## Ganus Is Designated As First Chancellor

Dr. Clifton L. Ganus Jr., who will retire in May after 22 years as President of Harding University, has been named the school's first Chancellor by the Board of Trustees.

The appointment will be effective in May, 1987, when Dr. David Burks will assume the presidency of the University.

Board Chairman James H. Cone of Little Rock who made the announcement following the Board's fall meeting Nov. 7, "Dr. Ganus has been a central figure in Christian education throughout his professional life," Cone said, "and he will continue to play an important role in the work of Harding University. The appointment will not entail administrative responsibilities, but we want his talents, abilities and experience to continue to be of great benefit not only to Harding but to her constituents as well."

The Board received a recommendation for the action by Dr. Burks, Dean of Harding's School of Business and Director of the American Studies Program.

"I am very pleased that Dr. Ganus will be Harding's first chancellor," Dr. Burks said. "I

recommended this to the Board and I feel that Dr. Ganus, in this position, can continue to be a powerful influence for good for Harding University after his retirement as President. He will work in public relations, development, and other areas as needed. I am happy that he is willing to continue to serve Harding in this important capacity."

Ganus has been associated with Harding since he enrolled as a freshman in 1939. He joined the faculty as a history teacher in 1946 and served as vice president before assuming the presidency in 1965.

## Kissinger Will Highlight American Studies Lectures

Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger will highlight the spring American Studies Lecture Series. Other speakers will include Gifford Pinchot III, author and management consultant; Gene Stallings, head coach of the St. Louis Cardinals football team and Howard Phillips, founder of the Conservative Caucus.

Pinchot will present the one-day Management Seminar on Feb. 17, Stallings will speak Feb. 26, Phillips will follow on Mar. 19 and Kissinger will close the series in April. "We have a top line-up of speakers," said Dr. David B. Burks, director of the Harding American Studies program. "We believe their presentations will be timely and very beneficial and interesting to our students and the Searcy community."

The Management Seminar with Pinchot will be Feb. 17. Pinchot is founder and chairman of Pinchot and Company and is a well-known lecturer and management consultant. He is on the faculty of the School for Entrepreneurs in Tarrytown, N.Y.

He graduated from Harvard University with a bachelor's degree in economics and attended John Hopkins University where he studied mathematical sociology and behavioral physiology. His book, *INTRAPRENEURING Why You Don't Have To leave The Corporation To Becone An Entrepreneur* assists people to successfully innovate within large corporations.

Stallings will speak on the Harding campus on Feb. 26. He served 12 years as a player or coach under Paul Bryant at Texas A & M and Alabama, and another 14 seasons as a Dallas

Cowboy assistant under Tom Landry.

He was associated with 12 playoff clubs there including Cowboys' squads that won six divisional titles, three conference championships and one Super Bowl title. He served as head coach at Texas A & M for seven years.

He is active as a Special Olympics volunteer and fund-raiser for disadvantaged children's homes, and makes speaking appearances for Parent Teachers Association groups, Boys Clubs, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and high school functions.

Stallings was elected to the Texas A & M Hall of Fame in 1982, received the National Boys

Club's Alumni of the Year Award and in 1983 Dallas Father of the Year award. He is the ninth coach of the St. Louis Cardinals football team.

Phillips will speak Mar. 19. He launced The Conservative Caucus in November, 1974, with the stated goal of rallying conservative sentiment at the grass-roots level to counter entrenched liberal special interests. As president of Policy Analysis, Inc., Phillips is a public policy and business consultant, publishing several newsletters including *Conservative Manifesto*, the *Howard Phillips' Issues & Strategy Bulletin*, and the *Howard Phillips' Washington Report*.

He entered Harvard College at the age of 17 and was twice elected president of the Harvard Student Council. He was on the founding board of directors of Young Americans for Freedom, helped organize Youth for Nixon, chaired the Committee for an Effective Peace Corps, and served three terms as chairman of the Massachusetts College Republican Federation.

He served as chairman of "Opportunities, Unlimited," a national-wide leadership recruitment program to involve young people and minorities in the work of the GOP. He was then named deputy director of the President's Council on Youth Opportunity.

Phillips led a campaign in opposition to ratification of the treaties to surrender the U.S. Canal and Zone at the isthmus of Panama, he worked to block ratification of the Carter/Breshnev SALT II treaty, and undertook a campaign to promote the concept of a global ballistic missile defense.

Dr. Kissinger will close the series on Apr. 28. He was sworn in on Sept. 22, 1973 as the 56th Secretary of State, a position he held until Jan. 20, 1977. He has also served as Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs.

Currently, Kissinger is Chairman of Kissinger Associates, Inc., an international consulting firm. Since leaving the Department of State, he has occupied the positions of University Professor of Diplomacy at the School of Foreign Service and Counselor to the Center for Strategic and International Studies, both of Georgetown University.

He was appointed in 1983 by President Ronald Reagan to Chair the National Bipartisan Commission on Central America. He is also a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, a Counselor to the Chase Manhattan Bank and a member of its International Advisory Committee, and an honorary Governor of the Foreign Policy Association.

Kissinger received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1973; the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian award, in 1977 and the Medal of Liberty in 1986. He is on the board of directors to American Express Co., a trustee of the Rockefeller Brothers Fund and of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and contributing analyst for ABC news.

## Rodriguez Will Keynote December Commencement

Harding University December graduation ceremonies will take place Dec. 19 with Joseph Rodriguez, founder, president and chief executive officer of Heritage Hotels of Memphis presenting the commencement address.

Approximately 138 students will receive degrees including 45 bachelor of arts, 10 bachelor of science, four master of education, two master of science in education, three bachelor of science in nursing, 47 bachelor of business administration, one bachelor of music education, 23 bachelor of art in education, one bachelor of science in medical technology, and one master of science in accounting.

Rodriguez was also a founder, president and partner of Horizons Management, Inc.; senior vice president and chief operation officer of Servico, Inc.; and vice president of marketing sales for Holiday Inns, Inc.

He received the bachelor of business administration degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1966 and the masters from Inter American University. He was awarded the honorary doctor of laws degree from Oklahoma Christian College.

Rodriguez is on the board of directors of several corporations and is a member of the

# Dean Sears Succumbs: 'The Best Is Yet To Be'

Dr. Lloyd Cline Sears, dean emeritus and former chairman of the English department, died Nov. 17 in a Searcy hospital following a brief illness. He was 91.

Still referred to as "Dean Sears," although he retired from that position nearly 30 years ago, he had been a familiar figure around the Harding campus since its founding. As late as two weeks before his death, he could be seen on his daily stroll to the student center to check mail, a ritual that had become more labored as his body had begun to show decline through stooped shoulders and a slowed pace.

Former students, colleagues and current students recalled his contributions. "He was a giant in the history of Harding University, one who blazed the trail of success," President Clifton Ganus said at the funeral at the College Church of Christ, where Sears had served as an elder for many years. "Gentle" and "kind" were words frequently used to describe the pioneer educator who was respected in educational circles, especially as a Shakespearean scholar.

He was active in civic and professional organizations, had preached since 1910 in churches throughout Arkansas and neighboring states, and was the author of five books, the most recent being his autobiography, *What Is Your Life?*

Dr. Sears was born May 13, 1895, one of nine children of James Matthias and Martha Ellen Hunter Sears, on a farm near Odon, Ind. The family moved to Oklahoma in 1903. After one year of high school, he entered Cordell Christian College, where he came under the influence of J. N. Armstrong, the school's president who also became Harding's first president. He met and married the Armstrongs' daughter, Pattie Hathaway Armstrong, who preceded him in death in 1977.

Dr. Sears completed the B.A. from Cordell and received another B.A. from the University of Oklahoma. Later he earned the M.A. from the University of Kansas, and the Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.

From 1925-41 he served as a member of the Harding Board of Trustees and in 1966 was named the school's Distinguished Alumnus.

Dr. Sears was extremely diligent in securing accreditation for Harding, and was cited by the Danforth Foundation which noted his study, "A College Examines Itself," as an example of an excellent study.

In 1981, a women's residence hall on the Harding campus was named "L. C. Sears Hall" in honor of his service to the University.

At his retirement as Dean, he had quoted from Browning's "Rabbi Ben Ezra," a poem which he often used since in expressing his own sentiments. "Grow old along with me! The best is yet to be, The last of life for which the first was made: Our times are in his hand Who said 'A Whole I planned, Youth shows but half; trust God: See all, nor be afraid!'"

Dr. Sears is survived by two sons, Jack Wood Sears of Searcy and James Kern Sears of Webster Groves, Mo.; seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held at the College Church of Christ, with Richard Pectol, minister of the Downtown Church; President Ganus and Mike Cope, College Church minister, in charge. Burial was in White County Memorial Gardens in Searcy.

### Travis Thompson

W. Travis Thompson — Associate Professor of Mathematics and Computer Science; B.A. (1967), Harding University; M.S. (1973), Northeast Louisiana University; Ph.D. (1977), University of Arkansas

Travis Thompson arrived on the Harding campus just more than a year ago and, according to Dean Priest, Arts and Sciences Dean, has brought a "fresh approach for us to think about," and is "...a really wonderful addition to the Harding staff."

Thompson's graduate work is in theoretical math, but he did some statistical study prior to joining Harding's faculty at the request of the administration, because Harding needed depth in that area.

His unlimited energy, coupled with his expertise in writing proposals for grants, have resulted in securing a \$50,000 AEGIS grant (Academic Enrichment for the Gifted and Talented in Summer program) which was implemented last summer.

In addition, he has had several articles accepted for publication in scholarly journals. One, "Synthetic Division for Polynomials — More Than Just P(S)," was accepted this year in the *Mathematics and Computer Education Journal*, and "Sequentially Closed Graphs" was accepted by the *Yokohama Journal of Mathematics* in Japan.

During November he presented a workshop at the national AMATYC (American

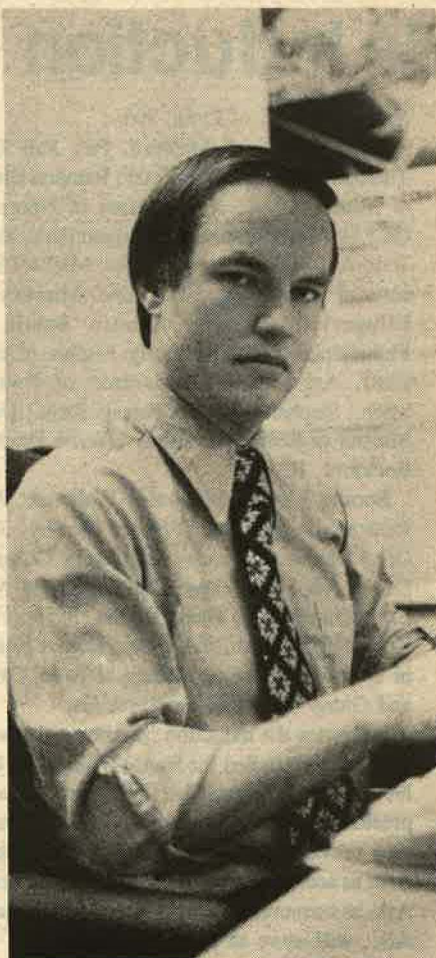
Mathematical Association for Two-Year Colleges) meeting in San Francisco on "Operations Research In the Liberal Arts."

Returning to Harding was the fulfillment of a long range goal for Thompson and his wife, the former Linda Minor, a 1972 graduate who is directing the school's new PASS program initiated this fall. Enroute, they were with several other schools, the most recent being Northeast Louisiana University.

The classroom and writing do not consume all of his time or talent. Thompson is in charge of Deaf Ministry at the College Church of Christ, an involvement stemming from his days at Harding when he learned the sign language through the Dactylogy Club.

"He has brought a wealth of new ideas to our campus," said Priest. "He's an enormously deep think-tank in and of himself. He is always coming to my office with new ideas; challenging us to look at old concepts in a new way."

Thompson's "fresh approach" hasn't worn off. In his first year at Harding, he has contributed a refreshing perspective to the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science and to Harding University.

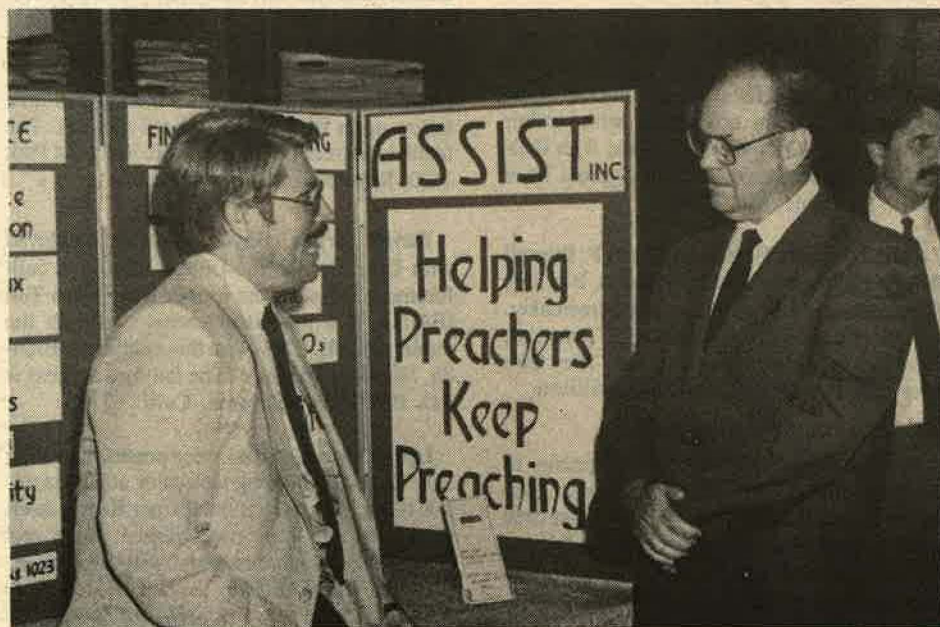
"We had consistently better crowds at night

Houston Ezell, a successful Nashville, Tenn., land developer and investor, attributes all his achievements in the business world to a Senior Partner.

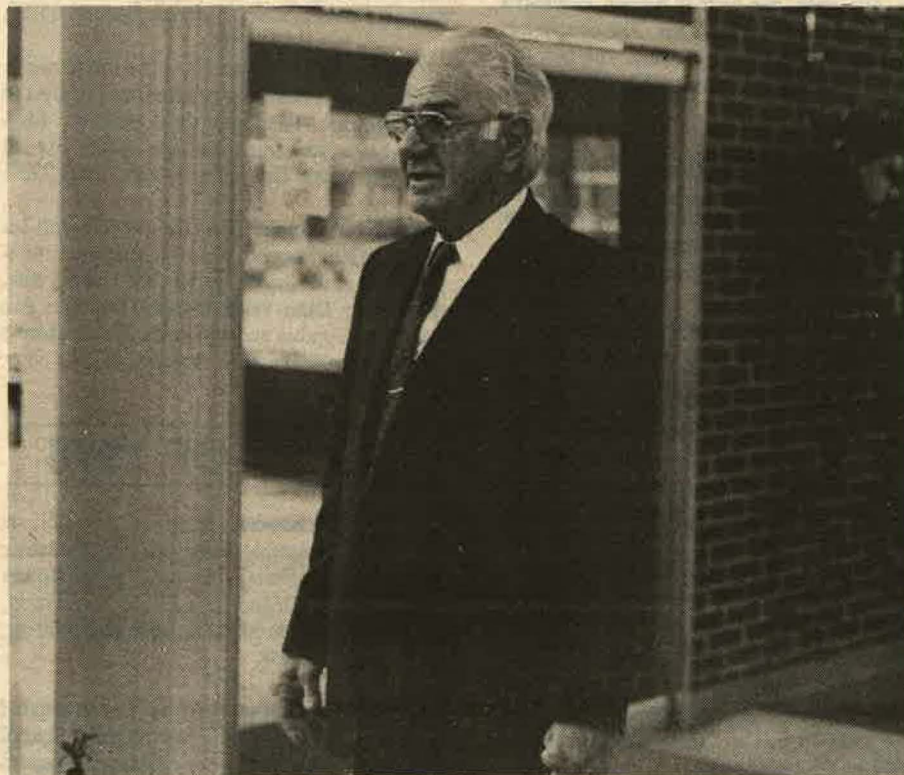
Also, Ezell says he receives direction from his Senior Partner in his leadership roles at Vultee Church of Christ, where he has served as elder for 32 years, and Ezell-Harding Christian School, a private secondary school located in Nashville and recognized as one of the largest in the nation.

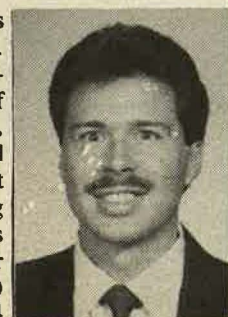

# Green Is Not The Bushwhacker He Once Was

## WANTED

If this ad had appeared in the *Harding Bulletin* 30 years ago, only one person would have qualified.

When Louis Green of Newark, Del., was first added to the Board of Trustees in 1950, he was not added on the basis of these qualifications. But they do cause him to smile and reminisce about his years at Harding in the early 1940's.

Green, a 1942 graduate with a degree in chemistry, was part of an ingenious group of students that engineered that now famous "private telephone system" between the boys' and girls' dormitories. A single telephone line connected the boys in Godden Hall with the coeds in Pattie Cobb Hall.

The thirty-foot line was strung between the two buildings with the ample assistance of a marksman with a bow and arrow. "Once the line was in place, it became my responsibility to make the system work," explained Green. "Fortunately the thing worked, and we were able to communicate after curfew."

"We really took pride in our ingenuity and how we had slipped one by the administration. Today I have a feeling that our telephone line did not fool anyone. Our ingenuity was probably tolerated."

Green remembered the 1940's version of Student Impact when this year more than 100 upperclassmen came to school early to help arriving freshmen get oriented to the Harding campus.

"Several of us would come back to Searcy early in the fall to help the new students get ready for the semester. I would drive one

of the few cars on campus to the Kensett (Ark.) railroad station to meet the 4:30 a.m. train bringing students to the campus for the first time.

"I can remember meeting a young lady early one morning. Before she even got off the train, she began to cry. She was ten hours from home and already homesick. She cried the entire way from Kensett as I dodged the potholes in the road, trying to make the trip as smooth as possible. In those days that was quite an undertaking. When I left her, she was standing in the middle of her room crying," he said. She did overcome her homesickness and graduated four years later.

Green's status as a "bushwhacker" needs some explanation. Green and several of his friends formed the Bushwhackers Club. All the members of the club were not dating, and their chief goal was to bushwhack their friends who were dating.

The club members would first select a target (a male friend who had a date for a particular evening). Then one or more members of the club would arrive at Pattie Cobb Hall 15 to 20 minutes early and call for the unsuspecting coed.

When she appeared, the bushwhackers would try eloquently to persuade her to forego her date and go out instead with the bushwhacker. "Sometimes the novelty of the situation caused us to be successful, but more often than not, we were unsuccessful; but we had fun trying."

"I can remember one of our more successful attempts. We were able to talk Louise Nicholas into changing her plans. I will never forget the look on Cliff Ganus' face as Louise strolled out of the dormitory between two bushwhackers just as he arrived for his date with her."

Needless to say, this club was not the most popular on campus and soon faded into oblivion as the club members found other ways to get dates.

Harding was small in 1942 (only 37 in his graduating class), but Green has a list of his fondest memories that would take him hours to describe. That list includes chorus trips, intramural sports, intercollegiate baseball and catching for the famed Preacher Roe.

His memories, however, do not just span

a four-year period. He married the former Elizabeth Arnold, also a member of the '42 class, and the couple has three daughters.

Together the family has shared the experiences and memories of Anita, Sandra and Betty as all three attended Harding. Green anticipates his granddaughter will enroll next year at Harding, making the Green family another in the growing list of third generation Harding families.

For 24 years Green worked in research laboratories for Standard Oil of Indiana (now Amoco). For the past 19 years he has worked for Hewlett Packard, designing and developing specialized instruments for the petroleum industry. His work has carried him to 40 different countries, including a major assignment for the government of Iraq.

Although he officially retired in October, he will continue to serve as a consultant for Hewlett Packard.

He began preaching when he was attending Harding and has continued to do so on what he calls a "full part-time" basis ever since. He has preached for congregations in Indiana, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Delaware.

In the 1942 *Petit Jean* his classmates described Green as "friendly to all . . . never shows anger . . . noted for clear-cut, decisive and intelligent speeches . . . cannot be replaced here."

These characteristics and many others influenced his classmates to elect him president of his class. In 1950 when the Board of Trustees was looking for a man capable of providing leadership for the school, Louis Green was chosen.

In 1971 the Alumni Association chose him as its Distinguished Alumnus. By then his leadership qualities had made most people forget that he had once been a "bushwhacker."

# Enthusiastic 'Feel' to Homecoming '86

"We had a large number of people here," Alumni Director David Crouch said of Homecoming Nov. 7-8, "but numbers don't relate the warmth and enthusiasm that was so much a part of the weekend."

Only the weatherman showed non-cooperation during the event, and even at that the Friday rains subsided for Saturday, and the soggy ground failed to thwart the spirit of returning alumni.

Overall, Crouch termed the 1986 Homecoming "...the best yet," and he feels the pattern has been established for similar and expanded weekends in the future.

The Black and Gold opening banquet was attended by 468, the largest number ever, to hear President Clifton Ganus relate "Five Decades at Harding." Emcee George Tipps kept the crowd entertained.

"We used our last available table to seat eight, even though it was a table for six," Crouch said, "but the occupants didn't mind a bit. In fact, I tried to apologize for the inconvenience and they scoffed at the idea. It's that spirit that we feel is a mark of our alumni."

Crouch also lauded cafeteria manager Kevin O'Leary and his staff and John Ryan, chairman of the dinner.

More than 7,600 attended the three outstanding performances of "Annie" by a cast and crew of 100 in Benson Auditorium, including nearly 3,000 area school children who came to the campus for a special matinee Thursday afternoon.

Director C. Robin Miller attributed part of the success to the improved sound system made possible through the eight body microphones

secured for the production. Another aspect was the selection of major roles last spring, allowing adequate preparation time, he said.

Saturday morning's "Apples and Annie" breakfast in Hammon Student Center was a "standing room only" affair, but again no one seemed to mind, Crouch noted. Chairman Ron Copeland used an all-apple-based menu, except for the orange juice and coffee, to serve the 450 plus who packed the lobby and halls.

The crowds dispersed for Alumni Chapel, with the Class of '61 in charge, where an audience of nearly 500 in the Heritage Auditorium held a devotional and heard remarks from the 25-year reunion class.

Reunions of five-year increment classes attracted more than 800 alumni, with 125 registering for the 25-year Class of '61. The members attended a luncheon in the Olen Hendrix building, where newly elected members of the Alumni Association served as greeters. Crouch praised alumni who live in Searcy, accrediting them with the success of the gatherings. "These local alumni and their spouses made this possible. Without their help, we simply couldn't arrange this. These local alumni are tremendous," he said.

Crouch also said that approximately 32,500 letters, brochures or reminders were mailed to reunion class members in advance of Homecoming weekend. Doris Coward, office secretary, coordinated the mailouts, sending a minimum of four pieces of correspondence to each group. "This was another asset," Crouch added, "because we kept folks informed of what was developing."

"We are also planning to add some new activities for 1987," he added. The Homecoming Committee is investigating the possibility of offering a noon buffet on Saturday to enhance and assist visitors to the campus.

Traditional gatherings, such as social clubs and departmental reunions, were held throughout the day, ranging from receptions and open houses to dinners, attracted record numbers. The A Cappella chorus reunion was one of the biggest ever, said Dr. Kenneth Davis Jr., A Cappella director. The group of 250 voices sang special tribute to L. O. Sanderson, who was present, and to the late Andy T. Ritchie, represented by Mrs. Ritchie. Sanderson is an alumnus of 1928, a songwriter and composer of the Alma Mater who now resides in Memphis. He was also the first graduate recognized in 1960 when the Distinguished Alumnus award was started.

Crouch said that plans are already underway for the 1987 celebration, which will be Oct. 30-31.

# Alumnus David Slater Reaches for the Stars

"When I'm rich and famous..." Something we all say, but relatively few achieve. For Harding alumnus, David Slater, this goal is becoming a reality, at least the famous part.

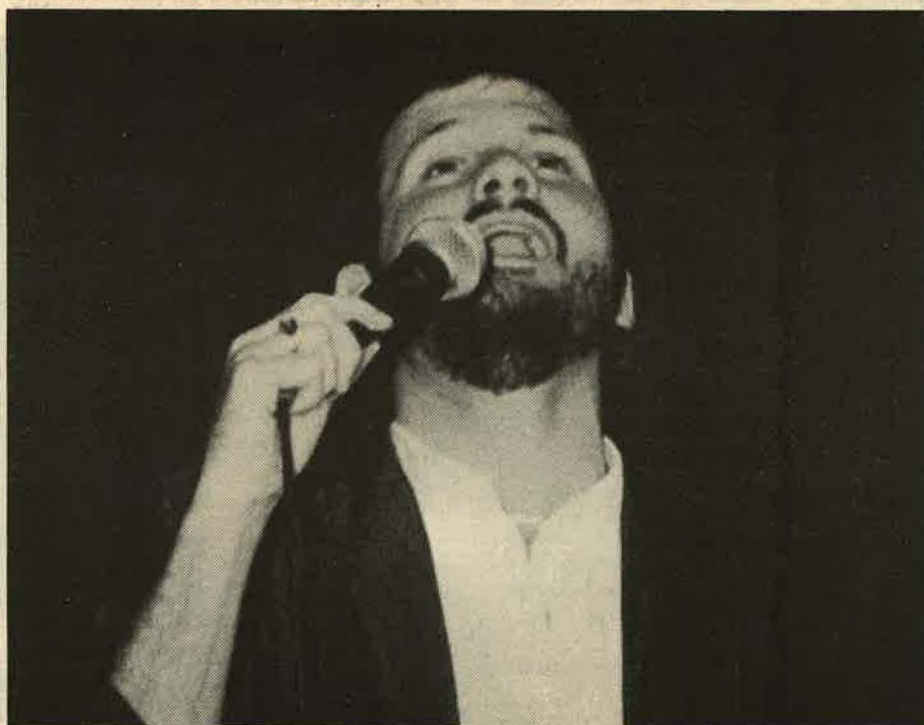
After reigning male vocalist for six shows in a row on television's talent show "Star Search," Slater won the semi-final competition which was taped Oct. 21 and he will compete in about a month for the final prize, a recording contract and about \$100,000. That show will be aired in a few months.

Slater was noticed by Star Search talent scouts while singing at Opryland. "There was a group there that just needed a singer," he said. "They were kind of in a bind, so I said I could fill in for one summer." Slater was invited to audition for Star Search. "After I auditioned they invited me to come over," he added.

Slater likened Star Search to summer camp. "It's like a family. You get to know some people and you hate to see them lose.

"They (Star Search) fly you to Los Angeles, Calif., put you up, feed you and really take care of you while you're out there," he said.

So far, Slater doesn't admit to having to compromise his Christianity for his entertainment career. "I've always heard that it was difficult, but I haven't experienced that yet," he said. "I think as long as you continue to study, to go to church and to be surrounded by Christians...Surround yourself

with Christians. That's the only way you can stay strong.

"The entertainment industry needs a good influence. I have not been looked down on. People respect you for not taking a drink or not using a curse word. When they're around you, they try not to do it as much. That's

been my experience."

Slater credits much of his Christian influence to Harding. "I learned how to be a Christian here," he said. "Harding does everything it advertises itself to do. It roots and grounds people in Christianity."

Slater left Harding after three and a half

years to pursue a musical career in Nashville, Tenn., with Slater, Wells and Company, a trio including Harding alumni Kent and Marcia Wells. He also attended David Lipscomb College for two quarters.

When he left he said, "It's hard for me to leave Harding. I'll miss everything about it. I feel Harding is the best school the brotherhood has to offer, but for me, it's in the wrong town."

Harding may be in the wrong town, but Slater keeps coming back. At Homecoming last fall, Slater, Wells and Company were featured in the Alumni Variety Show and recently, Slater returned to perform in the Associated Women for Harding benefit program.

In fact, since Slater and Wells parted company, he has supported himself writing songs under a contract with New London Music Co. Songs recorded by other artists bring royalties when people buy the record and the song is played on the radio. "People's Court" recorded by Ray Stevens is one such song that Slater wrote.

Slater also played the piano for singer Keith Whitley and is prominently featured in the video of "Miami My Amy."

Larry McFadden, who manages Lee Greenwood, signed Slater and has big plans for his career. "He's going to do the same things for me that he did for Lee Greenwood," Slater said. What kinds of things? "Well, just make me a star."

# Forte Receives National Award; Named Defensive Player of the Week

Noseguard Kenneth Forte was named the national "Defensive Player of the Week" by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) for his performance in the Bisons' 24-3 victory over 19th ranked Ouachita Baptist University.

The announcement was made by Bonnie Morrow of the NAIA office in Kansas City, Mo.

A 5-11, 232 lb. junior, Forte had the kind of day defensive linemen dream of. He was credited with eight tackles, two quarterback sacks, two fumble recoveries and a pass interception which he returned 16 yards.

"That's a real fine honor for him," Bison head coach John Prock said. "He had a great day and it's great for him to get the national recognition."

With Forte leading the way, the Bison defense was on the receiving end of five turnovers, recovering three fumbles and intercepting two passes. For the Little Rock native, the interception was his first.

"That was my first catch of any kind in college," said the former high school tightend. "It

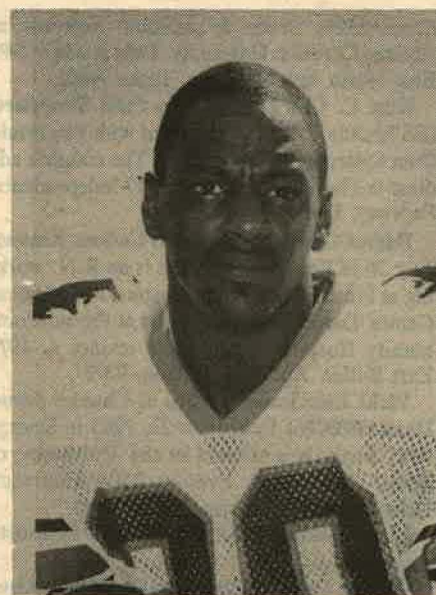
was definitely a dream come true. It's every lineman's dream to get an interception. Of course, I wish I could've scored."

Forte said half the credit for the interception belongs to linebacker Brooks Davis. "He stunted through and pressured the quarterback to throw early and I was waiting right in the middle of the screen," Forte said.

On the strength of his performance, Forte's season statistics now show 52 solo tackles, 37 assists, nine tackles for minus 37 yards, three and one-half quarterback sacks, three fumble recoveries and one interception.

"Everybody was up for the game," he said. "We had a team meeting Friday night and we really got ready to play OBU. We hadn't beaten them since I've been here and we all wanted to get something started. Everybody had a great game Saturday."

## Cathey, Forte Named All-AIC; Bisons Close 'Near Miss' Campaign

Following a rollercoaster pattern, the Harding Bisons posted a 4-5-1 record for the 1986 football campaign.

Two Bison players, halfback Daron Cathey and noseguard Kenneth Forte were selected to the All-Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 honor teams.

"This has been an unusual season in a lot of ways," Bison head coach John Prock said. "We've had some really fine games and a couple of near misses that would have been nice to have won. But we've had tremendous effort on the part of our young men and that's what I'm proudest of."

Early season optimism was tempered by the loss of top running back Glenn Segars of Lithonia, Ga. in the opening game. Senior quarterback Mannie Lowery of Little Rock stepped forward to lead the Bison offense and nail down a Parents' Night victory over Evangel College 24-7.

Other victories were a 17-0 shutout of the University of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, an 18-6 victory over Henderson State and a 24-3 win over Ouachita Baptist University. In the second game of the season the Bisons tied Tarleton State (Texas) 17-17.

"We lost two games (Southeastern Oklahoma

and the University of Arkansas-Monticello by a total of nine points," Prock said, "but the one that really hurt was the last second loss to Southern Arkansas." At the annual Homecoming weekend Nov. 7-8 the Bisons fell 14-10 in the final seconds to SAU.

Lowery has been the offensive leader for the Bisons as he accounted for 992 yards of total offense. Careerwise he has accumulated 2,883 yards and passed for 15 touchdowns. Fullback Daron Cathey, a fleet-footed senior from Coldwater, Miss., is the leading rusher and all-purpose back. He has rushed for 528 yards, caught nine passes for 62 yards, returned 28 punts for 287 yards and 2.2 kickoffs for 508 yards. With 1,387 all-purpose yards this year and 1,289 as a junior, Cathey has accounted for 2,676 yards since transferring to Harding from junior college.

"The kids have played some really fine football this season," Prock said, "especially against Ouachita Baptist."

Rounding out their collegiate careers are six Bison seniors. They are Cathey, defensive back Chris East of St. Petersburg, Fla., defensive end John Fox of Searcy, punter Paul Golden of Cadogan Gap, Ark., Lowery and defensive back Chris McDavid of Dallas, Texas.

Segars and linebacker Steve Dudley of St. Petersburg also are classed as seniors. Because of early season injuries they have applied for hardship consideration from the NAIA so they can be eligible to play in 1987.

"This has been a fine group of young men," Prock said. "They have made a great contribution to our program and to Harding University. It's going to be hard to see them leave."

# Men and Women Dominate AIC, District 17 Cross Country

Harding's cross country teams claimed a double victory, Nov. 5, as the Bisons captured a 16th consecutive Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference championship and the Lady Bisons took their second title in six years of competition.

With the AIC meet being run concurrently with the NAIA District 17 championship, the wins placed both Harding teams in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics National Championship Meet in Kenosha, Wis., Nov. 15.

The Bisons, led by senior Eddie Neal of Griffithville, Ark., took the number two, four, five, six and seven spots in the five-mile AIC race for a low score of 24, outdistancing the next team by 23 points.

Freshman Melynda Davis of Gresham, Ore. paced the Lady Bisons with a first-place finish setting a new record for the hilly, 3.12-mile course at the Bald Knob (Ark.) Country Club. Harding's next four runners finished in the top 11 of the district and the top eight of the conference, giving the Lady Bisons the double victory.

For the Bisons All-AIC and All-District honors went, in respective order, to Neal, Jon Murray of Carthage, Mo., Rich Lockhart of Grand Blanc, Mich., Darryl Halbert of Lakewood, Colo. and Jon Partlow of Portland, Ore.

For the Lady Bisons All-AIC honors went to Davis, Beverly Gardner of Fort Worth, Cheryl Bednosky of Shelter Island, N.Y., Jodie Murray of Carthage, Mo. and Joan Cigrang of

Westminster, Md. Davis, Gardner, Bednosky and Murray received All-District designation also.

At the national meet the Bisons sought to use a strategy which included starting out fast in order to not get bogged down in the pack. Despite the strategy, Harding's top five runners failed to keep pace with their outstanding AIC

performances. The result was a 21st place team finish in the 41-team field.

The Lady Bisons, after being away from the national meet for four years, turned in a respectable performance. The women placed 23rd out of 35 teams.

A high note, however, was that Harding had a runner from each team named Academic All-American. Halbert claimed the honor for the Bisons and Murray won the designation for the Lady Bisons.

Halbert was the top finisher for the Bisons placing 92nd in a field of more than 300 runners. Other runners scoring for Harding came in at 99th, 107th, 123rd and 135th.

Davis led the Lady Bisons in 28th place, just three slots shy of grabbing All-American honors. Bednosky, another mainstay of the team throughout the regular season, did not run because of a foot injury. The remaining runners scoring for Harding finished 105th, 166th, 172nd and 178th.
