Blood Draw Establishes School, State Records

Harding University established county and state records recently with the conclusion of a four-day blood draw sponsored by the Searcy Chapter of the American Red Cross. The March 22-25 draw, held on the Harding campus, resulted in the collection of 1,173 units of blood — the largest single collection in Arkansas since formal blood collection began in the state in 1961.

"It's definitely the biggest draw as far back as anyone can remember," said Ralph Whitley, administrator of blood services. Eddie Campbell, dean of men at Harding and White County Blood Program Chairman for the past six years, said, "Cooperation is the key. It takes a lot of people to make a blood draw successful."

Campbell attributed the success of the draw to the volunteer efforts of several student groups and the enthusiasm of one particular student, Martin Owens. In addition he said, "This is a commentary on the character of our students and their willingness to serve others."

Campbell said that Owens, a freshman pre-medicine major from Natchez, Miss., approached him several weeks before the draw was held and asked him what the current record was for most units in a single draw. Harding previously had broken the state record in April 1977 with a three-day draw which netted 1,004 units of blood.

Owens expressed an interest in breaking the old record, Campbell said, and began organizing support on the campus. Three

social clubs — King's Men, Kappa Tau and Oege — supplied volunteer student workers, as did the Harding Student Nurses' Association. Owens attributed his interest in the project to a tour of service in the U.S. Navy, in which he spent time as a medical corpsman, including duties as an intensive care technician and a coronary care technician. Owens was also licensed as an EMT (Emergency Medical Technician).

"I've always been a supporter of the Red Cross," he said.

Even though the draw fell 27 units short of the 1,200-unit goal, everyone involved termed it a success. Owens agreed. "We did what we set out to do," he said; "we set a record, and more importantly, we collected 1,173 units of blood for the Red Cross."

Blood collected by the Regional Blood Services personnel is transported to a Blood Center in Little Rock, where it is stored for usage by member hospitals. In all, 61 hospitals from 51 counties participate in the Arkansas Regional blood program, sponsored and managed by the Pulaski

County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

In turn, the Pulaski County Chapter has several committees, including the Blood Services Committee and the Medical Ad-

visory Committee, which oversee the statewide blood collection program and are in turn aided by various local and county chapters in the state.

Collins, Diffine Receive National Awards

Susan Collins, a Harding senior from Atlanta, Ga., was recently selected by the Distinguished National and School Awards Jury of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa. to receive the George Washington Honor Medal for her 1981 public address titled "The Marketplace and You."

Dr. Don P. Diffine, associate professor of economics and director of the Belden Center for Private Enterprise Education at Harding, was also selected to receive an honor medal for his 1981 address titled "The Reindustrialization of America."

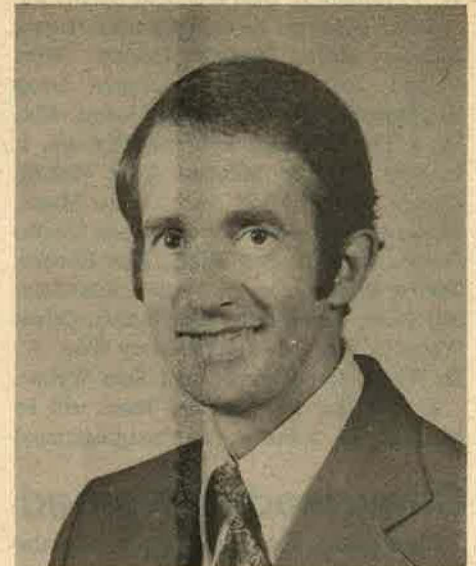
Miss Collins was honored for her presentation as a speaker in the three-day New Orleans area Youth Forum which was conducted in area high schools on the theme "America, Freedom and You." An accounting major, she is a member of the Students in Free Enterprise Economics Team which won first place at the National Intercollegiate Competition in New York City in July 1981. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Collins.

Diffine, a graduate of the University of Mississippi, St. Mary's University, and California State University at Long Beach, has taught at Harding for ten years. In addition to coaching the "Students in Free Enterprise" Economics Team, directing the Belden Center, and editing the *Entrepreneur*, he conducts business and economic seminars for educators, executives and opinion leaders.

A recipient of eight previous Freedom Foundations Awards in the categories of economic education, non-profit publications, and public affairs and advertising, Diffine is a charter member of the Association for Private Enterprise Education.

Hazelip to Address May Graduates

Dr. Harold Hazelip, Dean of the Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis, will address the 397 graduating seniors in commencement exercises set for 2:30 p.m., Sunday, May 9 in Benson Auditorium. The number represents the largest graduating class in recent years.

In addition to the conferring of degrees by President Clifton L. Ganus Jr., several awards will be presented by the University. Three Distinguished Teacher Awards of \$1,000 cash each will go to the faculty. Awards in science, math, general scholarship and self-improvement will be presented to students.

Among the degree candidates, 13 will receive the Master of Education. Also, 177 have applied for the Bachelor of Arts, 100

for the Bachelor of Business Administration, 52 for the Bachelor of Science, 47 for Bachelor of Science in Nursing, six for Bachelor of Social Work and two for the Associate of Arts.

Hazelip, who joined the Graduate School faculty in 1967 after completing a doctorate at the University of Iowa, became Dean in 1975. In addition, he is a Professor of Christian Doctrine and is broadcast speaker for the Herald of Truth. He recently resigned as minister of the Highland Church of Christ in Memphis. Also, he travels from New York to California to fill special engagements for both the school and Herald of Truth and is in constant demand as a speaker. A scholar, he has written extensively for journals of religion.

Committee Approves Curriculum

Among the numerous changes recently approved by the Academic Affairs Committee for the 1982-83 catalog are the additions of a Bachelor of Music degree in voice, piano and violin-viola to replace the Bachelor of Arts degrees presently awarded in those majors and Bachelor of Music Education degrees in vocal-choral and instrumental to replace the Bachelor of Arts in music education presently offered.

The new degrees were added in preparation to apply for accreditation with the National Association of Schools of Music, Dr. Erle Moore, chairman of the music department, said.

The Bachelor of Music is an "applied music degree as opposed to teaching," Dr. Moore said. The Bachelor of Music Education is a teaching degree, but it is more involved than the present B.A. in music education, he said.

"It will require about 10 more hours in music," he said. "The Bachelor of Arts in music will still be offered, but it will not be a certification degree."

Some aspects of the new degrees will be offered in the next fall semester, Dr. Moore said, but he estimated that it will probably take about two years to completely phase out the B.A. in voice, piano, violin-viola and music education. Technically a student must be allowed to complete any course of study offered in the catalog effective at the time of his entrance, and Dr. Moore said he expects some juniors and seniors to complete the B.A. program. Sophomores and freshmen, he said, will probably opt for the new B.M. and B.M.E. degrees.

The new catalog will also offer two new majors in religious music and computer science. The computer science major offered by the mathematics department, was approved by the Academic Affairs Committee before Christmas, but several changes in the requirements were suggested and approved. New minors in drama and interior design will also be catalogued.

A new art degree, the Bachelor of Fine Arts, has been approved by the faculty and

Academic Affairs Committee for this fall. "The BFA is a 76 hour para-professional degree that gives the student more breadth and depth of knowledge and skills development in a major area of art," Don Robinson, chairman of the art department, said.

New courses include Art 370, Interior Design I, and Art 372, Interior Design II. Prerequisites to the interior design courses are Art 103, Drawing and Composition; Art 200, Two Dimensional Design or Art 117, Design for the Home; and Art 260, Color Theory.

"We feel these additions will further strengthen our art program, which already offers a BA degree and a 50 hour BS degree in art," Robinson said.

Fifteen new courses will be offered in the new catalog. They are Education 481, Student Teaching Practicum (3 hours); Special Studies 290, Special Study Course Title (3), offered only in the Harding University in Florence (Italy) program; Italian 201-202, Intermediate Italian (3,3), to be offered only in the HUF program.

Other new courses approved are Physical Education 118, Beginning Basketball (1); Physical Education 327, Basic Movement and Gymnastics for Children (3), to be offered alternate falls beginning 1983-84; Physical Education 329, Rhythmic Activities and Lead-up Games for Children (3), offered alternate springs beginning 1983-84; Speech 408, Aural Rehabilitation (3), to be offered in the Speech Therapy block.

New courses also to appear in the new catalog are Speech 171, Forensics Laboratory (1); Speech 261, Nonverbal and Cross Cultural Communication (3), to alternate with 265 beginning fall 1983-84; Speech 371, Radio Production and Writing (3), to alternate with 372 beginning spring 1982-83; Speech 372, Television Production and Writing; Music 140, Collegium Musicum (1 per year), to be required each semester of all music majors; Music 337, Counterpoint (3); Piano 332, Piano Pedagogy (2); and Music 333, String Pedagogy (2).

Duke, Ireland Receive Doctorates

Richard Duke, assistant professor of education and director of field experiences at Harding University, successfully defended his doctoral dissertation on March 18 at Florida State University in Tallahassee, Fla. to earn the Ph.D. degree in higher education.

Title of his dissertation was "Giving to Educational Institutions: The Relationship Between Individuals and Institutional Value Systems."

Duke, who will be 30 later this month, began work on the doctorate in the fall of 1976. He estimated that he spent about three years in researching and writing his dissertation.

A 1974 Harding graduate, Duke completed his Master of Education degree in 1975 and then returned to Harding as a member of the faculty in 1978.

He is married to the former Debbie Ganus of Searcy and the couple has four children: Johnna, John Richard, David and Louisa. Mrs. Duke is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Clifton L. Ganus Jr.

A former teacher at Crowley's Ridge Academy in Paragould, Duke is active in the Three Rivers Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa.

Dwight Ireland, instructor of psychology at Harding University successfully defended

his doctoral dissertation February 26 at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville to earn the Ed.D. degree in counseling. His degree will be conferred during May graduation exercises.

Title of his dissertation was "Ethical Judgment: A Comparative Analysis of Licensed Counselors, Licensed Psychologists and Registered Social Workers in the State of Arkansas."

Ireland, 30, began on the doctorate in the fall of 1979. He is a native of Brownsville, Texas and first joined the Harding faculty in the fall of 1977. Ireland did his undergraduate and master's work at Texas A & M University in College Station, Texas.

He is married to the former Margaret (Meg) Gibson of Houston, Texas, and the couple has two sons, Jonathan, three, and Jeffrey, 14 months. Ireland is a sponsor for Chi Sigs Social Club at Harding.

Make Plans Now for Summer

Summer programs and courses at Harding are finalized and promise to offer a wide variety of options for interested students. Intersession, scheduled for May 10-26, will be the first program offered. A maximum of four semester hours credit may be earned during Intersession.

Several workshops will be held also this summer. The first, Seminar in Youth Ministry, is set for May 10-14, and is available for two hours Bible credit. Diagnosis and Correction of Reading Difficulties will be offered June 7-23 for three hours credit in Education. Clinical Reading is scheduled June 24-July 9 for three hours graduate credit in Education. Kindergarten Curriculum is also being offered June 24-July 9 for three hours Education credit.

A child welfare seminar, Children in Crisis, will be offered July 12-13. Kindergarten Methods and Materials will be taught July 12-18 for three hours Education credit. Rounding out the summer workshops will be the 13-in-1 Bible Workshop August 2-5. A separate article details plans for it.

The regular Harding University summer school sessions will be June 7-July 9 and July 12-August 13. A maximum number of seven hours credit can be earned in each session of summer school. A wide variety of different courses will be offered, so that interested students may sign up for appropriate courses in their particular academic field.

A new SummersEnd program similar to Intersession will be offered July 28-August 13. Dr. Jimmy Carr, director of summer programs, said that SummersEnd is designed to aid students in receiving a

degree without having to enroll for an extra semester. A maximum of three hours credit may be earned.

Incoming freshmen for the fall of 1982 will have opportunity to attend one of two early orientation sessions. Accepted freshmen are invited to be a part of the sessions, although attendance is not required. Set for June 17-19 and July 11-13, the session attracted almost 500 freshmen last summer. Students may preregister, have identification cards made, and fulfill several other necessities.

An Academic Enrichment Program is provided for a limited number of freshmen who desire to attend college but have deficient academic backgrounds. English and mathematics courses will be offered to students in order to strengthen their academic skills in preparation for college.

A second program, Advanced Studies, is designed for qualified high school students who wish to get a head start on a college education. To enroll, a student must have at least 12 academic units of high school credit with an overall average of B or better.

The Advanced Studies Program is open to those who have completed the junior year of high school. Credit earned in the program will be held in escrow until the student has completed the senior year in high school, and may be counted toward a degree at Harding or may be accepted as transfer credits at some other accredited school.

Other summer programs include the Harding Sports Camp, Tahkodah Christian Camp and Tahkodah Music Camp. A separate article on the sports camp is included in this issue. Cliff Sharp directs the Tahkodah Christian Camp near Floral, Ark. for boys and girls ages eight to 17. 1982 summer sessions are scheduled for June 20-July 2, July 4-July 16, and July 18-July 30.

Tahkodah Music Camp is directed by Dr. Kenneth Davis for high school graduates interested in instrumental and vocal music. Dates are Aug. 10-19.

A summer recreation program includes outdoor activities which families may enjoy, summer sports activities, some family social events and a number of entertainment performances.

American Studies Students Tour Capitol

Fifty-four Harding University students and sponsors visited Washington, D.C. March 22-26 for an American Studies tour, having spent the weekend in Williamsburg, Virginia enroute.

The junior and senior students, with President Clifton L. Ganus, Dr. Raymond Muncy and Dr. Marvin Robertson, made tours of the State Department, Embassies of the People's Republic of China and Egypt, and the White House, and met with the Arkansas Congressional Delegation throughout the week.

The schedule included a visit to Bolling Air Force Base and an afternoon at Mount Vernon, home of George Washington. The group also visited the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, AFL-CIO offices and the Embassies of Saudi Arabia and the Soviet Union before departing for home.

The tour was a part of the American Studies Program for juniors and seniors who maintain a "B" or better average in the fields of business, history, and related fields. The tours are designated to help acquaint the future leaders with first-hand information and visits to industrial, civic and government sites.

Traditionally two short tours are made during the year, but the decision to visit Washington included making one tour for 1981-82 with the time extended to a week.

Boys' Sport Camps To Be Offered

Summer sports camps will be offered at Harding for boys, grades 7-12, who are interested in track, running, football and basketball.

The camps offer instruction and provide each participant the opportunity to improve his ability, according to Coach Wilt Martin, director of the camps. Every phase of the sports are studied and each boy receives individual attention. Campers work on skills and study video tapes and films.

Camp dates are as follows: junior high football and basketball, July 11-16; running and track, July 11-16; senior high football and basketball, July 18-23.

Instruction will take place on the Harding campus, where athletes will have access to the Athletic-Physical Education Complex, with a pro-turf floor for two regulation size cross courts, an indoor track, swimming pool, gymnastics area, handball courts and weight room.

French Students Captivated By American Culture

When Richard Andrzejewski and his sister Lydie first came to Arkansas, they were surprised to see farmers and the rural way of life. Scenes from America they had seen in their hometown of Mareq-En-Baraeul in northern France showed big cities and a faster way of life.

Richard, 21, has been a student at Harding University for the past three years and Lydie, 19, is in her second year at Harding.

They explained that the French aren't exactly as Americans have them pictured either. Richard said the French aren't the stereotypic gallant, romantic people they are famous for being. "Americans are gallant," he said. He explained that in France a girl usually pays her own way on a date and it is unusual for a man to bring a woman flowers or open the door for her.

Until recently there were no fast food places in France. "Something that really amazed me was the drive-through window where you talk to a machine to order your food," Richard said.

Richard and Lydie are following in the footsteps of their father by attending Harding. After being converted to Christianity by a missionary from the U.S. he went to Harding in 1955 and studied there for two years. Then he, too, began doing mission work in the U.S. and in France. He was killed in a car wreck in 1971.

Richard said he had planned to attend

Harding and to do mission work since he was very young. He is majoring in Biblical languages and in English. He is considering going to work for the advertising department of a French oil company. But he said that wherever he goes he plans to teach the Gospel. He will graduate from Harding in May.

Lydie, a nursing major, hopes to do mission work in South America after she graduates.

She said she had more trouble with the English language than Richard did. At first she had to record lectures in her classes.

Richard and Lydie received two years of credit here because of the superior

high school system they have in France. Richard explained that the French high schools place little emphasis on sports and other extra-curricular activities, and if a student fails one subject, he has to take the entire semester over again. He said they emphasize learning foreign languages and a baccalaureate diploma from their high schools has a good reputation the world over.

Lydie said that in France, the people are close to other countries and know more about other countries than Americans do.

And, Richard added that the knowledge of the typical Frenchman is more generalized than that of the typical

American. "A Frenchman wants to know everything about everything," he explained. "In the states it is more specialized."

"People travel a lot more here," Lydie continued. There are several reasons for this. Gasoline is three times as much in France and not as many people have cars. The legal age for getting a driver's license in France is 18 and then it costs \$300 to get one.

"We even have streets where only people are allowed," Richard said. And he went on to tell that artists often set up exhibits to sell their work on the sidewalks, and musicians play guitars and sing and then take up a collection from their audience.

Television is also different here. "I hardly ever watch TV here because of the commercials," Richard said. "They don't interrupt shows for a commercial in France." He added that the TV shows are more education oriented in France.

One difference Lydie has noticed is, "everything is not so new in France. Here everything is new."

Richard said the social classes in France are much more obvious. "Here any kind of work is valued," he said.

In summing up the American people, Richard said, "They seem like big children. They are able to do a lot more by discovering the child within themselves. Americans are able to take more risks."

"The more I stay in the United States the more I like it," Richard concluded.

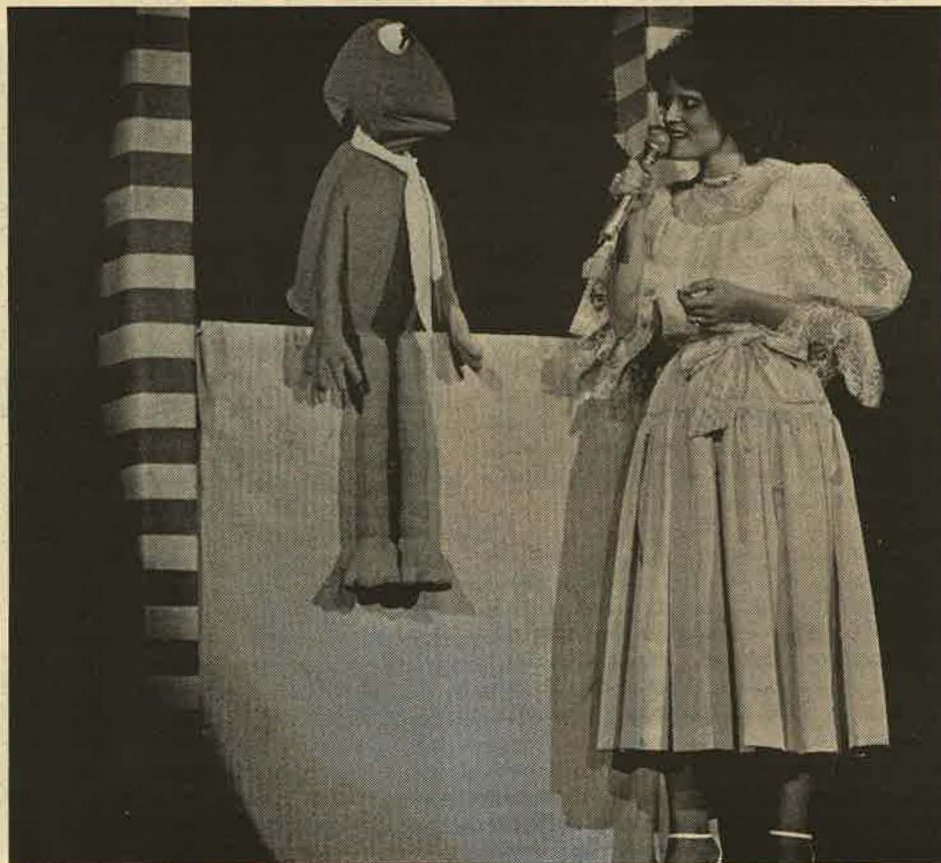

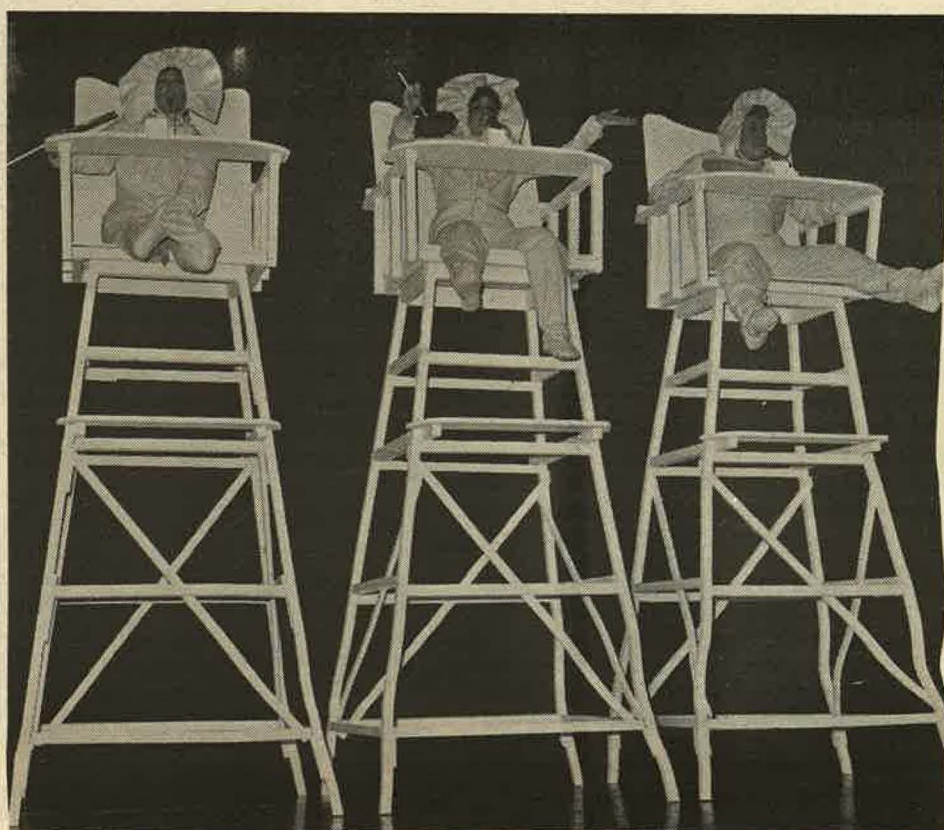

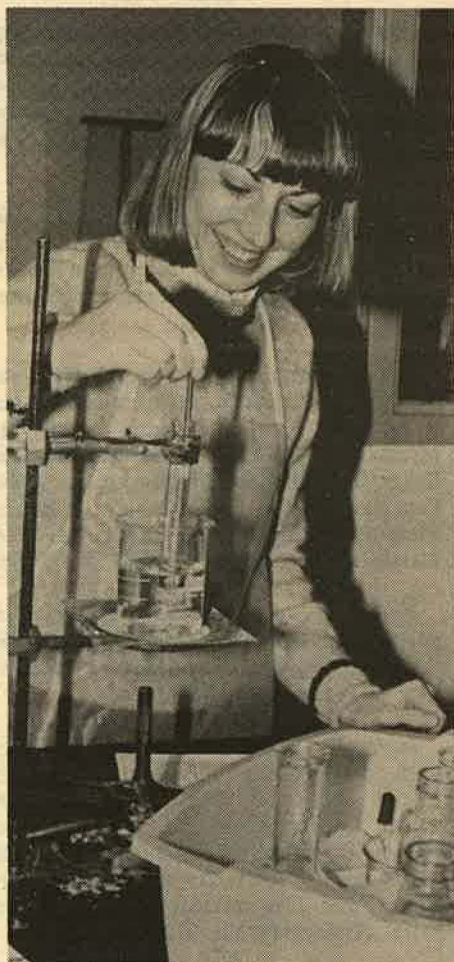

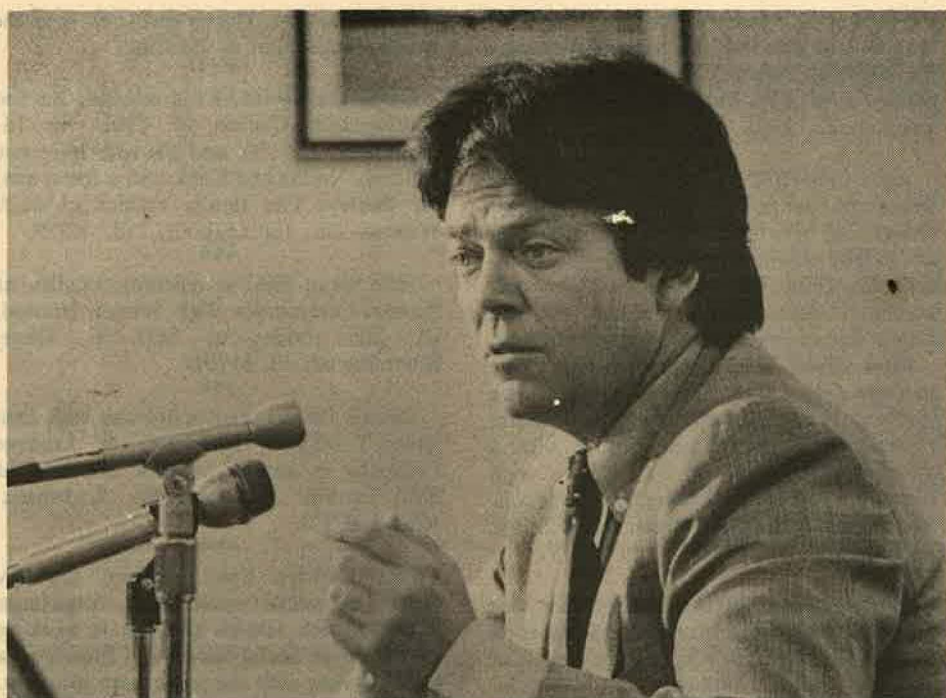

Kyle Blickenstaff of Harding University was named the winner of the 1982 A. O. Duer Award by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

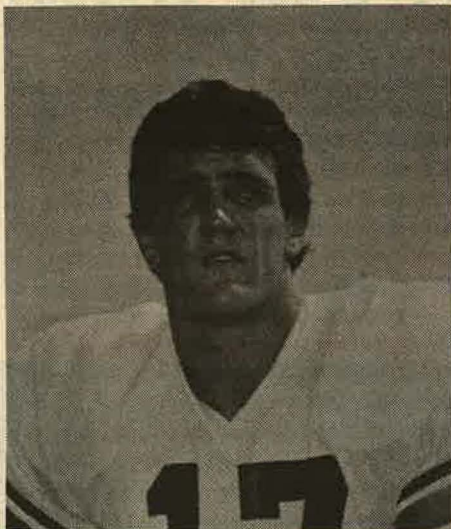
Presentation of the national award was made by Duer, the former executive director of NAIA, at the Association's annual Hall of Fame banquet Thursday, March 11, in Kansas City, Mo.

Blickenstaff, 21, is a junior quarterback for Harding, who was named to the All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 honor teams last fall. A pre-medical student majoring in general science, Blickenstaff has compiled a 3.96 grade point average (on a 4.0 scale) on 95 credit hours.

The award is presented in honor of Duer to recognize a student athlete for outstanding scholarship, athletic ability, and leadership.

A native of Boise, Idaho, Blickenstaff is a triple threat performer on the athletic field. Last fall he passed for 1,556 yards on 120 completions of 262 attempts. He gained 132 yards rushing for 1,168 total offensive yards and led the conference in punting with a 38.5 yard average of 57 punts.

During the 1982 season, Blickenstaff set

school single game records for pass completions (22), yards gained passing (275), and total offense (300). He holds the school record for the longest punt (64 yards).

Duer Scholarship Award by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

He is pursuing a general science major.

Buttram is a hard-hitting defensive performer who overcame injury to rank as the Bison defensive leader with 119 tackles, 55 of which were unassisted. He also blocked two punts. A 5-11, 192 pounder, he is a three-year letterman who is a pre-dental major.

Jones is a defensive lineman who has started at noseguard, tackle and end. He is a 6-0, 216-pound three-year letterman.

Despite being injured the last part of the season, he recorded 27 tackles, seven of which were unassisted.

At the conclusion of spring drills, Buttram was named Outstanding Linebacker for the 1981 season, and Blickenstaff was selected as Outstanding Offensive Back for 1981, according to head coach John Prock.

Bisons Rank High In NAIA Final Stats

Harding University basketballers finished 12th in the nation in free throw shooting according to statistics released from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics office in Kansas City, Mo.

For the second season in a row Harding has ranked in the top twenty in the final statistical report of the NAIA. More than 500 schools participate in the NAIA basketball program each year.

Coach Jess Bucy's Bisons connected on 420 of 559 attempts for an outstanding .751 shooting percentage. In 1979-80 season the Bisons recorded a .757 standard.

Senior David Presley led the Bison shooters this season with a .902 percentage on 37 and 41 free throw attempts. Junior Hubie Smith ranked high in the national statistics most of the season and finished with 66 of 75 for a .880 percentage. Freshman Danny Starkey had 46 of 54 for an .752 percent of accuracy.

All the Harding athletes would have ranked nationally but did not make the statistical minimum of 2.5 free throws per game played.

"The brochure materials are used for distribution to the state and local media as well as to prospective students," Green said. "We try to make the best possible information available about our student athletes and the program here at the University."

The awards mark the third time in as many years the football and basketball folders have received All-America citations. The football programs were recognized in the 1979 competition.

Statistical data for the publications were compiled by student assistant John Gross of Pine Bluff, Ark. A junior, Gross has served as the sports statistician for the past two years.

Bruce Cook, director of information, assisted in the preparation of the editorial and biographical information for the basketball brochure.

Athletes Letter In Basketball

Thirteen basketball lettermen, including NAIA All-American honorable mention honoree Charles Gardner, have been announced by Harding coach Jess Bucy.

Gardner, who was also selected to the All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 All-Star units, scored 1,344 career points as a Bison cager. The 6-6 Searcy native completed the 1981-82 season as the second leading scorer in the AIC with a 17.7 point average and was second in rebounding with a 7.9 average per game.

Senior Alan Pearson of Amory, Miss. was the recipient of his fourth letter award.

King Brings Sense of Humor to the Classroom

Hidden away on the third floor of the Administration Building are offices. In the center of one room an old white tennis ball hangs suspended from a string. Four decrepit school desks, a bookshelf, a file cabinet and a work desk crowd the tiny room. On the desk, amid scattered books and papers, is a large bowl of popcorn. Crunching the popcorn in between bits of conversation is Richard King.

King has been minister at the Spruce Street Church of Christ in Augusta for almost five years and a member of Harding University's Bible Department since 1980. One of the two black faculty members at Harding, he is known for his quick wit and sense of humor.

"My mother was glad when I became a preacher because she always said I had the 'gift of gab' and now maybe I would use it for something constructive," King said.

It took him seven years to discover where he could best use his "gift." King worked for the telephone company in Edmond, Okla. for several years before enrolling at Harding as a Christian Communications Program student in 1976.

"Students often think teachers are just joking when they say that it is a sacrifice to be at Harding, but it's true. I could be making a lot more money at my old job than I am at both of my jobs now," King said.

But he, like many other teachers at Harding, stays here because he enjoys being around young people.

"I love people, young people especially," he said.

King does a lot of marriage counseling. He was married at age 18 himself and when asked about his view on young marriages, 13 years later, King said, "I think married life is a great life, so it's seldom that I discourage anyone from getting married. But I think if you're not mature already, you will have to be very quickly."

A native of Oklahoma, King also worked on a ranch and rode in rodeos for

a couple of years before coming to Harding. His students often kid him because he still sometimes wears his cowboy boots to class.

"Most people are surprised to see a black cowboy," he said. "I'm really just a country boy at heart."

King is one of Harding's more popular teachers with an excess of 300 students enrolled in his classes each semester. He is known for his sense of humor, telling jokes and cutting up in class.

King sometimes tells his students that because he is from Oklahoma he is an Indian. When they ask which tribe he belongs to, he replies, "Blackfoot."

In addition to full-time preaching and teaching, King conducts several gospel meetings each year. At out-of-town meetings his wife Lola and children Shelly, 11, Diana, 9, and Richard Jr., 3, often accompany him.

When his family comes along on a trip, King said they can enjoy their "family hobby" — traveling.

"We used to set aside a weekend a month to travel," he said. "We've been

to 28 states and the Bahamas."

King helped in organizing many of the activities and programs at Harding for Black History Month in February. He saw the programs as bringing about a better understanding of black people.

"People need to accept each other," he said. "White people haven't been around blacks and don't know how to relate to them. All people have hangups; mine is hippies."

King said he tries not to let people's attitudes about blacks affect him. "Even though it (prejudice) bugs me, it's one of my least worries in life," he said.

"I can take a joke about a black. I can tell one," he said. "I think we can enjoy ourselves and say funny things about one another."

But problems often arise when people begin cutting down the race of other individuals, King said.

"I've told myself I was going to quit joking," he said, "but it's part of my personality. I don't know what I'd do to cut it out. I've been that way for 31 years."
