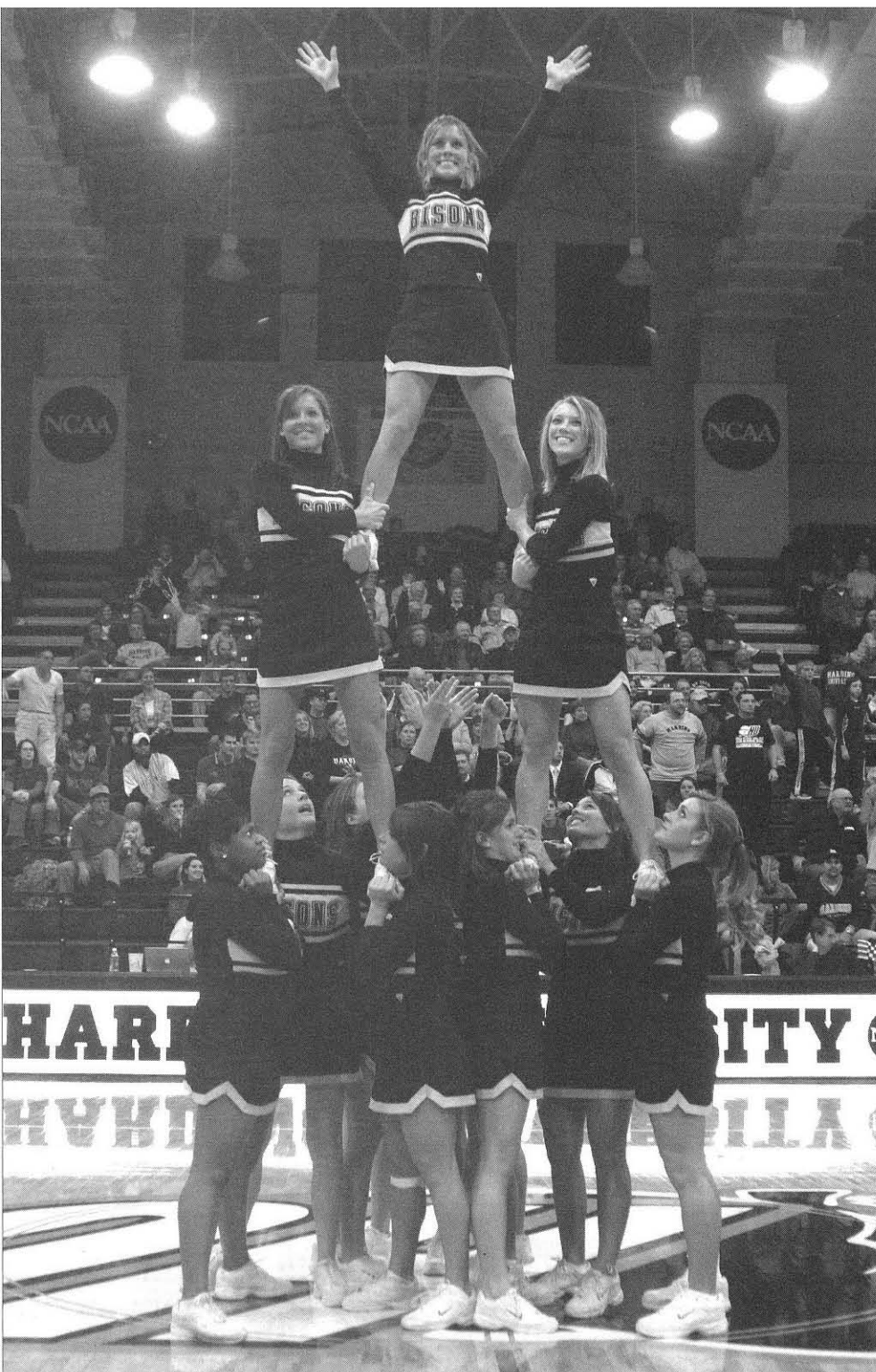

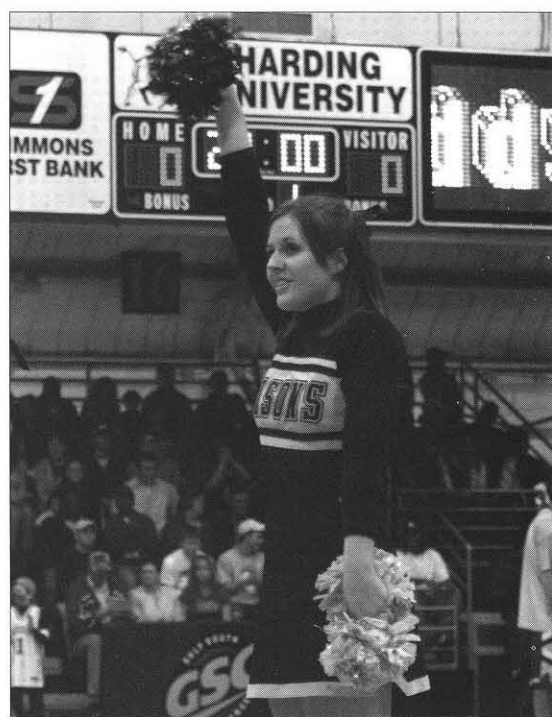

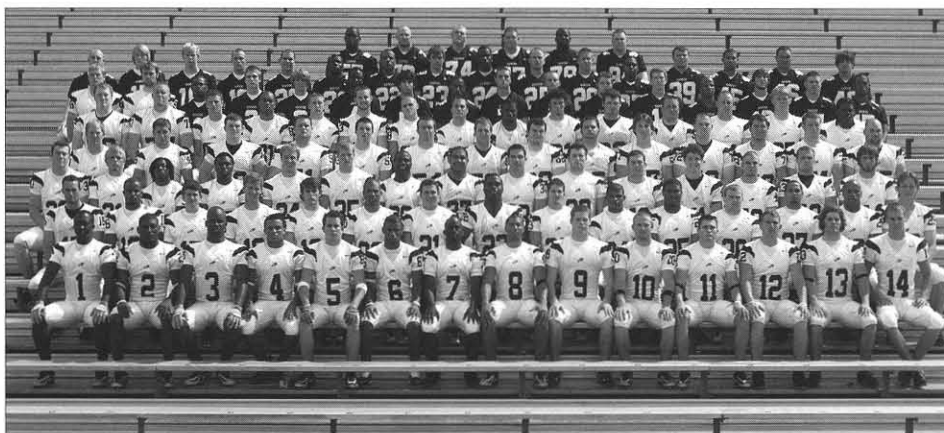

Bisons defeat Valdosta Blazers

One of the biggest upsets for a visiting team in Harding sports occurred when the Bisons defeated the Division II number one-ranked Valdosta State at First Security Stadium Sept. 17. The Bisons won the game 16-13 on a 38-yard field goal in overtime by senior kicker Ben Davis.

The score was tied at 13, and the Valdosta State Blazers got the first possession going into overtime. On the third play of the Blazers' drive, junior free safety Reggie Knighton caused a fumble, which was recovered by senior linebacker Steve Brown. The Bisons had their chance to score.

After gaining four yards in two rushing plays, and an incomplete pass on the third down, the kicking team was sent on the field. The 38-yard field goal by Davis was good. Fans rushed the field as if the Bisons had won the National Championship.

"I won a state championship in high school, and this win was much bigger than that," sophomore guard Jared Wilson said. "It was an indescribable feeling. It was one of the most intense games that I have ever played. The win probably won't sink in for months to come."

The Blazers were on a 16-game winning streak and had not lost a conference road game in six years. The Bisons' victory over Valdosta State was Harding's first win against a

number one-ranked opponent in school history.

The Bisons had met Valdosta State three times in the previous five years. In the first two meetings between the teams, the Blazers won.

"The first time we played Valdosta State in 2001, it was like playing a [professional football] team," senior wide receiver Joe Price said. "This year when we beat them in overtime, it was like beating your big brother. Our team had grown, and finally reached the level that we all knew we could achieve."

Junior tight end Gray Yates said the victory, though sweet, came at the price of exhaustion.

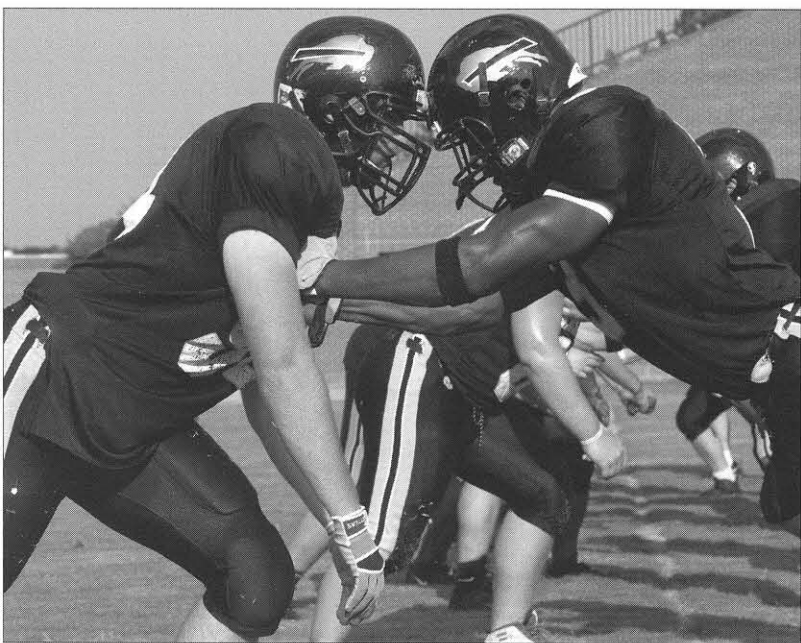
"We left everything on the field that night," Yates said. "We were drained both physically and emotionally."

The victory would remain a memory not only for players, but for fans as well.

"It was a surreal experience," senior Dana Altman said. "The game was so close and nerve racking, and when it was over, there were so many feelings; feelings of relief and joy mixed together. It is a game that I will always remember."

The Bisons ended the season with a 6-5 overall record and a 4-5 record in conference games.

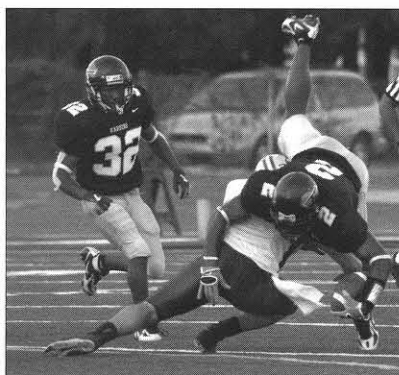

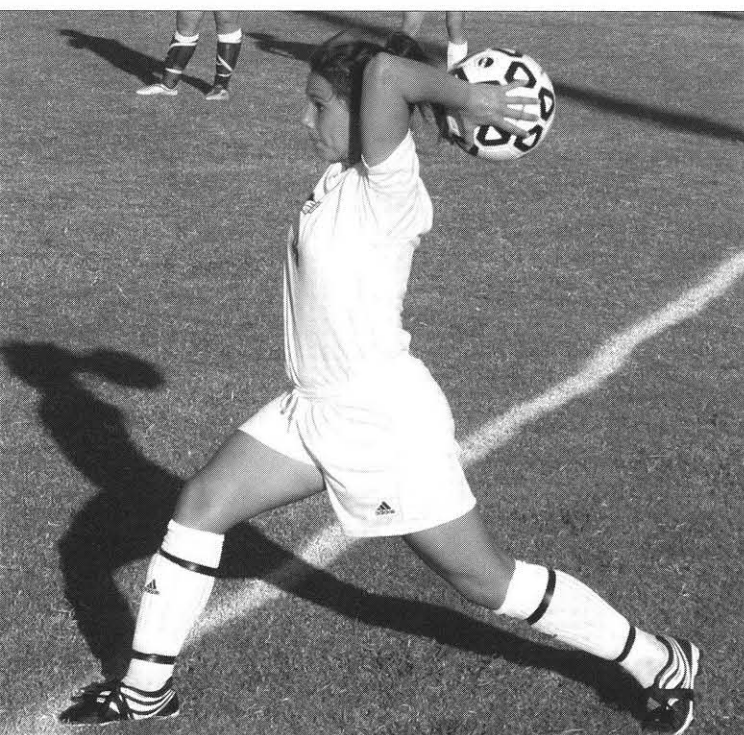

A few years before the fall of 2005, sophomore Cheryl Dovichak had never heard of Harding University.

Dovichak was playing soccer in Alberta, Canada, in high school when Greg Harris, men's and women's head soccer coach, recruited her. Harris scheduled a visit to Harding for Dovichak, and she said she immediately fell in love with the school.

"When I came for my visit, it was a beautiful campus," Dovichak said. "[When] I met some of the girls, they were just awesome. [Graduate student] Lori Boren took me to classes, and I really enjoyed it. Coach Harris was also a big inspiration in my decision to come to Harding, as well as his wife, Anissa."

Dovichak, a goal keeper, saved many points from being scored. Dovichak had 17 goal points and broke the Harding single-season saves record with 148 saves during the 2005 season. She also earned 1st Team All-Gulf South Conference honors for the second time.

"One of my goals growing up was playing college soccer and making first team all-conference," Dovichak said. "I achieved that last year, so that was very exciting."

Dovichak's success in soccer was a dream that was almost lost forever in October 2003.

Dovichak had Wolfe-Parkinson-White syndrome, which resulted from an additional electrical connection between the atria and the ventricles of her heart. During surgery to correct the syndrome, Dovichak twitched, and her A-V nodes were burned, causing a third-degree heart block.

Doctors told Dovichak that she would

never play soccer again. A few months later, doctors told her that if she wanted to play again, she could get a pacemaker. Dovichak had been devastated when hearing the news of never playing again, so she agreed to the surgery. One year later, she was the starting goal keeper as a freshman at Harding University.

After her first year, Dovichak was second in career saves, saves per game (5.85), wins and shutouts. Her sophomore year brought improvement with 8.71 saves per game and 22 career victories. Dovichak was the conference's top goal keeper in 2005 and ranked ninth in the NCAA II.

Through the help of her teammates, Dovichak was able to experience a tournament during her freshman year.

"The conference tournament was one of my favorite memories at Harding," Dovichak said. "We got to go down to Florida, which was exciting because I had never been to the beach before. We got to go see the [Dallas] Mavericks play the [Miami] Heat in Miami. It was fun being down there with all the girls."

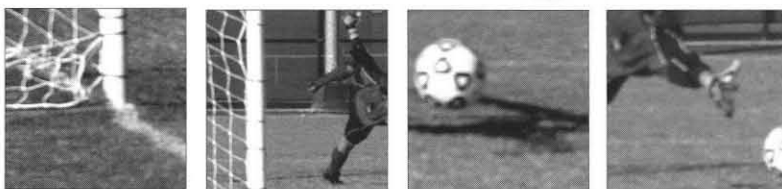
Dovichak said she really enjoyed playing on the Harding team and under Harris.

"Coach Harris is one of the best coaches I have ever had, on and off the field. He is a lot of fun and brings a good mood to the team," Dovichak said. "And the girls are awesome. I have never had a sister, but playing with these girls is like having 21 sisters. We are very close, and always have inside jokes, so it makes it a lot of fun."

The team finished 8-9-1 overall this season, with a 5-5 record in conference play.

Recovering player breaks records

Though an injury kept him from playing seven of the 17 games in the 2004 Bison soccer season, senior Ben Faris came back in the 2005 season and managed to break Harding's all-time goal and point record.

Faris, Bisons forward, completed his Harding career as the Bisons' all-time leader with 41 goals, 96 points and three All-Gulf South Conference honors.

Faris earned 2nd Team All-Gulf South Conference honors Nov. 9, when the league released its postseason awards.

"I feel so blessed about all that has happened to me while here at Harding," Faris said. "I really wasn't expecting this much success in soccer."

Faris said he was grateful for his Harding experience.

"I [am] glad to have played four years of soccer here at Harding. I wouldn't change it for anything," Faris said. "All that I accomplished here was everything I wanted it to be."

His junior year at Harding, Faris was injured during a game against Ouachita Baptist University and had a bone contusion to his shin, which caused tissue damage and kept him from playing soccer from September through October of 2004.

"That was definitely the toughest time for me here," Faris said. "Not being able to play and just watch the games was really hard."

Coach Greg Harris said it was difficult for the team to see their forward down.

"It was sad to see him on the bench instead of on the field," Harris said. "But we knew that he was going to be OK and that he was going to play again soon."

Faris said soccer had been a part of his life for many years, but that he did not plan on continuing the sport after leaving Harding.

"I've been playing since I was 9 years old and I've never missed a season. I can't believe it has come to an end," Faris said. "I know I'm not going to pursue soccer to the next level after college."

During Faris' years at Harding, he said he felt like the team had developed into a family for him.

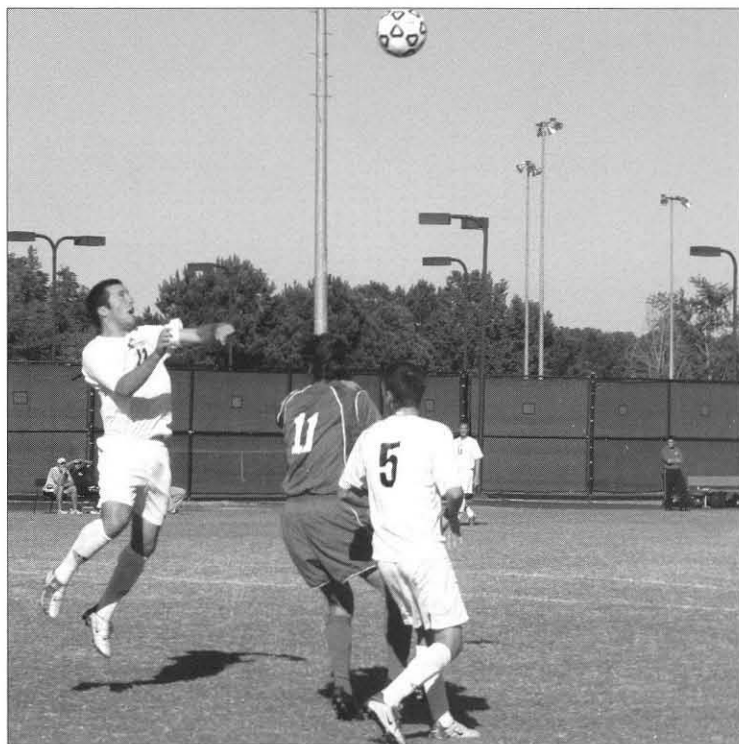

The Harding men's soccer season came to an end Dec. 2 playing Central Arkansas University.

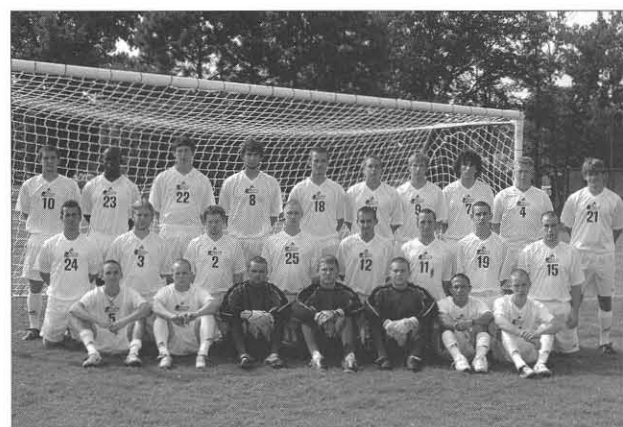
The Bisons ended their season with a 3-12-1 overall record and a 1-6-1 mark in Gulf South Conference play.

The atmosphere the BVF brought to volleyball games was something the players appreciated.

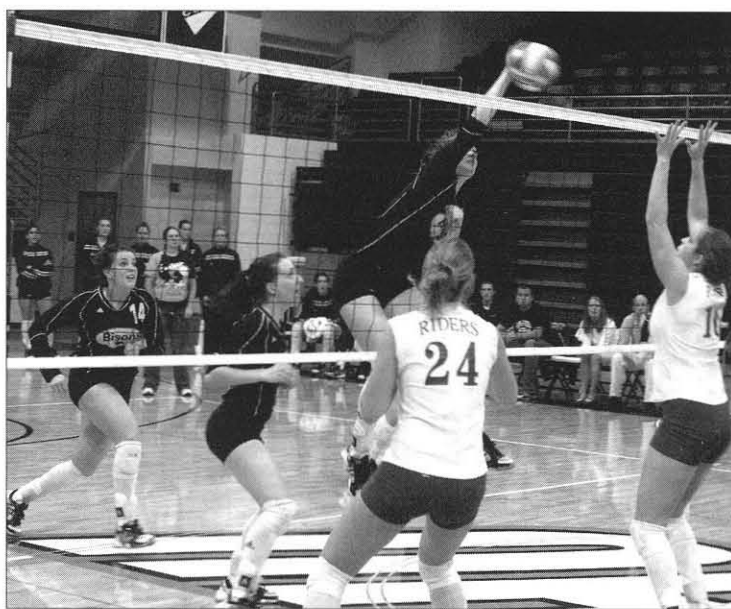

New coach enforces intensity

The school year brought transition for more than one athletic team as the baseball and men's basketball teams both lost coaches and the women's basketball team gained two.

Instead of reporting to Jerry Moore field, Shane Fullerton, former head baseball coach, went to the Rhodes Field House, as the assistant women's basketball coach each morning where he shared a space with Tim Kirby, head women's basketball coach and former assistant men's basketball coach.

"The transition [from baseball to basketball] was a big one, but it was exciting," Fullerton said. "Everything about it was positive."

Fullerton, who coached the baseball team for nine years, switched to basketball after Kirby approached him about the possibility.

"[Kirby] came in my office looking for an assistant, and at first I didn't know if he was serious," Fullerton said. "Getting to work with him was a big attraction to the job. There hasn't been a day where I've woken up in the morning and haven't said, 'Man I can't wait to go to work today.'"

Kirby said he hired Fullerton because of his previous experience in coaching.

"He's somebody we felt like had a good background in basketball as well as having the head coaching experience," Kirby said. "That brings a lot of things we need here, recruiting, dealing with players, organization skills. It's probably the best decision I've made [as coach]."

Fullerton said his father was a basketball coach when he grew up so the switch from baseball was more like a return to basketball. Although there were differences in the two sports, Fullerton said he still felt comfortable in his position.

"Coaching is still coaching," Fullerton said. "The same principles are at work in both sports."

Though he didn't switch sports, Kirby said he still had to adjust to coaching women.

"Coaching [women] has been fun," Kirby said.

"We're enjoying it. I haven't changed a whole lot from what I did with the guys. We're treating them all the same. I think we've had a year where we've learned a whole lot, coaches and players."

Kirby said having the same practices as the men helped the program.

"We try and make [the practices] intense, try and make them as competitive as possible," Kirby said. "We joke around that if people scout the guys and want them to see them play, they can watch the [women] play because we try and run the same things offensively and have the same defensive mentality. It's one of the things we feel has been successful for the [women]."

Junior guard Jana Pearson said the new coaching staff helped the team both mentally and physically.

"The coaches did amazing," Pearson said. "Sometimes they pushed the team like we were boys, but I think we needed it. They helped us improve mentally; from hoping we could win to knowing we could."

The Lady Bisons ended the season with a 12-16 overall record and had a 4-12 Gulf South Conference record.

"[The season] didn't go quite as well as we hoped, but we saw a lot of improvement," Pearson. "It may not have been in the record books, but I think we took a big step in the right direction."

Kirby said although the team lost many close games, such as the Jan. 19 Christian Brothers game with a final score of 63-66 or the Jan. 28 Henderson State game with a final score of 72-73, he and Fullerton were pleased with how the team did.

"We won four out of five [games] at one time, and that was a major plus for our program," Kirby said. "We figured out some things in those games we weren't doing earlier. It's been a good experience."

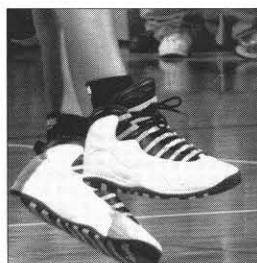
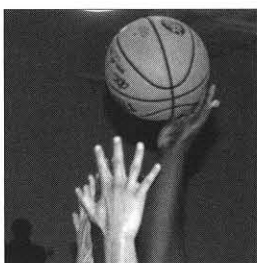

senior breaks transfer scoring record

"Incredible" was the word senior Lonnie "Money" Smith used to describe his career as a Bison. Though he only played two seasons, Smith became a fan favorite as Rhodes Rowdies waved dollar bills in the air after every three-point shot he made.

"My first year at Midnight Madness, [Head] Coach [Jeff] Morgan mentioned I had made 85 out of 100 threes one time just shooting," Smith said. "The Rhodes Rowdies came up and told me they were going to call me 'Money' from now on."

Smith, a guard from Hughes, Ark., began his career as a Bison in the fall of 2004, when he transferred from the University of Arkansas at Fort Smith.

Since transferring, Smith became one of four players in school history to score more than 500 points in two consecutive seasons. He was also third in three-pointers with 158, and has broke the record for most points scored by a junior college transfer with 1,049 points.

"[Breaking the scoring record] is a big accomplishment," Smith said. "I feel good about it. It took a lot of hard work. I was just amazed and thankful that Coach Morgan gave me the opportunity to do everything I did on the court."

Smith's heart and work ethic played a large role in his success on the court, Morgan said.

"He comes out and works extremely hard," Morgan said. "He has grown up in the gym. He just loves to play, loves to compete,

and that's what makes him so fun to coach and be around. He's one of those guys you don't worry about what he brings to practice because he just comes with a great work ethic."

At 5 feet 9 inches, 155 pounds, Smith had a reputation of hard work among his teammates.

"He never quits, down 20 up 20, he plays a 100 miles per hour trying to win," junior guard Matt Hall said. "Every day he's out there giving it all he's got, and that carries over to everyone else on the floor."

Smith, who averaged more than 30 minutes a game, stepped up to fill the hole left by Hall who sat out the season due to injury. Hall said he believed playing with Smith would have been a great combination and was disappointed to miss out on Smith's last season.

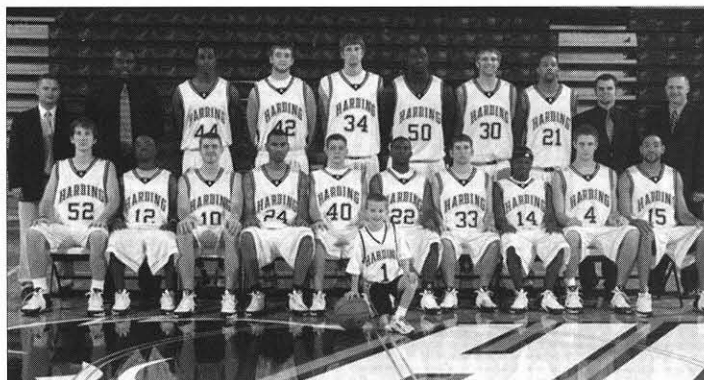
"He is the best teammate I've ever played with," Hall said. "His attitude towards basketball is outstanding, and that's what you want from a teammate."

The Bisons finished with an overall 16-11 record and a 7-9 Gulf South Conference record.

Smith planned to graduate in May 2006 with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology. After graduation Smith said he would like to continue playing in an overseas league. Once he retires as a player, Smith hoped to become a coach.

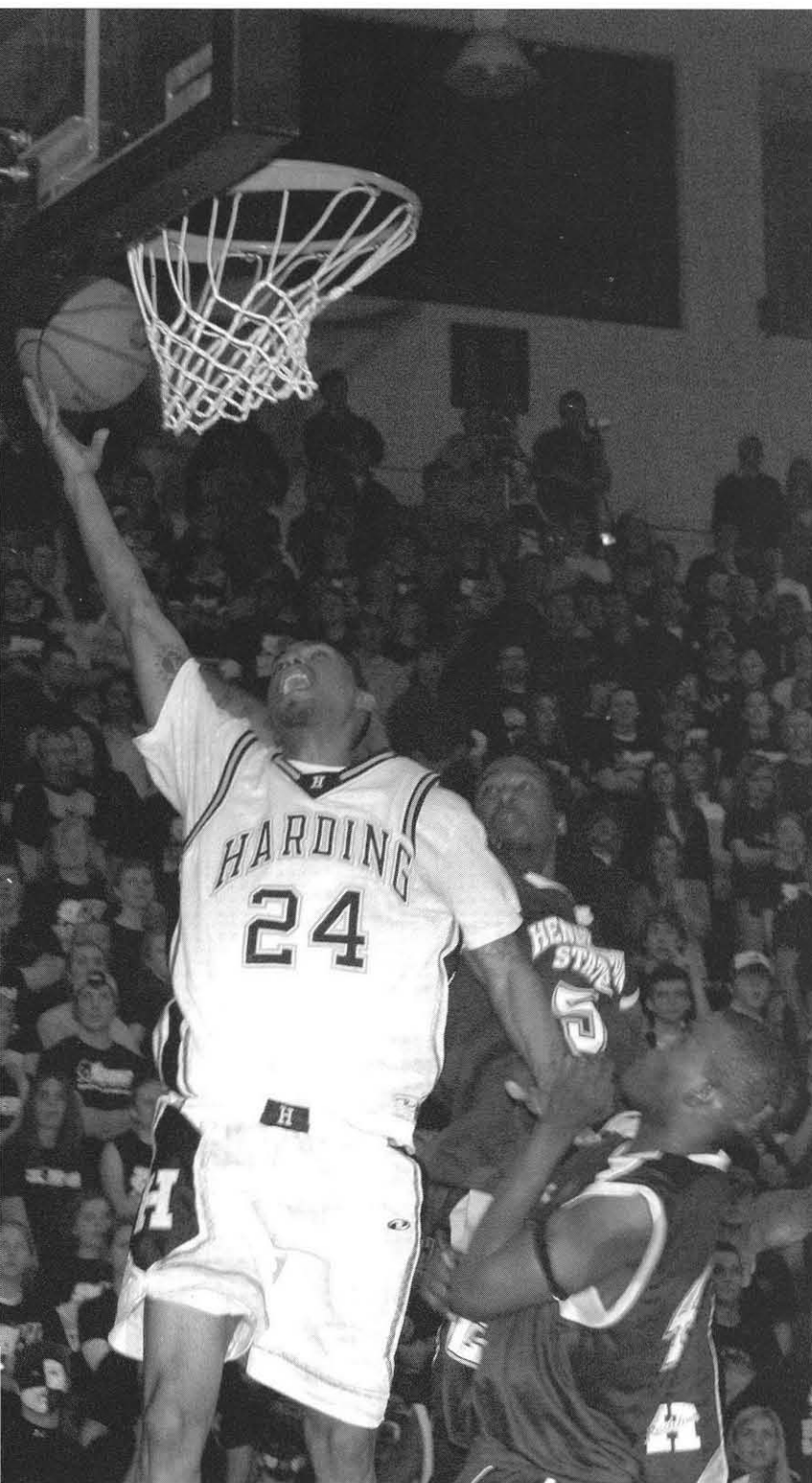
