Mabee Grant is Largest in School's History

The Mabee Foundation of Tulsa has announced a \$1.25 million challenge grant to Harding University. The grant is the largest single gift ever received by the 64-year old private university.

The Mabee grant will be used in a \$5 million renovation and expansion project involving three buildings on the Harding campus. The three structures are the John Mabee American Heritage Center, Pattie Cobb Residence Hall and Beaumont Memorial Library.

To meet the conditions of the grant, Harding must secure \$2.5 million in gifts and pledges by December 31, 1988. Approximately \$1.25 million has already been raised toward the \$2.5 million challenge goal.

Funding for the entire \$5 million project is expected to be secured between July and December, 1988.

"We are certainly excited about this significant challenge from the Mabee Foundation," said Dr. David

Burks, president of Harding. "The grant will provide the impetus to complete our \$5 million fund raising goal.

"The Mabee Foundation has been very supportive of Harding's program for more than three decades. The \$1.25 million challenge grant is an indication of the foundation's continued interest in Christian, private higher education in Arkansas."

In the \$5 million project, \$2.85 million has been designated for expansion and renovation of the Mabee American Heritage Center. The renovation of Pattie Cobb Hall will cost \$1.15 million. The expansion and renovation of Beaumont Memorial Library will cost \$1 million.

The renovation of Pattie Cobb Hall will be completed in August. Construction on the library addition will be in May, 1989, as will the renovation of the Mabee American Heritage Center.

Construction has already started on a 14,000-square-

foot addition to the cafeteria in the Mabee American Heritage Center. With the expansion, the cafeteria will have a seating capacity for 1,100 students. The existing dining space will be renovated and the kitchen completely refurbished.

The Mabee American Heritage Center was completed in 1965 to serve as a major continuing education center for the university community. Because of enrollment demands, it has been used for the last 10 years as a classroom building in addition to other uses.

The third and fourth floors of the building (50 rooms) will be converted into hotel-type rooms for conference guests and others who visit the campus. The facility will be used for conferences throughout the year.

The Mabee American Heritage Center will also serve as a major administrative center for the university. The president's

office has already been moved into the building. The Admissions Services and Student Financial Services Offices are also housed in this building, along with offices for Career Planning and Placement and offices for the University Relations staff. Additional administrative offices will be moved into the building on the second floor.

Plans also call for renovation of the lobby and the exterior of the building. Using this facility as a major conference center will provide facilities needed to expand Harding University's nationally-acclaimed American Studies Program.


The second phase of the proposed project involves the renovation of Pattie Cobb Hall. The residence hall was constructed in 1919 and was one of the original campus residence halls when Harding moved to the Searcy campus in 1934. Construction has already begun to completely restore the building, using all three

floors as a modern residence hall for 140 women.

It will be equipped with the latest technology for computer instruction and telecommunications. The original historic architectural uniqueness of this building will be preserved in the renovation effort.

The third phase of this project involves a major addition to the Beaumont Memorial Library. The original library structure was completed in 1950 with additions in 1957 and 1971. Additional space is now needed for books and periodicals, plus renovation of the existing facility.

Since 1951, the Mabee Foundation has given grants totalling \$2.28 million in support of various capitol projects on the Harding campus. Included in the projects were the Mabee American Heritage Center (1965), Beaumont Memorial Library addition (1971) and the Mabee Business Center (1982).



Secretary of Education To Keynote Fall Lectures Series

Secretary of Education William Bennett will keynote the fall American Studies lecture series for 1988-89. His lecture, scheduled for Sept. 29, will be the second in the series. Sales expert, Og Mandino, will appear Sept. 15 for the annual Sales Seminar.

William Bennett has been one of the most successful controversial appointments of the Reagan administration. He is a respected national figure, rated by the *Wall Street Journal* as "the best of the Reagan appointments of the last eight years."

Bennett became Secretary of Education in 1985, following a successful term as chairman of the National Endowment for the

Humanities. He determined to lead a vigorous national debate on education, and even his critics concede that he has accomplished that goal.

As Secretary of Education, Bennett has kept the attention of the country focused on the subject. His concern that Americans attend to the "three Cs" of education — content, character and choice — has led him to focus on the importance of mastering basics.

Bennett has declared that schools have a responsibility to convey a grasp of America's moral and political principles, and to nurture the character of students. His presentation, "Comments on the Challenge to American

Education," will be Sept. 29.

A salesman, sales manager, writer and editor, Mandino will keynote the annual Sales Seminar Sept. 15. He was president and executive manager of *Success Unlimited* magazine for 15 years, following a successful sales career.

His classic, *The Greatest Salesman in the World*, is the all-time bestseller in the world in the field of sales. He has made 900 appearances on radio and television in the last 10 years.

In 1984, Mandino became the 14th inductee into the International Speakers Hall of Fame. He received the prestigious C.P.A.E. award from the National Speakers Association in 1983.

President Reflects on First Year in Office

David Burks set his coffee cup on the desk before him and leaned forward on his elbow to talk. A full year has passed since he assumed the job as Harding president. He calls it "one of transition." His wife, Leah, calls it "interesting." Whatever the term, the year has been full of activity, most of it expected, some of it not.

The review came on a day considered normal in his schedule. He had started with a breakfast meeting in Little Rock; he'd finished a lengthy session with the development staff; another caller waited his turn in the outer office; the evening was booked with more appointments. From the start, his calendar has been similar.

He's eager to talk about it, for the job has consumed practically every thought and action since he took the reins. He recalled some of the highlights.

"The opportunity to meet new people and form new friendships has been enjoyable," he said. "I've come to know some of the folks on campus much better, too."

He has hosted 20 Presidential Receptions throughout the country for prospective students, alumni, parents and friends of Harding, with attendance averaging more than 100 at each. "These have been inspirational and encouraging. I've really been pleased with them," he said. More are planned.

The campus staff greeted him in force last August at the traditional "President's Reception" in the Heritage lobby to open the school year. Guests were also invited to tour his new office suite.

Then came Inauguration Week, which he compliments Dr. Jimmy Carr and his crew for producing. The gala week brought hundreds of alumni and guests to the campus for the special events.

Throughout the year, he has conducted staff meetings, briefing employees on policies and plans, and to address such matters as management techniques. He has met regularly with the administrative staff, making plans and identifying needs.

He's excited about plant improvements. "Our expanded dining hall will be one of the nicest in the country. The renovation of Pattie Cobb will restore this significantly historical building for 50 or so more years of use. Technology is important and I'm pleased about the new computers, both micro and main frame, which have been put in place. Added scholarships for prospective students provide a significant step which will enable more students to attend Harding." He praised the work of the admissions staff in recruiting.

He's pleased with the appointment of Phil Slate as Dean of the College of Bible and Religion in order to "help us allocate more resources into the program, which is the most important one at Harding University."

The toughest part, he said, has been the decisions that involve people. "Making the right decisions for Harding when people are involved causes the greatest concern," he said.

For the coming year, one in which he expects not nearly as many changes, he'll concentrate on implementation of the plans already defined. The "Beyond Excellence" campaign will involve fund raising and a phonathon. He'll work harder on time management, an area he admits is difficult and one he is "struggling to get hold of."

From a personal standpoint, he considers the wedding of his eldest son, Bryan, to Laura Hendon as clearly a joy. In May, he performed the ceremony for the pair, who will be seniors at the university this fall.

"Far too much attention has been paid to me and my family this year," he said. "We've had to learn to live in the proverbial fish bowl." He praises Leah for her efforts in the adjustment. "Her responsibilities have been many and she's done a beautiful job."

The family, which also includes teen-agers Stephen and Marleah, has remained first in their

priorities, and his secretary, Claudette Bratcher, is advised that calls from his children must be put through regardless of his schedule. "I don't want them to feel that the office is keeping them out," he said. "The church and my family will always come first."

Recently he has resumed jogging, a practice he's had for several years and one which he finds relaxing. He's also trying to manage his reading schedule to include the hour minimum he wishes to allocate for that pleasure.

The entire effort is centered on being able to enjoy what he's doing. "I realize I'm not here to enjoy primarily, but rather to serve. However, I believe one should enjoy what he's doing or look for something else. I truly do enjoy my association with Harding."

"My job is a pleasure because there are so many people who love Harding. It's evidenced in the way they serve and support decisions that have been made," he said.

And so he begins the second round of "integrating faith, learning and living," which he believes is maintaining the mission of Harding University.

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Graduate Students Account For Percentage of Increase

The number of graduate students enrolled in summer sessions accounted for much of the increase for Summer '88. A record 1,000 unduplicated students were enrolled for at least one session.

Graduate students made up almost 20 percent of the first summer session, a significant increase over previous years.

Thirty students completed graduate degrees in August commencement, the largest number ever to be awarded degrees at once, according to Dr. Wyatt Jones, graduate school director.

The increase was also reflected during Intersession, with graduate enrollment reaching 38 as compared with 15 in 1987.

"We're experiencing a major increase in the elementary administration area. Principals in many schools in Arkansas and other states have degrees from Harding," Dr. Jones said. "Some of our graduates are now superintendents," he added.

Jones said the single classes are attracting about 30 per offering. This compares to 10 to 12 in past years, he said.

The Graduate Council seeks to evaluate the program continually and to upgrade offerings when feasible. Dr. Larry Long, professor of English and director of Summer Sessions, was added recently to the Graduate Council. Other members are Dr. Jones, Dr. Bobby Coker, Dr. Harry Olree, Dr. Richard Duke, Dr. Neale Pryor and Dr. Bill Oldham. Don Boyd, a graduate student, is also a representative to the council.



Jim White Named Director Of Admissions

Jim White, who has been serving as Acting Director of Admissions Services for the past 10 months, has been officially named Director of the office.

"Jim has given the office excellent direction and able leadership since assuming responsibility for its operation," Dr. Jim Carr, Vice President of Educational Services and Enrollment Development, said in making the announcement.

White is a 1976 graduate of Harding. He and his wife, the former Martha Hart, have a daughter, Meredith. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed White of Searcy.

Carr also commended the admissions services staff for contributions in their respective areas.

"The office anticipates showing gains in all of their new territories," he said. The assignments include Foy O'Neal, Rocky Mountain states; Dirk Smith, special designations; and Mike Williams, South and East. White has coordinated recruiting in Arkansas.

Also recognized were Rosemary Wilson for internal management of the admissions operation and Teri Buss, Joann Eads and Jaretta Rose for handling increase in processing. "Their hard work is important to the success of our admissions program," Carr said. "I congratulate Jim and the entire staff on their extra special effort."

A record summer enrollment and anticipation of an increase in new students for fall has caused excitement to mount on the campus. Things are looking great for the fall of '88.

Summer school enrollment topped 1,000 for the first time in Harding's history. Combining Intersession, Summer I and Summer II, 1,154 different students enrolled for at least one course.

Enrollment for the two-week Intersession in May skyrocketed, with 669 registered for classes. The enrollment reflected a 13 percent increase over the 1987 total of 591. Intersession enrollment has come from 100 to almost 700 in six years.

The first session was up 11 percent from last year, with an increase from 574 to 643 students. The first week of the second summer session appeared to be headed toward similar increases.

Accepted applications for fall are running 30 percent ahead of last year's figures. The admissions staff and the entire Harding family have contributed to the success of the recruiting program. Their commitment to assist Harding in its quest to attract students who desire to "integrate faith, learning and living" in their lives is the key to its success.

Jones, England Appointed Associate Deans

Dr. Wyatt Jones, who has directed the graduate studies program since 1975, has been appointed Associate Dean of the university's School of Education. Dr. Don England, recently appointed chairman of the physical science department, has been named Associate Dean for the Sciences in the College of Arts and Sciences.

A 1951 graduate of Harding, Jones holds the master and doctorate degrees from the University of Alabama. He was chairman of the Department of Education at Pepperdine University in California for 13 years before joining Harding's faculty. A professor of education, he received a Distinguished Teacher award in 1980.

Dr. England is a distinguished professor of physical science, having won the Distinguished Teacher award three times. He has been a member of the faculty since 1960.

Both appointments are effective immediately.



Showalter Retires After 21 Years

Russell Showalter, assistant to the vice president for finance, retired June 30 after 21 years with Harding.

A native of White County, he is a 1948 graduate of Harding. He joined the staff in 1967 as director of financial aid. He has served in several areas of the Student Loan Guarantee Foundation of Arkansas and last year was elected to the Board of Directors. Earlier he had served two terms as the foundation president.

Showalter has coordinated programs with local business firms to arrange employment for Harding University students. He is a former president of the Southwest District of the Association of Financial Aid Administrators and was the Arkansas representative to the National Council.

Showalter serves as a city councilman for Ward 4. He and his wife, Jean, reside at 1605 E. Market. They have two sons.

Committee Seeks Dean

A search committee has been appointed to find a dean of the School of Business. Dr. Jim Henderson, who held the position during 1987-88, resigned in May to pursue other educational and employment interests.

The committee, headed by President David Burks, is also searching for a director for the Accounting Program. The jobs are labeled as "key positions at Harding" by Dr. Burks.

"Our purpose is to look for the best possible person for each of these positions, either on or off campus," Burks said. Business leaders, alumni with advanced degrees and some of the university's advisory boards are being contacted for suggested candidates.

The committee had hoped to finalize a decision by mid-July, but con-

tacts and interviews are still being conducted. George Oliver, assistant dean of the School of Business, is serving as acting dean during the interim.

Members of the committee in addition to Burks are Dr. Neale Pryor, vice president for academic affairs; Dr. Jim Carr, vice president for educational services; Oliver; Dr. Larry Long, director of summer sessions; and Ben Berry, local business representative.

The School of Business attracts the largest number of majors at Harding, with 28 percent of the student body declaring majors in one of the business areas. The School offers a Bachelor of Business Administration, a Bachelor of Arts and the Master of Science in Accounting.

Miss Blankenship Goes to Washington...

In the 1939 movie "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," actor James Stewart portrayed the idealistic and somewhat naive Senator Smith, learning the ropes of life on Capitol Hill.

Forty-nine years later, Amy Blankenship, a 1988 Harding graduate, has gone to Washington.

Like Mr. Smith, Amy has some of that "gee whiz" admiration for the Washington Monument, the Lincoln Memorial and even Capitol Hill itself. Unlike Mr. Smith, she came to Washington as a congressional aide — a far cry from the power and prestige of Mr. Smith's senatorial position.

"You might could call me an idealist. I think most new college graduates are," she said. "But I'm also a realist. The two can mix. You need both perspectives when working on the Hill.

"Since I've been in Washington, I have learned the importance of the work that goes on behind the scenes, both by staff members and the Congressmen themselves. By the time a bill reaches the floor of the House, it has been through months of sub-committee and full committee hearings. Most Con-

gressmen already know how they are going to vote on it."

Amy is a legislative correspondent for six-term Congressman Ike Skelton of Missouri's fourth district. The district includes 21 counties and the suburbs of Jefferson City and Kansas City.

As a legislative correspondent, Amy has the opportunity to review nearly every issue that comes before Congress, including defense, trade and health care legislation. Congressman Skelton serves on the House Armed Services and Small Business committees and the Select Committee on Aging. He is also the chairman of the Congressional Rural Caucus.

"Everyone that writes to Congressman Skelton receives a reply. I assist him in drafting responses to these inquiries," said Amy. "He is very sensitive to constituent concerns. I really must be on my toes and abreast of pending legislation if we are to respond quickly and accurately to our constituents."

Since a new computer system is being installed in the office, she is also sharing the responsibility of

systems manager with the office's press secretary.

Arriving in Washington just six days after graduating from Harding on May 8, Amy didn't arrive with the same level of naivete characterized in Mr. Smith. It was really her second venture up Capitol Hill.

During the summer of 1987, she was an intern in the office of Representative

Marilyn Lloyd (D., Tenn.). Her summer experience whetted her appetite for a career on the Hill.

"My internship was also a factor in obtaining this job. Most Congressmen like to hire people who have some Hill experience," she commented.

"I would advise any student who wants to eventually work here to look into doing an internship, whether paid or volunteer. It definitely pays off in the future."

As she came to the end of her collegiate career at Harding, Amy had two choices — graduate school or Capitol Hill. In the final analysis, graduate school was a distant second.

"I had to seize this opportunity. I knew I could do the job, plus there is something about being a part of this place that is so exciting."

Amy is part of Skelton's eight-member Washington staff. The office atmosphere is relaxed, but she admits there is no slack time. Everyone is busy.

"It is often said that the more you learn, the less you know, and I've found that to be true. Things are constantly changing in Washington, and it is difficult to try to keep up with events and information.

"There isn't a specific course of study that trains you for a job like this. At Harding, I was a public administration major, but everyone in my office majors in a different subject in college: history, political science, English, journalism and economics.

"However, the thing that helped me the most in preparing for this position was my work as editor of the *Bison*. No matter what job you have on the Hill, you have to be able to write."

Mr. Smith went to Washington and ended up filibustering. Miss Blankenship went to Washington and is learning and observing — who knows where that will lead her — maybe to her own personal seat in the House chamber.

Bison Boosters, Athletic Committee Conduct Phonathon

Members of the Searcy Bison Booster Club and Harding's Athletic Committee joined together for an eight-night phonathon to raise \$116,000 in gifts for the university's athletic program.

Bison Boosters, committee members and Harding coaches completed 532 telephone calls to former Bison athletes. The 27 callers received pledges from 224 alumni.

Three-year pledges totaled \$95,000. An additional \$21,000 is expected to be received from the matching gift companies employing alumni responding to the phonathon.

Searcy businessman Bill Harris coordinated the phonathon. Harris is a Bison Booster and chairman of Harding's President's Council.

Funds raised will be used in various projects including resurfacing of the track at Alumni Field, constructing eight additional tennis courts and providing new bleachers for the north side of Alumni Field.

The goal of the Bison Booster phonathon was to raise \$500,000 in cash and pledges in the next three years. Thus far, 23 percent of the goal has been reached.

Christian Stewardship And Estate Planning

Gifts of Appreciated Assets

Recently I was privileged to counsel with a marvelous Christian lady concerning stewardship of her estate. Her identity shall remain undisclosed and the composition of her estate shall be held in strict confidence; but, to encourage those similarly situated I shall share an important principle concerning gifts of appreciated property which was extremely helpful in her case.

Mrs. Donor has been a widow for eight years. She and her husband had no children, but they have been faithful supporters of several Christian colleges for many years. Her income from Social Security, retirement pension, dividends and interest more than adequately covers her monthly expenses, with a considerable amount being added to savings each month.

Among her assets was 1,000 share of XYZ stock which she received through her husband's estate. When she obtained the stock, it was worth \$10,000, but is now worth \$100,000. Before his death, she and her husband decided to make a gift of the stock to Harding through their Willis.

Through good fortune, her income increased substantially in 1988. Unfortunately, the increased income will result in increased taxes. In order to reduce her 1988 income tax, she decided to sell the XYZ stock and make a large contribution to Harding.

Fortunately, before she sold the stock, she called the Development Office at Harding and asked for advice concerning the best way to accomplish her desires — a large gift to Harding and a decrease in income taxes.

We presented her with the following analysis:

Mrs. Donor

PLAN A - Sell Stock and Give Cash

Income from Sale of Stock	\$100,000
Capital Gain (Taxable Income from Sale)	\$ 90,000
Capital Gains Tax Due on Sale (28%)	\$25,200
Gift to Harding	\$ 74,800
Taxable Income for 1988 (\$140,000 plus \$90,000 minus \$74,800)	\$155,200
Income Tax due for 1988	\$ 43,456

PLAN B - Gift of Stock

Gift of Stock to Harding	\$100,000
Capital Gains Tax	-0-
Taxable Income for 1988 (\$140,000 minus \$42,000)	\$ 98,000

Mrs. Donor quickly decided to donate the stock to Harding rather than sell it and give the proceeds from the sale. Her decision has many advantages:

1. Her gift to Harding is \$25,200 greater than it would be under Plan A.
2. She will completely avoid \$25,200 in capital gains tax which would be due under Plan A.
3. Her 1988 taxes will be \$41,216 less under Plan B than under Plan A.

Good stewardship is extremely important to Mrs. Donor. She was delighted that she asked for advice before she sold the stock.

Kirkman is married to the former Kim Shaffer, also a 1987 Harding graduate who will be teaching at Harding Academy and working toward a master's degree.





Ministry

Harding's Graduate School of Religion provides a unique blend of intensive study and practical training for many areas of Christian ministry in a total graduate school setting in Memphis, Tenn.

A division of Harding University in Searcy, the Graduate School offers four degree programs: master of arts (M.A.), master of arts in religion (M.A.R.), master of divinity (M.Div.) and doctor of ministry (D.Min.). It is the oldest graduate Bible program in the brotherhood of Churches of Christ and the first to offer a doctoral program.

Dr. Evertt Huffard, who serves on location as associate dean, has reaffirmed the purpose of Harding Graduate School of Religion. "We want to produce preachers with a balanced background in scholarship and ministry who can work in partnership with churches to preach the Word," he said. The goal is to offer a "practical, yet academic and scriptural foundation to prepare students not just for preaching, but for missions, counseling and church growth as well," he added.

Field courses are an integral part of the educational program. These real life situations help the student bridge the gap between classroom instruction and actual ministry. Students spend 120 hours working with field supervisors each semester they are enrolled in field education courses.

The Graduate School has assembled a superior faculty, all of whom hold the doctorate degree. Scholars, authors, ministers and evangelists, "these men have made tremendous contributions to the strength of Churches of Christ nationwide," Huffard said. Many of their works are considered to be among the most reliable materials in religious scholarship.

Dr. Philip Slate is dean of Harding's College of Bible and Religion, which includes the graduate program in Memphis. In addition to Slate and Huffard, the faculty includes Allen Black, Douglas Brown, Joel Johnson, Jack Lewis, Richard Oster, Jack Vancil, Earl West and W. B. West, Jr.

"The faculty form a community of scholars who teach only at the graduate level; the students are in class with fellow-graduates. This enables both faculty and students to function at a level otherwise not possible and that makes a difference," Slate said.

"Our concern, however, is not with

Ashby Camp: From Courtroom to Classroom

Ashby Camp's life has been a paradox. A new perspective has changed his goal in life.

Ashby grew up in a home where they attended church services "occasionally" until he was 8. After that, his religious background was, as he put it, "pagan."

Following high school graduation he attended the University of Florida and Duke University Law School, where he was one of 150 in the class of '77. He began to practice his chosen profession immediately in Orlando, Fla.

Ashby's brother John became a Christian in May, 1978. He described John as "introspective, so he was probably a little more susceptible to religion than I thought I was." Though Ashby was a "good, logical arguer," he said his brother went to work on him and really "worked me over."

"Once he got me to the point of objectivity, I accepted the possibility of a non-materialistic view to life and began to read and study," Ashby related. In June, 1978, at the age of 26, Ashby became a Christian and "Christianity became my prime focus."

Ashby's wife, Meg, was offended at first by his "religious" change. "You are not the same man I married," she protested in frustration. Having responded similarly to John's conver-

sion, Ashby knew how she felt and "just didn't pressure her about it." One day he came home from work and she said, "I read a little bit of Revelation today." She began studying and, in September, 1978, Meg became a Christian, too.

As his life of study and observation unfolded, Ashby began to experience a growing conviction that "everybody says they use the Bible, but many are not *accurate* in dealing with it." In fact, he began to feel that there are "all kinds of abuses of scripture."

Eight years of indepth study led Ashby to the decision to leave his law practice, move to Memphis and enroll in the Harding Graduate School of Religion. "I had heard about the Graduate School from a friend of John's and it seemed tailor-made for someone who had a law degree, but no undergraduate Bible study."

Shortly after his decision to enroll, another brother, 39, died suddenly from a ruptured aneurysm. His untimely death "reinforced my consciousness of the shortness of life," Ashby said. He began work on the Master of Divinity degree last August.

Although he misses close friends in the congregation in Orlando, graduate school is "not bad at all; it's fun. There is nothing I would rather do

than sit and study, and that's what I do here," he said. Savings and attorney's consulting fees are financing the move for Ashby, Meg and Alissa, the couple's 8-year-old daughter.

When he finishes his degree in the summer of '90, Ashby wants to preach and teach. "I would like to find people who will allow me to just study and share my knowledge as everyday work. I want to transfer the fruit of my study to others. I really would prefer teaching in a congregation," he said.


And if he can't find a group to support such a ministry? "I will only fall back on the legal profession if I have to. I won't let my family starve...but my heart is in preaching and teaching."

Ashby Camp, successful insurance attorney in pursuit of the American dream — to make lots of money and get all you can out of life — really *isn't* the man his wife, Meg, married. "My commitment to Christianity has made a new man out of me. Life's short. I want to use it and not look back at death having failed to use the talents given to me by God," he said.

The transition from the courtroom to the classroom seems just a natural outgrowth of his changed perspective on life.

pure academics. We are deeply convinced it is possible to be scholarly yet practical servants. The church is the primary beneficiary from what we are doing, and the church deserves the best we can do since our work is ultimately for the Lord," he added.

Four divisions make up the curriculum: biblical/textual studies, Christian doctrine, church history and ministry. The program is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and is a candidacy member of the Association of Theological Schools.

One of the school's greatest strengths is L. M. Graves Memorial Library. Included in its holdings is an extensive collection of restoration materials, important manuscript facsimiles and special collections which total 84,000 volumes. The library receives 675 journals and 300 reports produced by missionaries or organizations sponsored by Churches of Christ.

Perhaps the greatest strength of an educational institution lies in its "track record." Harding Graduate School of Religion has produced more than 900 graduates whose work has exhibited balance, good training and longevity. They have helped to "produce churches that produce churches," Huffard noted. "They have been known for setting priorities and sticking it out," he added.

Approximately 54 percent of the school's graduates are full-time pulpit ministers. Alumni are missionaries in 27 foreign countries and in various areas of the United States. Eighteen percent of its graduates are Bible teachers at Christian colleges throughout America and at Ibaraki and Korean Christian Colleges overseas. A number are chaplains in the United States military services.

Strategically located in Memphis, the Graduate School is easily accessible to students from any part of the Mid-South region. The metropolitan area boasts a population of more than 900,000. Memphis is a modern, cultural, medical and educational

center with abundant opportunities for employment.

Important advantages for students who enroll at the Graduate School are reasonable tuition and fees (\$130 an hour), the excellent scholarship program, secular work opportunities in the community and 70 Churches of Christ in the area which provide opportunities for ministry. Graduate school personnel assist students in finding housing and employment. The support system includes large corporations and many smaller businesses who regularly hire students and their spouses. Harding Graduate School works to secure job placement for students after graduation as well.

The 180 member student body is a diverse group of individuals. Enrolled in a one-week summer course were 18 men from Maryland, Kentucky, Florida, Ohio, Mississippi, Indiana, Alabama and Tennessee. Although preachers form the core of students, women and men from other occupations enroll for indepth study also.

Harding Graduate School of Religion is responding to the growing need for versatility and globalization. "Our society has people on the move. We will need to continue to upgrade and diversify our offerings so that courses may be offered in short and long time periods and in off-campus locations," Huffard said. Classes are scheduled in Little Rock, Ark., and Florence, Ala., this fall. Courses ranging from one to nine weeks in length are offered in Memphis.


Concerning globalization Huffard said, "We must prepare for multi-ethnicity with emphasis on foreign language and world evangelism. The time is upon us when we'll need to teach in other languages and branch out to other parts of the world with our message of hope."

Harding's Graduate School of Religion is truly a combination of all the right things for those who wish to receive total preparation for ministry. Preaching the Word is the school's undeniable goal.



'88 Bison Football Season Sports Change and Transition

The 1988 Bison football season will kick off a new era when head coach Larry Richmond takes the reins for the first time.

Richmond was named last December as the third head coach in Harding's modern day program after 24-year veteran John Prock retired.

"We're naturally going to go through some transitions and changes, but we want to continue the tradition that Harding has enjoyed in the past and make it stronger," said Richmond.

Twelve starters return for the Bisons from last fall's 6-4 squad which tied for third in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference standings.

"Our strengths are certainly in the specialty positions," he continued. "We have experience in the offensive and defensive backfields, but we also have some huge holes to fill in both lines."

Richmond will have plenty of firepower to work with offensively, where his top quarterback and receiver return along with a stable of proven running backs. Southpaw Greg Cox of Houston, Texas, threw for nearly 1,000 yards and 11 touchdowns as a part-time starter last season. He will receive good support from transfer John Turbeville (6-2, 178) of El Dorado, Ark., rated by some as the state's best schoolboy passer his senior season.

Cox often teamed with all-conference split end Mike Alexander of Duncan, Okla., who led the league with 836 yards on only 29 catches and 11 TDs. Anthony Lowery of Little Rock tops the returning rushers with 333 yards and four touchdowns. Halfbacks Chris Hill of Morrilton, Ark., and Keith Kelley of Little Rock have breakaway speed. Fullback Keith Perry of Memphis possesses outstanding blocking skills.

"We're changing our approach offensively to a more wide open attack," said Richmond. "We'll work out of multiple sets. I think it fits our personnel and it fits my personality. You try to build your offensive scheme around your talent, and that's what we'll do."

Center Fred Wiley, left guard Terry Albright and

left tackle Keith Perry, all of Houston, Texas, are two-year starters in the offensive line. Richmond will look to newcomers to fill the right side of the line. Kris Citty of Searcy, a converted fullback, has the physical tools to be a fine tight end but needs experience.

The new head coach is equally encouraged by his defensive unit, where six returnees head a group that ranked among the top 10 in the nation last year.

"When people mention Harding, the first thing they think of is defense. We have a great defensive tradition, and we will continue to build upon it."

Linebackers Brooks Davis of Bartlesville, Okla., and John Spann of West Monroe, La., ranked first and third on the Bison tackle charts last year. Davis is a four-year starter while Spann has started three seasons. Tim Smith of Searcy, a transfer from the University of Arkansas, and Arlington, Texas, sophomore John Rogan should log duty as well.

Only two starters return in the front line. Tackles Joe Sawyer of Dallas and Bubba Alsop of Gainesville, Texas, played hurt last season but are recovered and ready. Kenwick Thompson of Houston supported at noseguard and could be called upon for help. End Alvin Henry of Harvey, La., earned a spot in the spring after academic problems kept him out in the fall.

The secondary is headed by free safety Joe Phillips of Houston and cornerback Alan Buchanan of El Dorado. Lee White of Houston and Eric Cooke of Batesville, Miss., are set at strong safety and the other cornerback position.

Added to the highly competitive league schedule will be a non-conference slate that features two NAIA top 20 teams from last year. "It's one of the toughest schedules in the NAIA," Richmond said. "We're just hoping to stay in the thick of the AIC. Our goal is to be competitive in the conference and make the NAIA's final 16."

Two familiar faces and two new ones will aid Rich-

mond on the sideline this season as assistant coaches.

Randy Tribble, who served as offensive back coach last season, moves over to defensive coordinator. He will be assisted by Ronnie Huckeba, who will coach the defensive front seven. Huckeba has served as a volunteer assistant the last two years.

Directing the offensive backs will be Scott Ragsdale, a former volunteer assistant who devoted fulltime in the classroom last year. The newest addition to the Bison staff is James Frank, who will coach the offensive line. Frank comes to the Bisons from Spring (Texas) High School. Richmond will serve as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks and receivers coach.

Spears Wins AIC Cliff Shaw Award; Howard Named to All-America Squad


Senior Floyd Martin "Marty" Spears has been named the winner of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference's 1988 Cliff Shaw Scholar-Athlete Award.

A four-year letterman on the Bison baseball team, Spears graduated summa cum laude in May with a bachelor of science degree in mathematics. He achieved a 3.96 grade point average.


The prestigious Cliff Shaw Scholar-Athlete Award is given annually to the senior AIC male athlete posting the highest academic grade point average who has earned at least two athletic letters in AIC-sponsored sports. Harding athletes have won the award 18 times in the 32 years it has been presented.

Spears earned All-AIC honorable mention in 1986, 1987 and 1988 while earning All-NAIA District 17 honorable mention in 1987 and 1988. He was named to the AIC North All-Star team in 1987 and 1988, and holds the Harding school record for consecutive shutout innings pitched.

Te Howard was named to the GTE/College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) College Division At-Large Academic All-America squad. The announcement was made by CoSIDA spokesperson Liza Reed.

Howard was one of 10 athletes named to the squad's first team. He was nominated for the honor by Harding Sports Information Director Ken Bissell.

The college division team consists of athletes from NCAA Divisions II and III and NAIA Divisions I and II. Those athletes who participate in track and field/cross country, fencing, golf, gymnastics, ice hockey, lacrosse, riflery, skiing, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, water polo and wrestling are eligible for the at-large squad.

Bisons Should Compete Well In Volleyball This Season

The Lady Bison volleyball team produced its best season ever in the five-year history of the program last year with a 26-15 record. According to coach Karyl Bailey, the 1988 squad will be hard pressed to repeat the success.

"Potentially, I think we could have as good a year if we can answer some questions early," says Bailey, who has been with the program since its beginning. "Our biggest question mark is at the setter position, where we don't return anyone with experience."

Bailey returns five seniors and five sophomores from last season's team, which finished fourth in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference standings. Two incoming freshmen may see playing time, he said, but the returnees will hold the key for the squad's success.

"Eight of the 10 were starters at some point in the season last year, which makes for a good situation," he said. "The problem comes in with the setter situation. Without a setter, we'll have to move people out of position to fill that void."

Heading the front line will be seniors Onetta Gardner of Andover, Kan.; Stephanie Alsop of Missoula, Mont.; and Laura Jones of Newberry, Mich. All three were dependable starters in '87, playing the hitter positions. Alsop will likely move from the middle to outside, with Gardner and Jones playing outside as well.

Sheryl Green of Arrington, Tenn., and Lisa Phillippi of Cincinnati, Ohio, also saw spot duty as junior starters last year and will challenge for top slots. Bailey calls Green "a very good blocker," while Phillippi is an outstanding back row defender and a capable setter.

Eligibility problems proved fatal for sophomore setter Susan Malone of Memphis, who transferred and attended classes for two days at Memphis State last spring. She returned to Harding only to learn that she would have to sit out the season due to an AIC transfer rule. "She was eligible by NAIA standards, but the AIC rule got her," said Bailey, who will redshirt her this year.

That opens the door for Texas sophomores Stephanie Dempsey of Fort Worth, Kelly Willingham of Hurst, and Angela Mitchell of Marshall.

Dempsey will shoulder much of the setter responsibilities, according to Bailey.

Willingham, a 5-10 hitter, played a variety of positions last year but will likely settle at the front middle position. Her smooth transition will allow Alsop to move to the outside, said Bailey. Mitchell is regarded as the team's best jumper and a top-knotch back row player.

Two other sophomores, Carolee Musick of Mena, Ark., and Lisa Risse of Charlotte, N.C., have the physical skills to contribute but still may be a season away. Musick is extremely strong as a blocker and very coachable, while Risse

is the tallest player on the team at 5-11.

The addition of freshmen Tammy Todd of Raytown, Mo., and Wendi Scott of Hallsville, Texas, has Bailey excited. Todd reminds the coach of Gardner with her slender build and jumping ability. Scott is a hardworking outside hitter who needs college experience.

"We should be a better hitting and blocking team than we've ever been, but it all depends on how well our setters come through," said Bailey. "We have good depth, which is a plus. If the girls respond to the position changes, we could be a factor in the conference race."

Experience is Key for Cross Country Teams

Experience in numbers will be the key for the Bison and Lady Bison cross country teams as they enter the 1988 season as defending Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference champions.

Coach Ted Lloyd's squads return a host of veterans who will chase after another AIC title. Standing in their way, according to Lloyd, could be strong competition from an up-and-coming conference rival.

"It looks like Central Arkansas' teams will be our biggest challengers," said Lloyd, who has directed the Bisons to 18 straight AIC titles and the Lady Bisons to two consecutive crowns.

According to Lloyd, a strong nucleus returns for the Bisons, who placed four runners in the top 10 at the

1987 AIC meet. Among those are conference individual champion Rich Lockhart of Grand Blanc, Mich.; Jon Murray of Carthage, Mo.; and Mark Lavalley of Portland, Ore. Lockhart is a senior, while Murray is a junior and Lavalley a sophomore.

"Those three will be our leaders. They were among our top runners last year, and I expect them to carry much of the load again," said Lloyd.

A stable of proven supporters also return and could challenge for team honors. Senior Eric VanMatre of Rolla, Mo., the national runner-up in the 800 meter run last spring, heads the list. Also returning are senior Marty Koonce of North Little Rock and sophomores Kenny Edwards

of Carthage, Mo.; Andrew Guthrie of Oklahoma City, Okla.; and Tim Seay of Chester, Va. Lakewood, Colo., native Mark Halbert began last season as a promising freshman but fell to injuries and was granted a hardship case.

"Kenny established himself as a contender last year, and Eric and Marty have the talent to be among the top five or six," said Lloyd. "We'll count on them for most of the help."

Several newcomers could contribute, including freshmen Marvin Hatley of West Plains, Mo.; Brent Elford of Grand Blanc, Mich.; and Allen Gill of Nashville, Tenn.

Even more experience returns for the Lady Bisons, who completely dominated the AIC race last year by placing all seven runners in

the top 10. Three of those have graduated but Lloyd feels this fall's squad could be just as strong.

"This one has the potential to be as competitive, but the key will be how well our fifth, sixth and seventh runners improve. At this point, I don't see us getting beat by anyone in the conference, but we could beat ourselves."

The dominant forces in the AIC the past two years, senior Cheryl Bednosky of Shelter Island, N.Y., and junior Melynda Davis of Gresham, Ore., will look to improve their national standings this season.

Bednosky outdistanced everyone in the AIC meet last fall to win individual laurels, while Davis finished second. Davis entered the race as the defending AIC champion.

Sophomore Tracy Parks of Pensacola, Fla., established herself as a contender by placing fourth in the league. Junior Margaret Eoff of Rogers, Ark., a surprise winner in the 200 and 400 meter dashes in last spring's AIC track meet, rounded out the Lady Bison contingent with an eighth place finish in last year's league race.

Several experienced runners should fill in the gaps. Senior Joan Cigrang of Westminster, Md., is a three-year letterman who has ample talent. So do sophomores Shirley Pollard of Lees Summit, Mo.; Carrie Crider of Fort Collins, Colo.; and Lorrie Wayne of Aurora, Colo. Incoming freshmen Chandra Latimer of McRae, Ark., and Kelsie Hutchison of Carl Junction, Mo., have impressed Lloyd.

Scholar Athletes Honored by NAIA

Seven Harding athletes have been named scholar-athletes in their respective sports by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

Named to the track and field honor team were high jumpers Bill Baker of Mt. Dora, Fla., and Te Howard of Clyde, Texas, and distance runner Cheryl Bednosky of Shelter Island, N.Y. Bison tennis players Gregg Barden of Searcy, Mark French of Nashville, Tenn., and Judd Sanderson of Wills Point, Texas, also received laurels, as did baseball pitcher Marty Spears of Houston, Texas.

Formerly referred to as

the Academic All-America program, the Scholar-Athlete program recognizes excellence in the classroom and on the field and court.

Baker, the Arkansas Intercollegiate Champion and two-time All-America performer, graduated in May with a 3.72 grade point average while pursuing an accounting degree. Howard, who finished second to Baker in the AIC meet, has compiled a 4.00 GPA through his junior year while pursuing a physical education degree. Bednosky, a sophomore who earned conference championships in the 1500 and 3000 meter runs this spring, has a 3.12

GPA while pursuing a biology degree.

Barden, French and Sanderson teamed to lead the Bisons to a second place finish in the 1988 AIC race. Barden compiled a 3.94 GPA while earning a chemistry degree this spring. Both French and Sanderson are senior accounting majors. French has compiled a 3.68 GPA and Sanderson has a 3.47 grade point.

Spears, the leading pitcher for the Bisons this spring with a 5-3 record, graduated with honors while accumulating a 3.96 GPA in math. He received a graduate study fellowship to Rice University.

Computer Class Develops Program for Stats

When the Bison football team takes the field this fall, 13 Harding computer science students will turn their attention toward the press box rather than the gridiron.

They helped develop a computer program that will enable the University's sports information director to accumulate game and season statistics as much as 10 times faster than before.

The students were enrolled in Computer Science 335, better known as "File Structures." Instructor Scott Ragsdale, who is an assistant football coach, said the purpose of the programming project was to incorporate real life situations into a file structure setting.

"These were upper level students who'll be out in the real world designing programs for corporations. They will need to be able to communicate with their fellow programmers. I wanted to give them a taste of what it's going to be like," he said.

Ragsdale set up the class into a model corporation with a hierarchy similar to that used by Delta Airlines, his employer for two and one-half years prior to coming to Harding. He served as manager of the project with Alex Fagen of Oskaloosa, Iowa, serving as supervisor. Under Fagen were group leaders Rich Rardin of Flint, Mich., Keith

Perry of Houston, Texas, and Ram Tackett of Parish, Ala. Brooke Hagood of Cleveland, Tenn., and Wade Ryan of Searcy served as documentation chairmen.

Group members included Greg Fielder of McCrory, Ark.; Norman Hale of Villanova, Pa.; Thomas Land of Gainesville, Fla.; Mike Manning of Enigma, Ga.; Karis Mullins and Steve Mullins of Searcy; Doug Schoettle of Rogers, Ark.; Gina Shill of Searcy; and David Smelser of Florence, Ala. The project was titled Sports Information System (SIS).

Ragsdale explains the project in layman's terms as "a programming network that ties together 15 different mini-programs," or one for each student. It allows the sports information director to type in a play-by-play account of the game, with accumulative game statistics compiled from a source code language designed exclusively for the program. From game statistics, accumulative season statistics can be printed at the touch of a button.

The program was written in Turbo Pascal 4.0 for IBM compatible personal computers. Turbo Pascal 4.0, according to Ragsdale, is "a relatively new high level computer language used widely by businesses."

The system's source code, as it is written, fills five double-side, double-density

floppy disks, which translates to over a million characters of coding. The SIS compiles to one floppy disk, and takes up to 200,000 bytes of main storage.

"On the average, I'd spend 20 to 30 minutes with a student assistant after each game, punching numbers in a calculator to get the stats," said Sports Information Director Ken Bissell. "On Sunday afternoons last season, I spent no less than two hours manually accumulating the season stats. With the program, I can print out game stats in less than a minute, and season stats even quicker."

To make the project more realistic, Ragsdale required the students to make updated presentations to Bissell. Evaluations were given on the presentations for professionalism and clarity. At the end of the semester, a presentation detailing the project was made before several instructors, administrators and students.

"The biggest highlight of the class was to see the students achieve to a level that they probably thought they couldn't," said Ragsdale. "I think these students are leaving this class confident that they can compete with the rest of the world. They're a bunch of overachievers."

According to some of the students, the project took a great amount of time and effort but the payback was greater than the workload.

"The most challenging part was the fact that we had to work together to accomplish our goal," said Hagood, who will attend the University of Texas at Austin

this fall as a graduate student.

"To me, it was unique because we were doing the programming ourselves while Scott might not know where we were in the project. He served as the organizer and motivator. Much of our work was done by trial and error where we would try something over and over until it worked. We probably learned more that way than in any classroom setting."

Rardin, who wrote the program language and central input and output units, said he preferred the class format over the traditional textbook approach.

"For me, most of the technical aspects of the class I already knew. One thing I had to learn was how to work with others and hear their ideas. I realized by the end that I prefer working as an operator rather than as a supervisor."

Perry saw the program from a different perspective. He is an offensive tackle for the Bisons. "You want the program to be precise, but I knew how important it was for us to be accurate in tabulating the stats." He added that the project made him "realize that other people work differently. I realize now that my way isn't always the right way."

All three averaged between 20-30 hours per week

in the latter stages of the project. Some weeks saw them put in as many as 40 to 50 hours of work.

"When I started this, in all actuality I couldn't see them completing it in one semester," Ragsdale said. "I never let on that I thought they couldn't do it, but somehow they did."

"They were motivated by the thought that it would be used on campus. It wasn't something that they would work hard on and then be thrown away. We actually had a client who could benefit from the effort."

Bissell says there are programs for sports information directors on the market that are comparable, but few have the features that the SIS program provides. They include short cut code keys and the ability to add descriptive comments at the end of each play on the game report.

Ragsdale envisions the program as a marketable item. "We still have to iron out a few bugs, but hopefully by the end of the football season we'll have a complete product. I think it will compete with the others on the market."

"Even if it doesn't sell," said Bissell, "we'll reap the benefits and save ourselves four or five hundred dollars. The students will be the biggest benefactors because of what they learned."










