Elderhostel Program to be Offered on Harding Campus

Beginning this summer, Harding University will join the network of colleges, universities and other educational institutions around the world which offer special low-cost, short-term academic programs in residence for older adults. Known as ELDERHOSTEL, the program is open to people over 60 or to those whose spouse or companion qualifies.

Elderhostel combines the best traditions of education and hosteling. Inspired by the youth hostels and folk schools of Europe, but guided by the needs of older citizens for intellectual stimulation and physical adventure, it is a program for elder citizens who are reaching out to new experiences, and is based on the belief that

retirement does not have to mean withdrawal from society.

A wide range of liberal arts and science courses that explore various aspects of the human experience is offered. There are no exams, no grades, and no required homework, although professors are pleased to make suggestions for outside reading and study. Lack of formal education is not a barrier.

Most programs begin Sunday evening and end Saturday morning and are limited to 30 or 40 participants. Typically three courses are given, scheduled in such a way that hostellers can take all three if they wish. A variety of extra-curricular activities are also offered.

Traditionally, Elderhostel programs are offered at modest cost. For the summer programs in the United States and Canada, that cost is uniform throughout the network of participating institutions. For 1982, the summer program tuition is \$150 per person per week. This charge is an all-inclusive fee covering room and board, all classes, and extracurricular activities. Individuals from the Searcy community who do not reside on campus may participate at a lower fee.

Courses which Harding will offer include, June 20-26, "The American Civil War: The 'General' Situation;" "Utopian Communities of the 19th Century;" and "Birds of Central Arkansas;" June 27-July 3, "The Four Gospels," "Water Coloring" and "The American Civil War: The 'General' Situation;" July 4-10, "Drawing," "The American Civil War: The 'General' Situation," and "Utopian Communities of the 19th Century."

Scheduled instructors for the courses are Virgil Lawyer, Raymond Muncy, Mike Plummer, Conard Hays and John Keller.

Elderhostellers live simply in rooms in a college dormitory and eat most meals in the regular college cafeterias with other summer students. Harding's program will feature housing, classes and meals all in the same facility — the American Heritage Center — where a cafeteria is located and all rooms have private baths.

During the non-summer months of the traditional academic year, Elderhostel offers programs which vary somewhat

in tuition because quite often regular dormitories are not available and more expensive alternatives have to be used. Similarly, overseas courses may vary in cost but with prices kept as low as possible.

Elderhostel is the brainchild of Marty Knowlton, a well-known social activist, philosopher, educator and world traveler who believed that an exposure to the liberal arts and sciences in a supportive residential campus setting would respond to the need felt by many older adults for intellectual stimulation and meaningful activity in their later years.

In 1975, five New Hampshire institutions offered programs to 200 pioneer Elderhostellers. Since then, the growth of the Elderhostel movement has been dramatic. In 1981 over 400 institutions in all 50 states of the U.S. and six provinces of Canada, participated in the program. In addition, programs were offered in Great Britain, Denmark, Sweden, Finland and Norway. In all, over 35,000 hostellers were served.

Harding becomes the fourth institution of higher learning in Arkansas to offer an Elderhostel program. According to Dr. Jimmy Carr, director of Harding's Elderhostel program, "We are most pleased to offer our outstanding facilities and faculty for involvement in this worthy and very beneficial program, and look forward to hosting Elderhostellers both locally and from around the country this year."

Mrs. Sally Hockaday Benson

Mrs. Sally Hockaday Benson, 85, wife of President Emeritus George S. Benson, died Thursday, December 17 in a Searcy hospital after a short illness.

The First Lady of Harding during Dr. Benson's tenure as president from 1936-65, she was a retired teacher, having taught in Oklahoma, at Harding, and in Chinese schools while she and Dr. Benson served as missionaries from 1925-36.

She was a charter member and one of the first life members of the Searcy chapter of Associated Women for Harding. In 1974 she modeled her wedding gown in a fashion show sponsored by AWH.

A quiet lady of refinement, she served her husband, family and friends with dignity until recent years when both her hearing and eyesight were impaired. The couple's devotion and attentiveness to each other, especially in the past two years, were inspirational to friends.

Mrs. Benson attended regularly three different Bible studies at congregations in Searcy until her death. She was active in the Searcy Garden Club and had held various offices in the organization.

Other survivors include two daughters,

Funeral services were held Dec. 19 at the College Church of Christ by Dale Foster, minister of the congregation. Burial was in White County Memorial Gardens in Searcy.

New Alumni Association Directory To Be Completed in June 1982

The Harding Alumni Association will publish an alumni directory during 1982. The tentative schedule calls for the directories to be mailed to alumni during June.

The 1982 directory will be similar to the two previous directories printed in 1974 and 1978. It will contain an alphabetical listing and a geographical listing of alumni. The directory is expected to list more than 17,000 alumni.

Information to be contained in the publication includes the alumnus' name, address, class year, degree and occupation. Married alumnae will be cross referenced by maiden name.

The printing schedule will require that all copy for the directory be sent to the printer in Dallas by April 19. The actual type setting will be done by a computer utilizing a magnetic tape containing all of the information to be printed in the book.

"We are really excited about the directory. It's been four years since we published a directory, and we've added quite a number of alumni since 1978. The directory is a very popular item among alumni, and the Alumni Association is very happy to provide this service," said David Crouch, director of alumni relations.

'SummersEnd' Session Designed For Summer Graduation Program

A new short session called "SummersEnd" has been planned for the summer school offerings this year, according to Dr. Jimmy Carr, director of the summer program. Set for July 28-Aug. 13, the 13-day concentrated offering will be similar to the Intersession, a popular addition to the university's curriculum in recent years.

"SummersEnd" is designed to aid students in receiving a degree without having to enroll for an extra semester, according to Carr. "We are always eager to help students reach their goals, and sometimes we find that a student will lack only three or possibly even two, hours for completion of that degree. We believe this program will help those students financially since they won't have to enroll for another semester," he said.

In addition to SummersEnd, the Intersession schedule will be May 10-28. Last year more than 500 students enrolled for the dozen classes offered, receiving a maximum of four hours credit in the short term.

Regular summer sessions have been set for June 7-July 9 and July 12-Aug. 13. Summer commencement will be Aug. 13.

Incoming freshmen for the fall of 1982 will have opportunity to attend one of two early orientation sessions held each summer. Accepted freshmen are invited to be a

part of the sessions, though attendance is not required. The sessions, set this year for June 17-19 and July 11-13, attracted almost 500 freshmen last summer. Students may pre-register, have identification cards made, and fulfill several other necessary requirements for their fall attendance.

Grimes Rejoins Development Staff

Glendol Grimes, a former member of the Development Office, has rejoined the Harding staff according to Floyd Daniel, vice president for development.

Effective January 1, Grimes assumed the position of Director of Development for the Harding Graduate School of Religion. He held this same position at Harding from 1973 until 1980.

Prior to returning to Harding, Grimes served for approximately 18 months as Executive Vice President of the Life of America Foundation in Dallas.

"We are certainly delighted to have Glendol back with us. He was a very effective member of Harding's development team for seven years, and I am confident he will continue his effectiveness," said Daniel in making the announcement.

Financial Aid: Apply Early for Best Results

Russell Showalter, director of federal programs in the Financial Aid Office, is a busy man this time of year as student applications begin pouring in for financial aid in 1982-83. The deadline for such applications is May 1, and Showalter emphasized the importance of getting them in early.

"The sooner a student applies, the sooner he or she can be considered for the various form of financial aid which are available," he said. "Those who apply by May 1 and are deemed eligible, will be placed on priority

2,840 Students Enroll For Spring Semester

With registration deadline a week past presstime, a total of 2,840 students had registered for classes for the spring semester.

Registrar Virgil Beckett said the figure was "about as predicted" for the spring, since the second semester enrollment generally reflects a decline. In December commencement, 125 students received degrees, accounting for a part of the drop from last fall's 3,076 peak.

An addition of several night classes, not offered in previous springs, accounted for a portion of the count, and Beckett said that others are expected to enroll for the night sections.

According to Dr. Jimmy Carr, assistant to the president, "We are pleased at our enrollment and look forward to having a great spring semester."

A complete analysis of the enrollment will be presented following the close of registration Jan. 25.

status for available funds," he said.

Various forms of financial aid are available to Harding students who qualify, including grants, loans, scholarships, work study programs, campus work and off campus work. A four month period, from January 1 to May 1, is set aside each year for student financial aid applications to be completed and turned in. Applications received after this deadline date will be on first come, first served basis as funds are available.

In most cases, application for financial aid at Harding and other schools, involves dropping by the Financial Aid Office, picking up a prepared packet, completing the enclosed form (usually an ACT Needs Analysis Questionnaire), and mailing the form to ACT's headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa. Cost of the ACT Processing is \$6.00.

There, the data is computerized according to a needs formula, approved by the Federal Government, Department of Education and the eligibility status of students in terms of financial aid is sent back to the schools and other appropriate agencies such as state education department. Local officials then determine to the student's advantage how best to utilize the student's full eligibility range in terms of all the aid forms available.

Showalter indicated that for the 1982-83 school year, the amount of federal money allocated for campus-based programs is pretty well set, barring any sudden moves by Congress after the April 1, 1982 deadline is reached for voting to extend funding for the present federal budget.

"We should have about the same amount of money as we had last year," he said, "but for some people money is going to be harder to get than it has been in the past. The best thing is to apply early," he added.

Congress recently mandated that after October 1, 1981, students whose parents earn over \$30,000 per year will be required to file a needs analysis statement in order to obtain GSL Loans and those available from the National Defense Student Loan and the Nursing Student Loan Fund.

The NDSL program has been popular because of the low interest rate which is five percent. However, due to limited funds, the maximum for 81-82 was \$1150 at Harding. The GSLP is quite different, with banks and

other lending institutions setting a \$2,500 limit per undergraduate student per year and \$5,000 limit for graduate students at a nine percent interest level for first time borrowers after the October 1, 1982 deadline and seven percent for established borrowers.

Pell Grants (which replaced BEOG) are another form of federally-assisted financial aid for students. In 1981-82 the maximum amount per year per student was set at \$1,670. Maximum aid in any form is only given to students who are enrolled full-time (12 hours or more), with reduced aid available to part-time students.

Sound confusing? It can be without the proper guidance. With the cost of a year's education at Harding (30 hours) for 1981-82 estimated in the \$4245.00 to \$4421.00 range, it is easy to see why most students rely on some form of financial aid. It has been estimated that from 75 to 90 percent of all students at Harding depend on some form of financial aid.

But as Showalter said in conclusion, "In the 15 years that I've been at Harding, we have been able to help nearly all those students who had financial needs." And that's quite an accomplishment.

Harding Moves to the Forefront in Computer Science Field

Gene Dugger, director of academic computing and a faculty member at Harding since 1969, will soon have a new computer system to oversee, one which he feels will put Harding a big jump ahead of other Arkansas schools.

"It's the computer of the '80s," Dugger said in describing the Vax-11/750 system manufactured by Digital Equipment Corporation. It's the "preferred academic computer" in this country, he said, adding that more than 85 percent of major universities in the U.S. use a Vax system.

The \$250,000 system, to be housed in a 2,400 square foot area on the first floor of the Mabey Business Building, will include a Vax-11/750 CPU with two million bytes of memory, 124-megabytes of disk, a 1600 BPI magnetic tape drive, and 32 terminals.

The system has only been on the market for about three years; and, according to Dugger, Harding will be the first university in Arkansas to purchase one.

Advantages of the new system will include the offering of a new computer science major beginning this fall, when the business complex is scheduled to be completed.

"Considering the combination of facilities, faculty, equipment, courses, and student/terminal ratio, I feel that Harding will be competitive with any school in the country that offers a computer science major," Dugger said.

Currently Harding offers a computer applications major in the mathematics department and a business systems analysis major in the business department. Two new faculty members, Tim Baird and Jim Behel, were added last fall to teach classes in computer science.

Terminal lines to all faculty offices in the new business building will be available, with dial-up capabilities for departments which currently use the present computer system. These include the nursing, biology, business, psychology, physics, chemistry, mathematics departments.

"We plan to introduce computer use to faculty members from other departments as the need arises," Dugger said. "The use of computers is growing in a wide variety of new fields."

He pointed out that another enhancement of the new system will be the availability of

color video monitors in seven classrooms of the new business center complex. The monitors will be tied in to the computer system so that programs, keyboard demonstrations and other computer and mathematical functions can be displayed to the whole class including color graphics.

"The use of color puts us in the forefront of overall curriculums in the computer science area," said Dugger, who added that the technology is so new that it has only been on the market for about a year.

One feature about the new system that Dugger likes is its capacity for growth. "This system has 32 terminals," he said, "and conceivably with future additions of communications and memory equipment, we would have the capability of supporting more than 200 terminals."

The Vax system is a 32-bit virtual machine which will run programs of unlimited size because it uses disks as an extension of memory.

"We'll be able to run computer program from other schools without having to adapt them as we now do," he explained, "and also commercial programs which are designed for much larger systems."

Dugger also noted advantages which the new system will mean to students. "I can foresee a possible range of hours being from 6 a.m. to midnight Monday through Saturday," he said, "in contrast to the shorter hours now available."

He explained that with all terminals housed in one central location, problems such as security and staffing could be more readily solved. Presently student terminals

are located in the American Studies and science buildings.

"We will also be providing increased opportunities for practical experience by using students in as many phases of operations and programming as possible," he continued.

"Presently we have about 200 computer majors," Dugger said, "and so the student/terminal ratio is excellent. The first question a student wants to ask is 'Can I get to a terminal?'"

"Many larger schools can't provide this experience because of a large student body and lack of computer equipment. Sometimes they offer only keypunch and printout exposure, with very little terminal experiences. I feel our students are fortunate."

Dugger added that the experience will be immediately transferrable, for graduates, since the Vax system is widely used by industry also.

Looking to the future, he noted that a "significant number" of Harding students bring their own micro computers to school now, and predicted that places may someday be provided for their usage in dorms and the library. These micro-computers can be used to access the Vax system using telephone lines.

Dugger concluded by saying, "The tremendous support we've had from Dr. Ganus, the administration, Board of Trustees, students faculty and staff has made all of this possible. When people see what we have to offer, I anticipate a tremendous response in usage and growth."

Nursing Faculty to Host Workshop

The School of Nursing will sponsor a Test Construction Workshop on the Searcy campus March 1 and 2.

The workshop is designed to provide the participants with an opportunity to improve their ability to construct valid test items. Blueprinting as a method of determining the level of a test item and ways that the test writer can improve the test validity of an item will be covered. Work sessions where the participants can practice writing test items will be provided.

Moderators for the program will be Fay L. Bower, Dean of the School of Nursing, University of San Francisco, and Holly S. Wilson, an associate professor at the same university.

Bower holds the B.S. degree from San Jose State College and both the M.S. and doctorate from the University of California, San Francisco. Wilson earned the B.S.N. at Duke University and the M.S. from Case Western Reserve University. She also holds the doctorate from the University of California, San Francisco. Both have written numerous books and articles and have done research in areas of nursing.

The program will include the following: March 1 - 9:00-9:30, Introduction and Setting Expectations; 9:30-11:00, Basic

Principles of Test Construction; 11:00-12 noon, Outcomes as a Guide for the Test Blueprint; 12:00-1:30, Lunch; 1:30-2:00, The Test Blueprint and 2:00-3:00, Small Group Work.

On March 2 - 9:00-10:00, Criteria for Preparing a Test Item; 10:11:30, Small Group Work, 11:30-12:00 noon, Sharing; 12:00-1:30, Lunch; 1:30-2:30, Test Item Validity, 2:30-3:30, Small Group Work and 3:30-4:00, Wrap Up.

At the completion of the workshop, participants will be able to: 1) Use the principles of test construction to determine what is to be tested and what type of testing method is to be used; 2) Prepare a test blueprint which maps out the content of a test item and the level of the cognitive domain to be tested; 3) Use the test blueprint to construct test items at different levels of the cognitive domain; 4) Construct test items that are consistent with a test item criteria and 5) Judge the face validity of a test item.

Harding Alumnus Works to Promote Arkansas to Europeans

"Arkansas is my home," said Harding alumnus Valdy Eichmann, chief liaison and immediate past director of the European Office of the State of Arkansas, during a recent interview at his office behind the state capitol building in Little Rock.

Housed in the five-story complex nicknamed the "Big Mac" building, Eichmann's office is one of many in the fourth floor Arkansas Industrial Development Commission suite.

He and his family — wife, Beatrice, and two teen-age daughters — recently returned to Arkansas after spending the last four years in Brussels, Belgium, where the AIDC's European Office is located.

The office was first established in 1976 under the administration of former Governor David Pryor. Present Governor Frank White was director of the AIDC at that time, and helped to set up the office.

Eichmann said the original legislative intent for the creation of the office was to attract foreign investments and industrial plants to Arkansas, with the idea of a foreign trade program added almost as an afterthought.

Brussels was selected as the site for a European office because of its central location among Western European countries and because it is the capitol of the European Common Market. It is appropriately nicknamed "the hub."

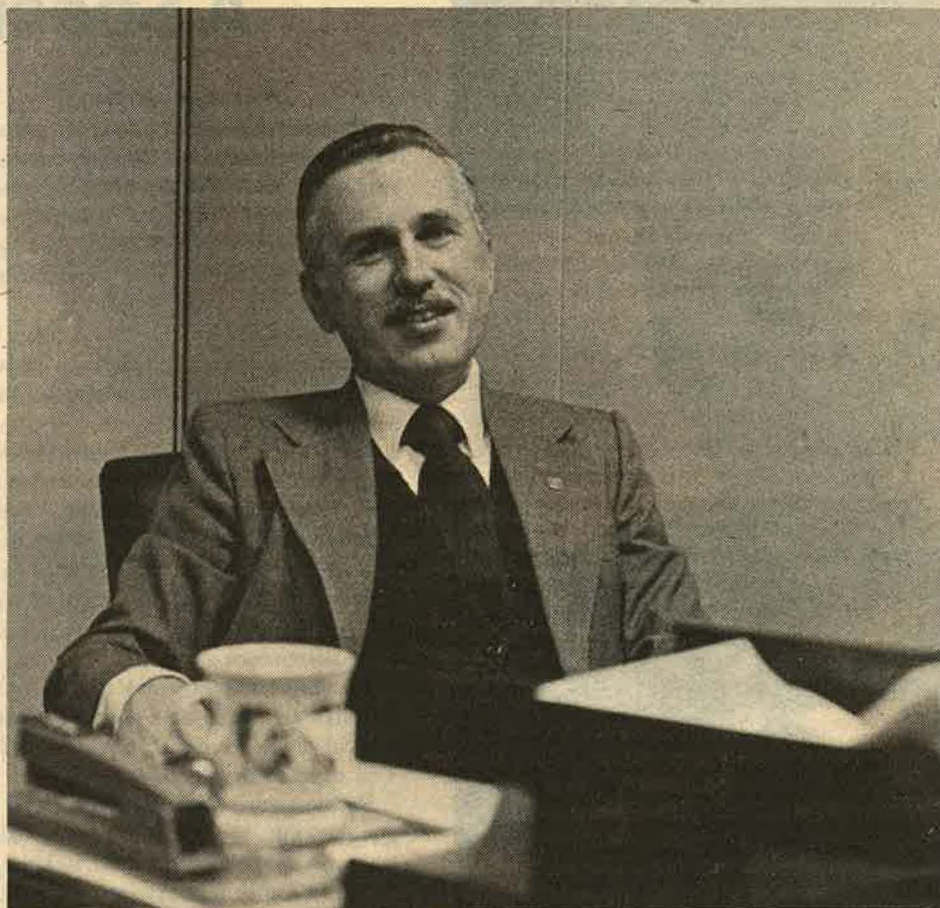
The AIDC began looking for someone to manage the Brussels office, but was unable to find anyone qualified for the position for several months. Eichmann said he was contacted about the job because of his expertise in foreign languages and because of his European nativity.

Eminently qualified in languages, he holds masters degrees in German and French from the University of Arkansas, and the Ph.D. in comparative literature from the same. Belgium is a French speaking country.

Eichmann came to America for the first time in 1959, to enroll as a freshman at Harding. Due to the advanced preparation he received in European high schools, he was given academic credit for several courses and graduated in 1961 with a degree in Biblical languages (Greek and Hebrew).

While at Harding, he met and married Beatrice Bryant. Valdy and his bride then lived in Belgium for a year and a half near his parents, who still live there, before returning to Arkansas and graduate study.

Eichmann taught at Hendrix College for four years and at the University of

Central Arkansas for seven years. Both schools are located in Conway, where the Eichmanns worship at University Church of Christ.

Eichmann was at UCA when he heard about the European job. He went to work for the AIDC in 1977 in the Brussels office and was promoted to European director in 1979.

"Teaching is enjoyable but rather sedate at times," said Valdy. "With this job no two days are ever alike. It's exciting!" he beamed.

Warming to the subject, he continued. "We cater to clients in Western Europe, Northern Africa and the Middle East. Every prospect is different. Most industrial owners in Europe are self-made men. Practically all the businesses are relatively new because the older ones were destroyed during World War II.

"Our business is people," he said, "and the common denominator in all of our activities is the creation of jobs in Arkansas.

"We are generalists, not specialists," he explained. "We are facilitators, communicators," he added, "with no authority to sign contracts for anyone.

"We do what we think is best for the state," he said. "There is no textbook to follow in this field. There are gillions of

opportunities and we simply follow up as many as we can, trying to select the ones which are most likely to prove successful.

"Our European office is like a little embassy for Arkansas," he said. "Sometimes we are called upon to assist Arkansans stranded in Europe, and other times we may be helping an Arkansas industry find some European machinery. We never know exactly what will come up, so we try to maintain an informal network of experts in various fields who we can call upon for ready information."

Eichmann said among the duties his office handles are promoting tourism in Arkansas, working with travel agencies, doing marketing studies for Arkansas-produced products, various types of research, international licensing and cross licensing, joint ventures, trade, direct investment, setting up trade fairs for certain types of products, and attracting new industries.

The job requires a lot of traveling. "We try to maintain a constant flow of Arkansans flying to Europe and Europeans flying to Arkansas," he said. These visitors require hosts, tour guides and briefing sessions. The European office helps to provide them.

"One of our biggest jobs, somewhat of an intangible, is to interpret cultural differences for people," he said. Mannerisms of dress, speech, time of day, temperament, expression and other cultural variables often enter into a potential business relationship, and must be explained and resolved in order to bring about a successful conclusion.

Eichmann is understandably proud of the record his office has established since opening nearly five years ago. The first fiscal report showed a net increase of two million dollars annually in foreign trade. That figure rose to eight, then 16, and finally 20 million dollars in succeeding years. In 1982 the estimate is from 23 to 25 million dollars in trade.

In addition, the office has helped to locate three European industrial plants in Arkansas, one each in Osceola, Clarksville and Jesseville.

"We more than pay for ourselves," Eichmann said. "In fact, we're one of the few government agencies that brings in money as opposed to spending it."

The European office, now directed by Wayne Wagner, is one of seven divisions in the AIDC. Some of the others include finance, research, international marketing, and industrial consulting.

"The AIDC offers package services so that we can meet any of all of the needs a particular individual or company may have," Eichmann said.

He is presently dividing his time between Brussels and Little Rock, where his family is now settled. He also makes several additional transoceanic flights each year.

Eventually he hopes to remain in Little Rock for most, if not all, of the year. Currently he is helping with the transition period necessary for a new director to get accustomed to the job.

Eichmann cited the reason for returning to Arkansas as primarily an educational move for his two daughters, who have been exposed to the rather intense and demanding European educational system with its mastery of other languages required, and who are now ready for another dose of American culture, he feels.

But somehow this statement doesn't hide another motive. "Arkansas is my home," Valdy repeats. "I've lived or worked here for the last 23 years, and it's the only state in this country that I've ever lived in.

"To sell a product you've got to know and appreciate it. And that's the way I feel about Arkansas," he concluded. And obviously he has done a good job of selling Arkansas, its people and products.

With the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference race getting underway, Harding University carries an 8-5 record into the rugged 18-game schedule.

Coach Jess Bucy's squad has been riddled with injuries but has managed a winning record nonetheless.

"This has to be one of the most unusual seasons we've ever had," the veteran coach said. "Ankle injuries have been the most severe problem, but that's something we'll just have to overcome."

Just before and during the holidays, freshman Troy Sanstra of Littleton, Colo., junior starter Hubie Smith of Memphis, and senior starters David Presley of Harrison, Ark. and Alan Pearson of Amory, Miss. have been sidelined.

Bison senior Charles Gardner of Searcy

has been the team's scoring leader with 233 points for a 17.9 average per game. He also paces the rebounding effort with an average of 9.0 per game.

Also averaging in double figures for the Bisons are 6-3 sophomore Lawrence McNutt of Forrest City and 6-8 sophomore Allen Gibbons of North Little Rock. McNutt has 10.8 points per game, and Gibbons is up to 10.7 points per game.

Smith is approaching the school assist record with 386 assists against Tim Vick's existing mark of 398. He should establish a record well before the season is completed.

Teamwise the Bisons are shooting .479 from the field and .732 on 219 of 299 free throws for a 70.5 ppg. scoring average. Defensively, the Bisons are allowing 67.4 ppg.

Ohio.

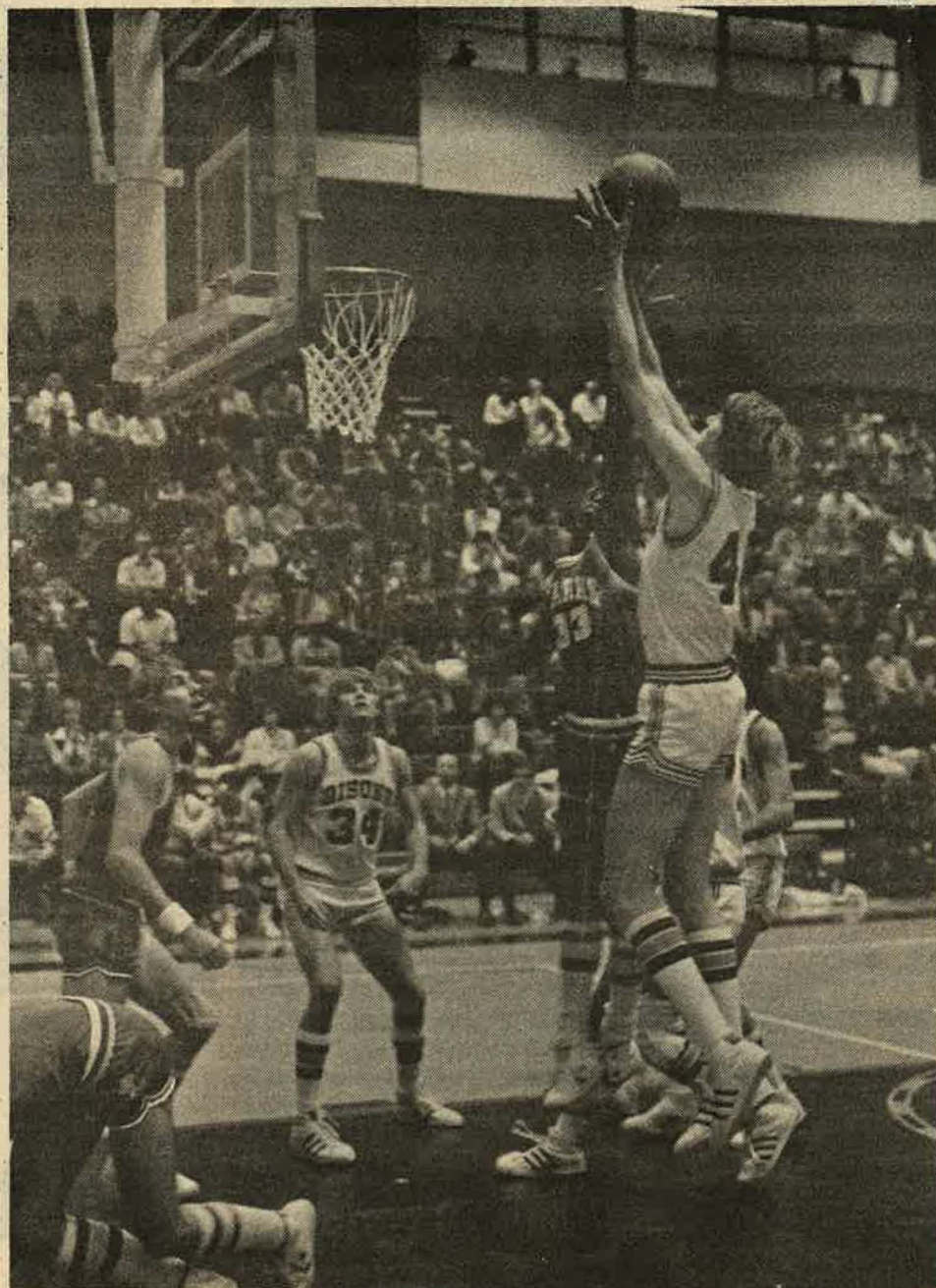
On the 1981 season Harding won the AIC title for the 16th time and the NAIA district title for the 9th time. The Bisons went on to place 76th in the NAIA national meet.

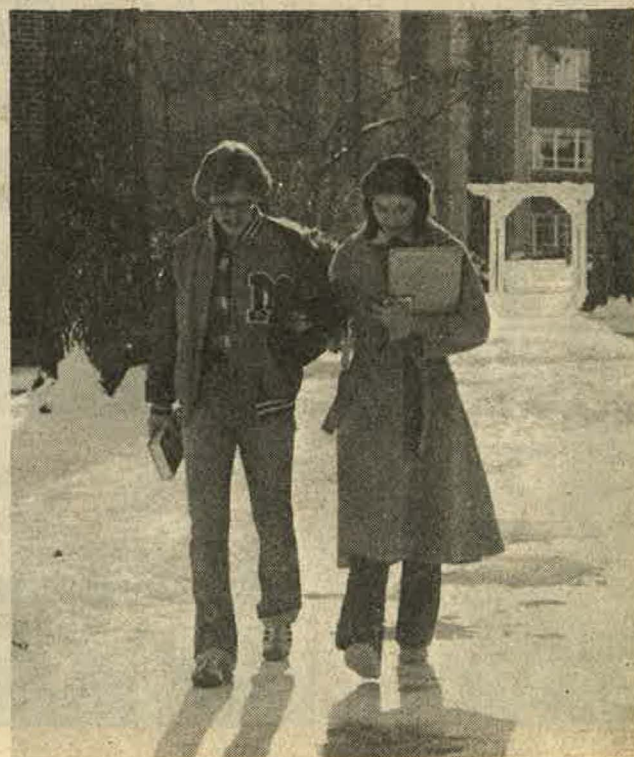
