Student Teams Garner National Honors

Student teams from the areas of economics, marketing, management and public relations fared well nationally during spring competitions, receiving honors for Harding in their respective areas. The teams and their advisors had prepared extensive displays, reports and research materials throughout the year for the culminating conferences and awards.

The four teams included the American Marketing Association team, Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) economics team, Society for the Advancement of Management (SA-M) management team and Public Relations Student Society of America (PRSSA) team.

The American Marketing Association team placed second and faculty advisor Charles Walker was named the Hugh G. Wales faculty advisor of the year at the organization's international conference in New Orleans.

Sixteen top AMA collegiate chapters presented written marketing strategies for the national case competition and Harding's team was among the eight selected to compete orally in the semifinals. The team

was defeated in the final round by the University of Virginia. Team members included Lorin Bristow of Alexandria, La.; Sonia Krampitz of Sealy, Texas; Joanna Walker of Searcy; Ronny Widodo of Tomang, Jakrata, Indonesia; Tom Wood of Lithia Springs, Ga.; Cole Bennett of Tyler, Texas; and Mark Waters of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. In addition to Walker, Dr. James Ferguson serves as faculty advisor.

The Students in Free Enterprise economics team won the Mid-South Regional competition in Memphis and received a trophy from the Business Roundtable for a "Halt the Deficit" campaign.

With an entry of 70 projects which have been presented to civic, professional and educational groups in the mid-south, the team went on to Kansas City. College of the Southwest of New Mexico won the event.

Team members are Ron Cook of Searcy, co-captain; Gabrielle Dematteis of Richmond Va., co-captain; Drue DeMatteis of Richmond; Jim Hull of Columbus, Ohio; Karen Norwood of Searcy; and Sheila Wood of Mabelvale, Ark. Dr. Don Diffine is the team's spon-

sor. In the past 11 years, Harding's teams have won six first place and five second place finishes.

Students competing in the Society for the Advancement of Management conference in Cincinnati placed fifth in the case competition division based on a Liz Claiborne, Inc. study. The SA-M chapter was also listed

among the top 10 chapters of the organization for activities and fundraisers held in competing schools.

Dr. Bob Reely and Dr. Randall McLeod sponsor the team, made up of Chris McHan of North Canton, Ohio; Murphy Crowson of Littleton, Colo.; Lisa Landis of Paragould, Ark.; Jamie Martinez of San Salvador, El

Salvador; and Sonia Krampitz of Sealy, Texas.

The Public Relations Student Society of America chapter claimed an Award of Excellence, \$500 and a plaque for a video used in the 1988 Levi's Campus Challenge. The tape covered projects sponsored by the chapter for the Levi's annual event.

Board Approves \$34 Million Budget; Votes to Add Two New Trustees

Approval of a \$34 million operating budget for Harding University for 1989-90 and the addition of two members highlighted the semi-annual meeting of the university's Board of Trustees May 5.

The budget figure is the largest ever presented by the administration. The amount is expected to be achieved through capacity enrollment for the fall, together with gifts, endowments and auxiliary income from the University's enterprises.

Tuition and fees from registered students are expected to account for 60 percent of the total, with the remainder to be solicited from alumni and supporters. Almost \$3 million will be sought through alumni and other supporters, administrators said.

Hourly tuition will increase by 7.5 percent at fall registration, officials said. This minimal increase compares to a 16 percent boost at the University of Arkansas and even larger increases at other colleges and universities nationwide.

Two alumni were appointed to begin serving on the Board in October. John Simmons, a 1974 graduate, will become the youngest of the 20-member group. An internist in the Army Medical Corps at Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas, Simmons will soon enter private practice in Columbia, Tenn.

He has served on the President's Council and for two years held a teaching and research fellowship at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. A Tennessean, Simmons attended

Harding two years, graduating summa cum laude. Mrs. Simmons is the former Beverly Shankle, who also attended Harding.

Deanna Smith, the former Deanna Holland who graduated in 1967, is the wife of Gaylon Smith, an obstetrician who is also a Harding graduate. They have two sons, Craig and Keith, students at Harding Academy of Memphis.

She holds a master's degree in speech pathology from Memphis State, has served as President of the National Council of Associated Women for Harding and as president of the Memphis chapter of AWH. Mrs. Smith is active in Josephine's Circle, a service organization in Memphis, and in a garden club. She is the only woman on the 20-member Board of Trustees.

'Dr. Joe' Addresses Graduates, Receives Tribute

Dr. Joseph E. Pryor addressed the 340 graduating seniors during commencement exercises Saturday, May 6, in Benson Auditorium.

President David Burks presented diplomas to the graduates, with 90 receiving the Bachelor of Arts, 44 the Bachelor of Science, eight the Bachelor of Social Work, four the Bachelor of Fine Arts and three the Bachelor of Music Education in the College of Arts and Sciences.

From the School of Business, 96 received the Bachelor of Business Administration, eight the Bachelor of Arts and two the Associate of Arts. Four completed the Master of Science in Accounting.

Forty-five students received the B.A. from the School of Education, seven the Master of Science in Education and five the Master of Education.

In the College of Bible and Religion, 20 received the Bachelor of Arts and two the Bachelor of Science. Twenty completed the Bachelor of Science in Nursing from the School of Nursing.

Four graduating seniors received plaques from Alpha Chi honor society for achieving a perfect 4.0 grade point average — Chris Hanson, a biochemistry ma-

jor from Memphis; Luke Pittman, an accounting major from Gruver, Texas; Greg Stephenson, a biblical languages major from Effingham, Ill.; and James Thomas "Te" Howard, a physical education major from Clyde, Texas.

Olen Hendrix, a former state senator and a member of the Board of Trustees, was presented an honorary doctorate by Dr. Burks.

In a surprise announcement at spring commencement ceremonies, Dr. David Burks revealed the plan to name the university's science building in honor of Dr. Joe Pryor. The announcement came just prior to "Dr. Joe's" graduation address to the 340 candidates for degree.

Pryor graduated from Harding in 1937 with two degrees. He had been the honor student four years.

Dr. Joe joined the faculty in 1944 after completing a Master of Arts degree in mathematics and Doctor of Philosophy degree in physical chemistry from Louisiana State University, the first Harding graduate to receive the doctoral degree.

He served as head of the physical science department for 16 years. From 1960 to 1973, he served as Dean of the College and in 1973 he was appointed Vice President for Academic Affairs.

In addition to administrative and teaching responsibilities, Dr. Joe was *Petit Jean* yearbook advisor for more than 40 years, represented the University in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference for 30 years and served in all levels of Alpha Chi national

Dr. Pryor is married to the former Bessie Mae Ledbetter, a 1946 graduate of Harding. They have three children — Beverly Jo, Joseph Byron and Susan.

The science building was erected in 1967 and expanded in 1984. One wing of the building is designated the "R. T. Clark Research Center."

HGSR Honors Two Alumni

The Harding Graduate School of Religion presented the annual *Alumnus of the Year* award to two men whose work has focused on both the church and HGSR — Bill Flatt and Glendol Grimes.

Flatt is registrar, assistant dean and professor of counseling at the Graduate School. He has served churches regularly as a preacher, elder and advisor.

Grimes, the director of development for 16 years, has also served as a preacher and elder. He often substitutes for Dr. Earl West in Restoration History classes.

Student Affairs Makes Changes

Levester "Butch" Gardner has been promoted to dean of students and Foy T. O'Neal has been named dean of men and foreign student advisor for the Office of Student Affairs.

Gardner, a 1977 alumnus from Searcy, has served as assistant dean of students since he joined the staff in 1987. A former basketball star and coach, he was recently inducted into Harding's athletic Hall of Fame. He coached at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff before returning to Harding. Gardner

Outstanding Faculty-Staff Honored; Service Pins Awarded to 53 Employees

Harding University paid tribute to 61 faculty and staff members during awards programs this spring. Distinguished Teacher Awards were presented to Mike James, Beth Wilson and Winfred Wright; Outstanding Staff Awards to Craig Jones, Billie Thomasson, W. C. Evatt, Al Fowler and Zearl Watson; and service pins for nearly 1,000 collective years of employment to 53 others.

Having won the Distinguished Teacher Award three times, Wright joined an elite group of Distinguished Professors — Don England, Dean Priest and Ray Muncy. A professor of French and chairman of the department of foreign languages and international studies, he received the award in 1971 and 1977. He has been a member of the faculty since 1966.

James, an assistant professor of communication, worked as staff photographer in the Public Relations office and taught photography classes from 1973 until 1986, when he became a full-time instructor in radio/television. Beginning in September, he will be on leave to pursue the doctorate in communications at Florida State University.

Wilson is an associate professor of home econom-

ics and chairman of the department. She joined the faculty in 1971 and is completing the doctorate in home economics at Memphis State University.

Jones is chorus director and teacher of music and Bible at Harding Academy. Thomasson is a librarian at the Harding Graduate School of Religion. Evatt is an electrician for the university physical plant. Fowler serves as assistant vice president for university relations and Watson is director of student financial services.

Petit Jean Yearbook Presented in Chapel

The 1989 edition of the *Petit Jean* yearbook was unveiled in chapel ceremonies April 25 by editor Sharon Bowles, a junior print journalism major from Abilene, Texas. Stressing the university's adaptation to changes under the new administration, the book focuses on the theme, "We'll Keep the Change."

Members of the senior class dedicated the yearbook to Dr. Don England, distinguished professor of chemistry and associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, the faculty member whose exemplary character they wished to emulate. "This is one of the highest honors that can be bestowed on a faculty member," Bowles said. "It shows that the students respect him for his accomplishments and for the influence he has had on them."

Also honored during the presentation was Aven Humphreys, a senior public relations major from

"One of our main goals was to make everything in the book positive, to capture the essence of student life,"

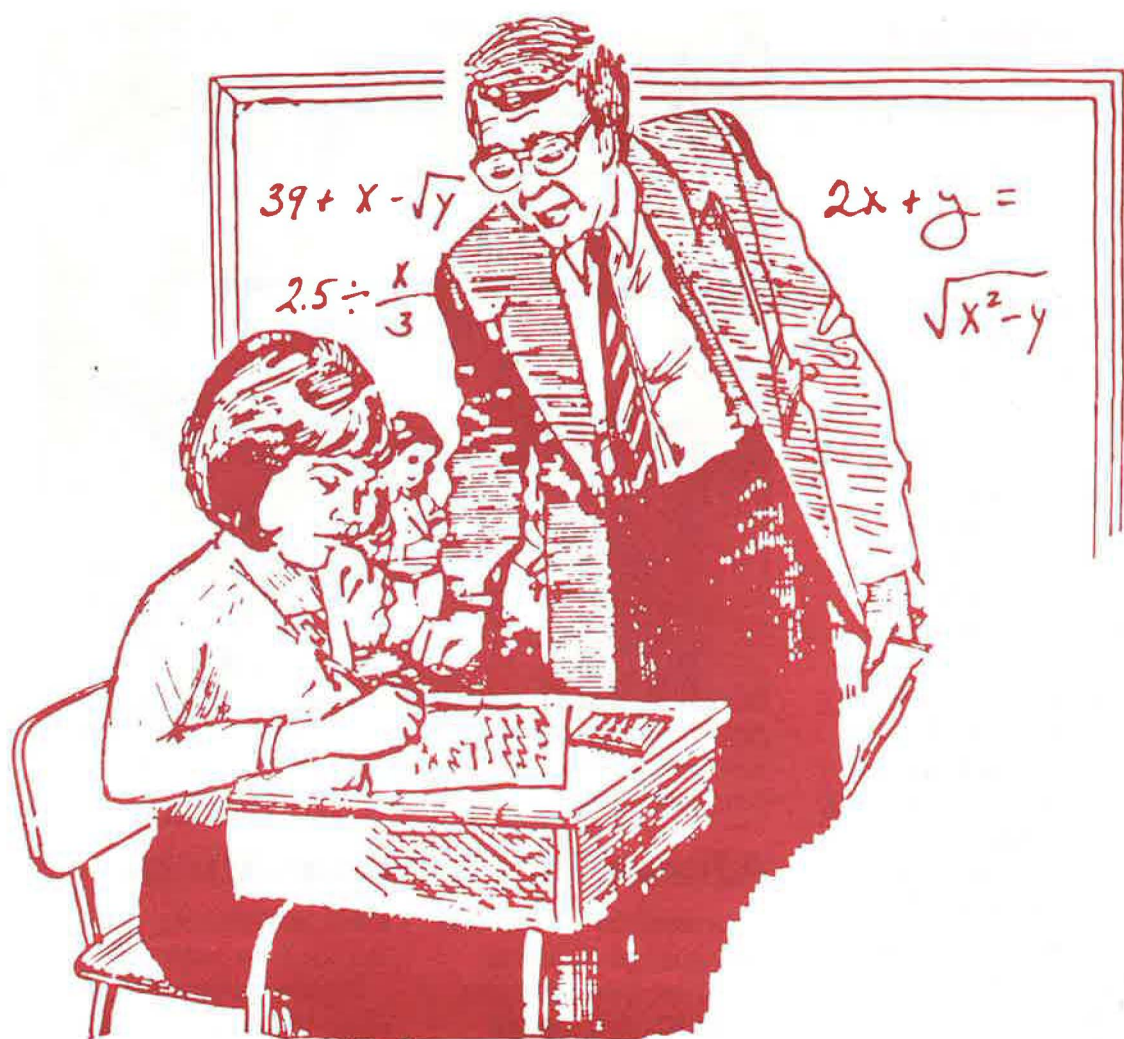
Bowles said. "We tried to have a greater number of photographs this time. And when we hear complaints — and in every publication there will be mistakes — we simply say we've done our best and we're sorry the mistake was made."

The 1989 *Petit Jean* is the 65th consecutive yearbook published by Harding. The 1988 *Petit Jean*, edited by David Dearn, was the 28th consecutive edition to receive an All-America rating, the highest honor for a college yearbook.

Students Prepare

The transition from the industrial age to the information age and into the 21st century is requiring thinking skills which develop from a mathematics background and technological skills which stem from computer training.

Harding's department of math and computer science covers a broad spectrum of curriculum and experience for students who major in these highly-recruited subject areas. Companies from New York to Texas are regularly recruiting graduating seniors in the job market. Entry-level positions, with beginning salaries in the range of \$26,000-\$32,000, are attracting a growing number of majors in these areas.

In a recent study of mathematics education in America, the followup report concluded that "everyone depends on the success of mathematics education; everyone is hurt when it fails. Mathematics must become a pump rather than a filter in the pipeline of American education."

Harding University has taken this responsibility seriously. The mathematics curriculum includes 24 courses, ranging from beginning algebra to advanced calculus. A degree in math leads to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree, with the science emphasis involving 27 hours of other sciences. A math education major is offered for those planning to teach.

Mathematics Alumni Are Exemplary In Professional Career Successes

The strength of any educational institution can be measured by the success of its graduates. Keith Gant and Ken Sewell, alumni of the department of math and computer science, have reflected high marks for Harding through their career successes.

A 1975 graduate, Gant is an actuary who now serves as assistant vice president for Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Company in Jackson, Miss. In this position, he oversees the company's research and corporate planning department and is responsible for financial forecasting, strategy testing and profitability analysis.

A rapidly growing company looking to increase its research capabilities by hiring an actuary, Southern Farm Bureau Life became "home" for Gant in 1981. A fellow in the Society of Actuaries since 1979, Gant completed a double major in mathematics and physics at Harding. He was the recipient of the Pitner mathematics award in 1974 and the Kinslow science award in 1975.

"A major in mathematics is an almost essential prerequisite to taking the actuarial examination," Gant said. "The quality and level of instruction I received at Harding played a major role in developing in me the study habits and motivation necessary to complete the exams."

Gant is a member of Harding's President's Council and is a deacon at the Belvedere Church of Christ in Jackson, Miss. He worked in Campaigns Northeast two summers while at Harding and has preached and taught in small congregations in New Jersey and Mississippi since leaving Harding. He and his wife, the former Janet Teo, also a Harding alumna, have two children.

Sewell completed a B.S. degree in 1976 and enrolled in graduate school at the University of Missouri at Rolla. Following completion of the Master of Science in computer sciences in 1978, he worked as operations research analyst for Conoco, Inc., and as data ad-

ministrator of Tennessee Valley Authority.

A computer specialist, he now serves as manager of the Development Center for the Information Services Department of Union Pacific Resources in Arlington, Texas. He manages consulting and special projects functions and is responsible for technology evaluation of high productivity languages and application development tools.

"My background in mathematics, combined with a general interdisciplinary background in the arts and sciences, has been valuable in several areas," Sewell said. "It developed an ability and an appreciation for learning. It developed conceptual think-

ing skills and communication and people skills. It provided an excellent and necessary foundation for going on to graduate school in a more applied field."

While at Harding, Sewell co-authored a paper in the *Journal of Undergraduate Mathematics*, was a member of Phi Kappa Phi academic honor society and lettered in intercollegiate cross country and track.

A deacon at Richland Hills Church of Christ, he is also a member of the President's Council, The Institute of Management Sciences (TIMS) and American Statistical Association. He and his wife, the former Cathy Cole, a 1974 alumna, have one child.

Students majoring in math are working in one of three career tracks — graduate school, industry or teacher education. A larger number of math majors are pursuing the program in teacher education, a new program to help alleviate the shortage of math teachers in America.

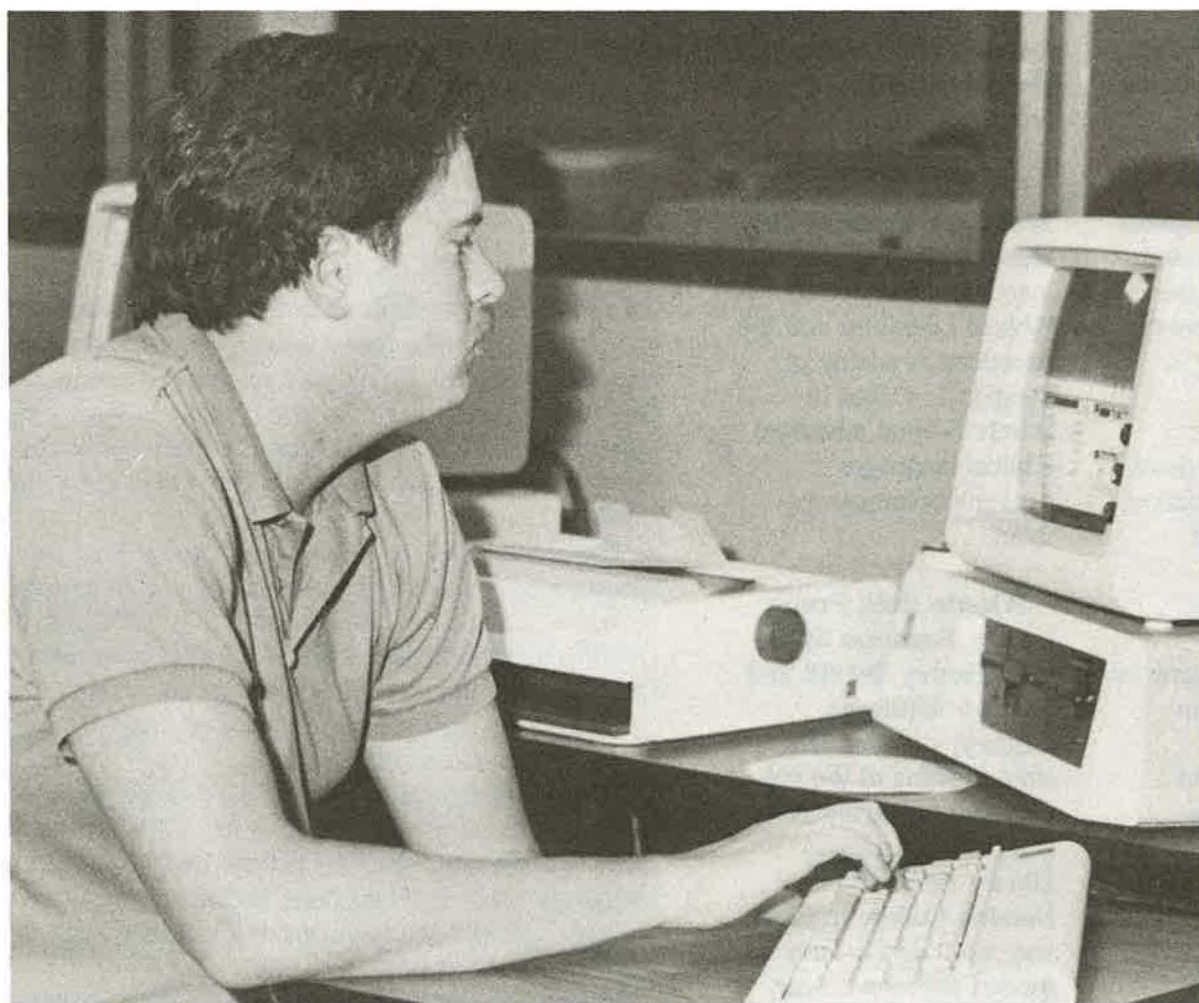
Since salaries and working conditions are improving, along with education standards, more math and science students are choosing careers in public education. This accounts for the emphasis in math education.

At the same time, there is a resurgence toward graduate school training. A recent report estimates the need for 10,000 people with Ph.D.'s in math to replace retiring professors in American colleges and universities in the next 17-20 years.

In industrial professions, six math-related careers are among the top 10 when considering salary, job satisfaction and stress level. Included are actuaries, computer programmers,

COMPUTER WHIZ — Darren Longar, a senior from St. Charles, Mo., prepares an assignment in the IBM lab in the School of Business.

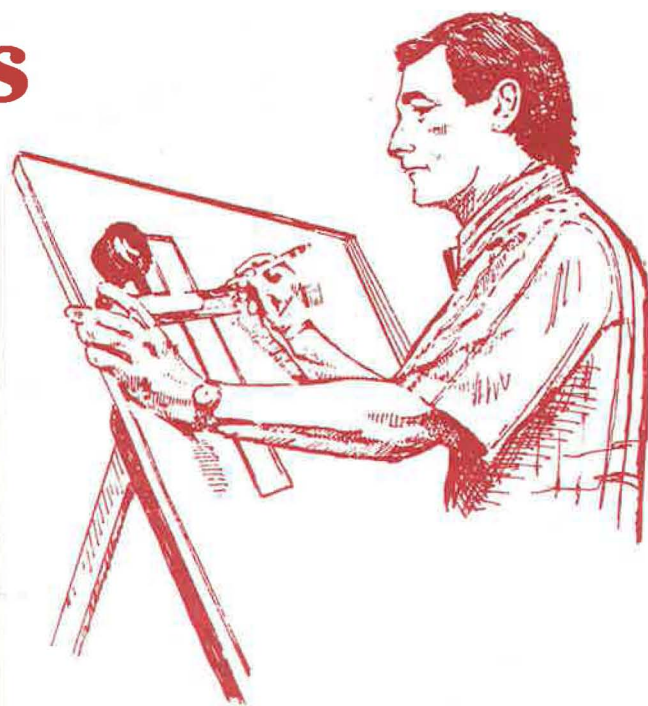
systems analysts, mathematicians, statisticians and physicians. Other professions which use math extensively are the natural and social sciences, engineering and finance.

Harding has taken the lead in promoting mathematics education for high school students and for students in grades 4-8 through participation in the Arkansas Council for Teachers of Mathematics contests and the math talent search contest. Arkansas students in Academic Enrichment for the Gifted and Talented in Summer (AEGIS), an externally-funded project, have participated in a mathematical modeling program at Harding for the last three years.

A recently-enacted Arkansas law has mandated remediation for under-prepared students and college algebra (or a higher level math course) for **all** degree students. Harding has received an \$18,000 grant from the Exxon Foundation to study the impact of this law to university systems in the state.

Parallel with this focus on math is an updated emphasis on computing. The entire computer science/computer information systems curriculum has been revised to better prepare students who wish to pursue computing careers in science and business.

Nationwide, the number of students majoring in computing is down and the demand for jobs in computing is



up. Top salaries are attracting students to computing careers. Harding is attempting to bridge this gap by recruiting and preparing students for the computing job market.

Harding's computer team has successfully competed against teams from major universities in each of the last three years. A member of Phi Beta Lambda placed first in the nation in computing competition last year.

Computing facilities have been updated to include four labs which serve students majoring in any academic area. As dormitories are renovated or built on campus, computer capabilities are becoming a major consideration in the blueprints.

Dr. Steve Smith, chairman of the department of math and computer science, is optimistic about Harding's role in educating students for the 21st century. "I am confident that our faculty has the training, ability and determination to give our students the strong undergraduate training in mathematics and computer science that is necessary to compete successfully, whether it be in industry, in graduate school or in some professional career," he said.

Carr Encourages Juniors To Make Early Application

Harding is expecting another capacity enrollment this fall. Applications for the fall term are well ahead of last year and the university will be accepting a smaller class in the fall of 1989 than in 1988. Seniors who wish to enroll this fall must apply and complete their admissions requirements quickly in order to be considered for enrollment.

Dr. Jim Carr, vice president for educational services, has indicated that high school juniors are applying for the fall of 1990 at a record pace. "We are encouraging students who will be high school seniors next year to file for admission immediately. Harding is now a high-demand institution — receiving far more applications than there are spaces available. It is important to apply early."

Carr added that "students should do all they can to prepare for Harding, including taking a college-prep curriculum, doing their best on the SAT or ACT and submitting their applications early." To encourage early application, the university has reduced its housing deposit to \$25.00 for high school juniors who apply by July 1, 1989, for the fall of 1990.

Harding is expected to enroll the best-prepared freshman class in its history this fall. "This freshman class has prepared itself for college well. They will be achievers while they are here, and after graduation from college, you will see them making valuable contributions throughout the world," Carr said.

"Employers are getting the message, too. Harding has had enormous increase in the number of graduate schools, national and international corporations, school systems and medical, dental and law schools coming to campus to recruit graduates," he said.

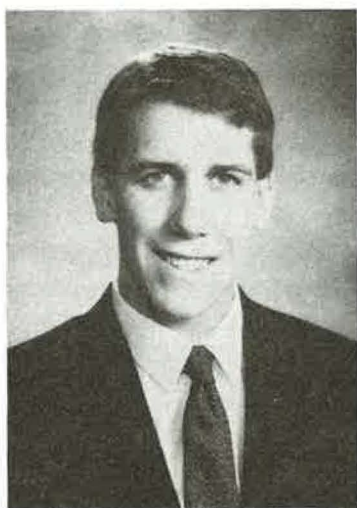

Sports Notes

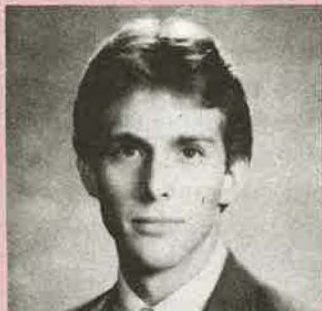
Sparked by three first place finishes, the Bison and Lady Bison athletic squads finished as runner-up in the annual Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference All-Sports Trophy competition.

Championship finishes in men's and women's cross country and women's track catapulted Harding's standing in the prestigious race, which measures the strengths of the AIC's 10-school athletic programs.

Central Arkansas won the title for an unprecedented fifth year in a row with 71.5 points. Harding totaled 61 points, followed by Southern Arkansas with 50.5, Henderson State with 50, Arkansas Tech with 45.5, Ouachita Baptist with 45, UA-Monticello with 36, Hendrix College with 30.5, University of the Ozarks with 29 and Arkansas College with 25.

Harding's cause was strongly supported by second place finishes in baseball and tennis. The Bison golf team was third in the AIC standings, and the men's track team finished fourth. A tie for fifth in women's volleyball and sixth in football to go with eighth places in men's and women's basketball rounded out Harding's performances in the 11 intercollegiate sports.

Two seniors, James Thomas Howard of Clyde, Texas, and Onetta Gardner of Andover, Kan., were named the recipients of the M. E. Berryhill Awards as the outstanding graduating athletes.

Howard, who earned a B.A. degree in physical education, earned four letters as a high jumper on the Bison track team. He is a three-time NAIA All-American in the event and a four-time Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference champion. He was the recipient of the NAIA's prestigious A. O. Duer Award, which recognizes the top varsity junior scholar-athlete in the country, and is a GTE Academic All-American and NAIA Scholar-Athlete.

Howard compiled a perfect 4.0 grade point on 148 hours of study. He was one of four May graduates who received Alpha Chi Key Awards for perfect grade point averages.

Gardner, who earned a B.A. degree in office systems, was the only Lady Bison represented on the All-NAIA District 17 volleyball squad. An NAIA Scholar-Athlete, Gardner was a three-year starter for the Lady Bisons and helped lead them to the District 17 playoffs. She compiled a 3.62 grade point average on 130 hours of course work. She was also named the recipient of the Ermal Tucker Business Education Award.

The women's intercollegiate athletic program received a big boost when the school's Board of Trustees voted to begin awarding full Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference athletic scholarships in women's volleyball and basketball.

President David B. Burks said the decision, to be implemented in the fall, will eventually bring Harding's program in line with the AIC's nine other member institutions.

The change will allow up to 12 full AIC scholarships in both sports, which includes tuition, registration fees and room and board.

Under current AIC regulations, women can receive full scholarships only in volleyball and basketball. Nine of the 10 AIC-member schools participate in women's basketball, while seven participate in volleyball.

Five home games, including the Oct. 28 Homecoming battle, will highlight the Bison football schedule next fall.

The Bisons travel to Emporia, Kan., on Sept. 2 to meet newcomer Emporia State University. Following an open date Sept. 9, Harding travels to Springfield, Mo., on Sept. 16 to meet old nemesis Evangel College. Traditional nonconference opponents Southeastern Oklahoma (Sept. 23) and Lane College (Sept. 30) come to Alumni Field to open the Bisons' home slate.

Parent's Night fans will also see the Black and Gold open AIC play when Arkansas Tech travels to Searcy on Oct. 7. Following another open date, the Bisons travel to Arkadelphia on Oct. 21 to meet Henderson State. UA-Monticello is the opponent on Oct. 28 in the annual Homecoming contest. Southern Arkansas University hosts the Bisons in Magnolia on Nov. 4, followed by the final home contest of the season Nov. 11 against Ouachita Baptist University. The Bisons conclude the schedule in Conway Nov. 16 against Central Arkansas.

Bisons Finish Successful Season With Wins in Two Competitions

In what proved to be one of the most successful seasons on record, the Bison and Lady Bison spring sports squads brought home two championship trophies and challenged for all others in conference and district competitions.

The Bison tennis team surprised everyone but themselves by capturing the NAIA District 17 title and earning an automatic bid to the NAIA National Championship in Kansas City. Also garnering top honors was the Lady Bison track and field squad, which won the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference trophy.

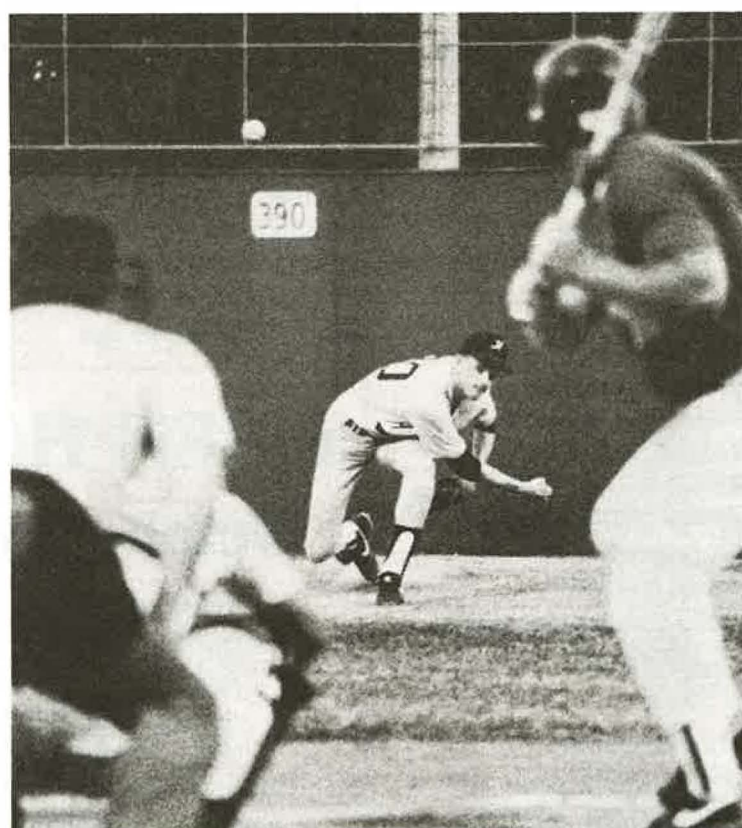
In the other competitions, the Bison baseball team wrapped up second place in AIC and District 17, the Bison golfers placed second in the District 17 tournament and third in the conference race, and the Bison tracksters earned fourth place in the AIC meet.

David Elliott's Bison netters proved the third time to be a charm against AIC champ Southern Arkansas in the district match. After falling twice to the Muleriders during the regular season, the Bisons went head-to-head against the Riders in the district finals. Harding claimed five of the matches to tie SAU for top team honors with 22 points each and won the team trophy on the tiebreaker.

Perhaps the most critical match of the tournament came at number one doubles, where Bisons Ernesto Tovar and Richie Roberts edged SAU's Paolo Pezzoli and John Balderee 7-6 (7-5), 6-4.

Roberts led the Bisons' singles play with a victory at the number two position. Other Harding winners were Leonardo Bravo and Ruy Martinez. Enrique Valero and Gregg Barden fell in championship matches. Bravo and Todd Gilliam won the number three doubles spot. Valero and Martinez lost in the number two doubles title match. Roberts and Tovar earned all-conference honors. On the season, the Bisons were 21-7 overall, 5-1 in league competition.

The only surprise in the Lady Bisons' victory was the margin between first and second place. Harding's lady thinclads amassed 181 points, more than 65 points ahead of runner-up Central Arkansas.

Leading the way was senior distance phenomenon Cheryl Bednosky, who won the 800 (2:21.29), 1500 (4:47.4) and 3000 (10:49.9) meter runs. Teammate Melynda Cordry finished second in all three races.

Other first places went to Letha Stewart in the long jump (17-11¼), Margaret Eoff in the 400 meter dash (1:01.14), and the 400 meter (49.58) and 1600 meter (4:15.78) relays. Others who earned All-AIC recognition by scoring 10 or more points in the meet were distance runners Tracy Parks and Kelsie Hutchison, and sprinters Kara Hutchison and Carrie White.

Led by the pitching of junior John Kodatt, the Bison baseball team completed one of their winningest seasons in history with a 25-25 overall record, 16-8 and second place in conference play.

Kodatt came out of nowhere to post an incredible 10-0 record from the mound. He not only paced the conference in wins but also in earned run average with a 1.77 ERA.

Ironically, it was pitching depth that finally spelled disaster for coach Steve Smith's squad. With Kodatt and fellow righthanders David DePew and John Labas posting wins, the Bisons waltzed into the driver's seat of the district tournament.

Needing one victory over league champion SAU, the depleted Harding pitching staff couldn't hold down the Riders' strong offensive attack and eventually succumbed in two straight, 11-1 and 15-3.

Kodatt was the only Bison named to the All-AIC squad. DePew and Labas gave strong support from the mound with 7-4 and 5-2 records. Senior Dennis Mitchell paced the offense with a .339 batting average.

Led by the play of Dave Converse and Chris Brewer, the Bison golfers rallied to take second in the District 17 tournament, held on the Cortez Golf Course at Hot Springs Village. Heavy favorite Henderson State won with a combined score of 601, followed by Harding with 655.

Converse fired rounds of 80-79 on the par 72 course to earn all-district honors. Brewer missed honors by a single stroke with rounds of 79-82.

Combined with the four previous AIC rounds, the Bisons concluded conference play in third place behind HSU and Arkansas Tech.

Distance man Jon Murray and field event specialists Te Howard and Olester Bernard brought home top honors as the Bison tracksters totaled 71 points in the AIC title meet. Central Arkansas won with 172 points.

Murray claimed dual wins in the 10,000 meter (32:06.55) and 5,000 meter (15:25.84) runs. He also finished fifth in the 1,500 meter run (4:01.84.).

Howard cleared 6-10 in the high jump and narrowly missed at 7-0. Bernard had his best performance of the season in the shot put with a winning heave of 54-2. All three winners are national qualifiers.

Economics Professor Named Recipient of National Excellence Award

Dr. David Tucker, associate professor of economics and director of the Walton Scholarship Program for Central American students, has been named recipient of the 1989 Leavey Award for Excellence in Private Enterprise Education.

Dr. Tucker's award was presented by the Freedoms Foundation on April 29 at a banquet held in his honor at the Beverly Hilton Hotel in Los Angeles, California. Tucker received a \$7,500 check and a plaque to commemorate the award.

Dr. Tucker was honored for his work promoting private enterprise to the students in the Walton Scholarship Program. Funded by Sam and Helen Walton of Bentonville, Arkansas, the program is designed to teach the principles of freedom, liberty and private enterprise to

students from the seven countries of Central America. More than 80 students have been a part of the Walton Program.

Tucker has taught at Harding for nine years. In addition to teaching classes and directing the Walton Program, he has

published several scholarly articles and has been an invited speaker to many conferences and seminars.

Tucker is the second Harding faculty member to be honored with a Leavey Award. Dr. Don Diffine received a Leavey Award in 1980.

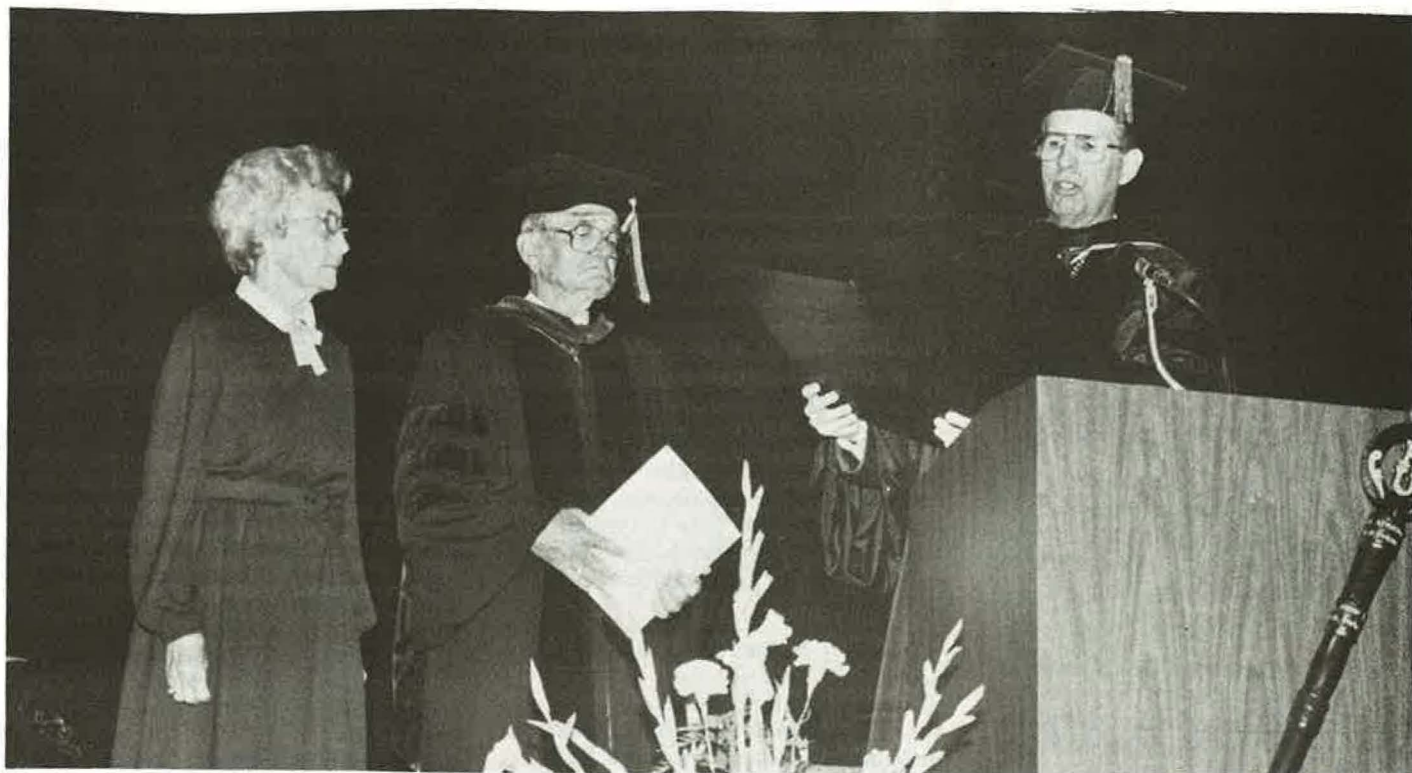

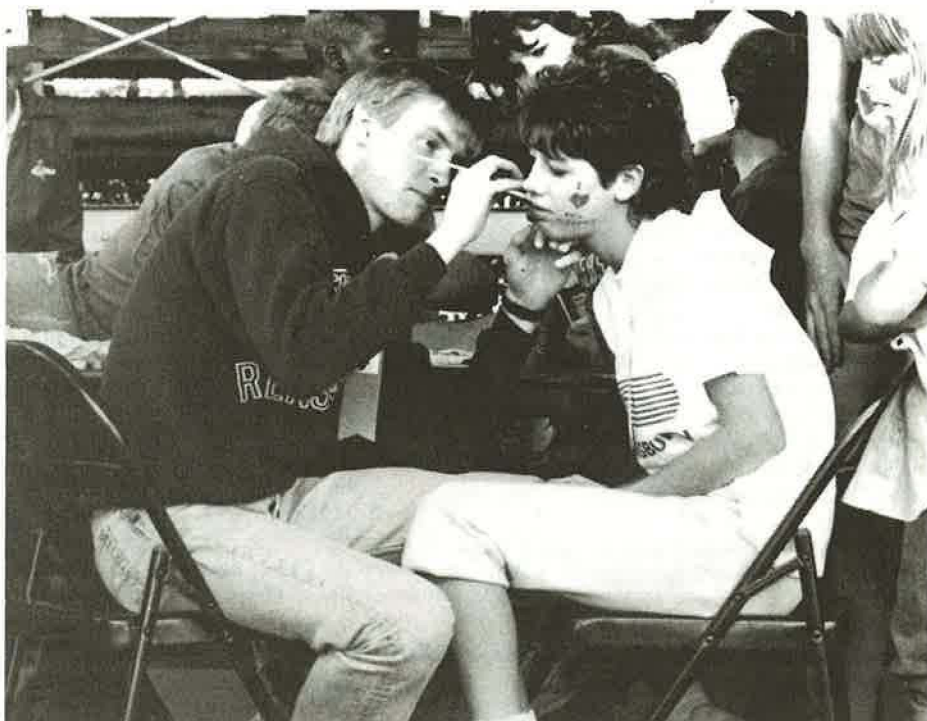
